

Art Projects Make a Pirate Hat

Use paper and the attached pattern to make your very own pirate hat.

Treasure Chest

Make a treasure chest using an old shoe boxe or oatmeal containers.

Decorate the outside of the box.

Make a Hook

Using a plastic or paper cup and tinfoil, have each child make a hook (a la Captain Hook).

Create a Map

Have children create a map of their space. Give each child a treasure to hide and have them mark it on the map. Ask each child to tell you about the map and write down what they say.

Science & Math Will it Float?

Pirates spend a lot of time on the ocean. Gather some items (plastic checkers, dice, magnifying glass, pencil, whatever you might have at home). Take each item and have it "walk the plank" into the water. Have your child predict whether or not each item will float.

Pirate Treasure

Create pirate's treasure using old poker chips or paper. Have children sort the poker chips or paper into different containers.

Early Literacy Take Home:

Telling stories is an important part of learning how to read. Encourage your child to tell stories with a map, or through pretending to be a pirate.
