Father, Mother, and Babies three. (point to each finger, starting with thumb)


Father caught a worm, (point to thumb)

Arts & Crafts

Cupcake Flowers

Make spring flowers using cupcake liners, craft sticks and decorations like buttons, sequins and markers. Flatten the liners and decorate, then glue to the craft stick. Cut leaves out of construction paper and color your craft stick green.

Accordion Caterpillars

Make a cute caterpillar with two long strips of construction paper. Start by overlapping the two strips in an "L" shape.



Alternate folding the pieces over one another and glue the ends together. Draw eyes and a mouth and tape antennae using pipe cleaners. A variation on this activity includes construction paper chain links as the caterpillar body.

Science & Math

Seed Observation

Use a clear plastic cup or an old CD case. Dampen a paper towel and put in the cup. Plant three or four bean seeds against the clear plastic side. Keep the paper towel damp and in a window for sunlight. Observe the seed and the changes that occur each day as it sprouts. Is one sprouting slower or not at all? Talk about why that might happen. Discuss what seeds need in order to sprout and what they need as they grow into seedlings and full plants.

Counting Petals

Draw five circles on a blank sheet of paper. Label each circle one through five. Give your child crayons and ask them to draw the matching number of petals on each flower.

Early Literacy Take-home:

Think of words that rhyme with "spring" with your child. They don't even need to be real words; they can be silly, made-up words. Think of other springtime words to rhyme with (flower, sun, rain, etc.). Rhyming is an essential early literacy skill that your child will build on as they learn to read.
