

Activities & Crafts

Animal Walk

Ask each child to think of a jungle animal to imitate. Then, have the children (animals) line up and pretend to walk through a jungle like their animal would walk.

Suggestions: Prowl like a panther or leopard, swing walk like an elephant, hop like a frog, crawl like a turtle; swing arms like a monkey, lumber like a hippopotamus, flap wings like a toucan, etc.

Early Literacy Take-Home

You can help your child build their letter and number recognition skills by pointing out numbers and letters in your everyday environment (on boxes, clocks, clothes, etc.) and discussing what the number or letter is, counting to that number, and sounding out the letter. Letter and number recognition are essential early literacy skills.
