It takes planning to achieve a goal

Some young men know what they want and plan for it. Others are still looking for their niche. The Regular Army can help both. Perhaps you want to go to college but can't afford it. If you enlist in the Army, you'll get your chance. Honorably discharged after a three-year enlistment, you are eligible for 48 months of education at any college, trade, or business school for which you can qualify. The Government will pay your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year, plus \$65 a month living allowance—\$90 a month if you have dependents.

If you haven't found your spot, an Army enlistment offers you training in any of 200 trades and skills. You leave the service eligible for further training at the best civilian schools.

You can assure yourself of the benefits of the GI Bill of Rights if you enter the Army on or before October 5, 1946. See your nearest Army Recruiting Station for details.

HIGHLIGHTS OF REGULAR ARMY ENLISTMENT

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (Lower enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parental consent) except for men now in Army who may enlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
3. A readjustment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since each bonus was last paid, or \$100 for every year of service if readjustment pay is within 12 months after last favorable discharge.
4. A furlough for men who reenlist within 30 days. Full details of other furlough privileges can be obtained from Recruiting Offices.
5. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged in lieu of reenlistment.
6. Option to receive at half pay for the rest of your life after 10 years' service—advancing to three-quarters pay after 15 years' service. All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
7. Choice of branch of service and overseas transfer (if those still open) on 3-year enlistments.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution

TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 5, 1946

STATE OF WASHINGTON, OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

To Whom It May Concern: In obedience to the State Constitution, and the Joint Resolution of the State Legislature heretofore referred to, there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the State of Washington, a proposed amendment to the constitution of the said state, as follows:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 may be authorized or permitted under the laws of the United States, notwithstanding anything in the constitution or laws of this state.

And Be It Further Enacted That the Secretary of State shall cause the foregoing proposed constitutional amendment to be published in at least three issues of a weekly newspaper in every county where a newspaper is published throughout the state.

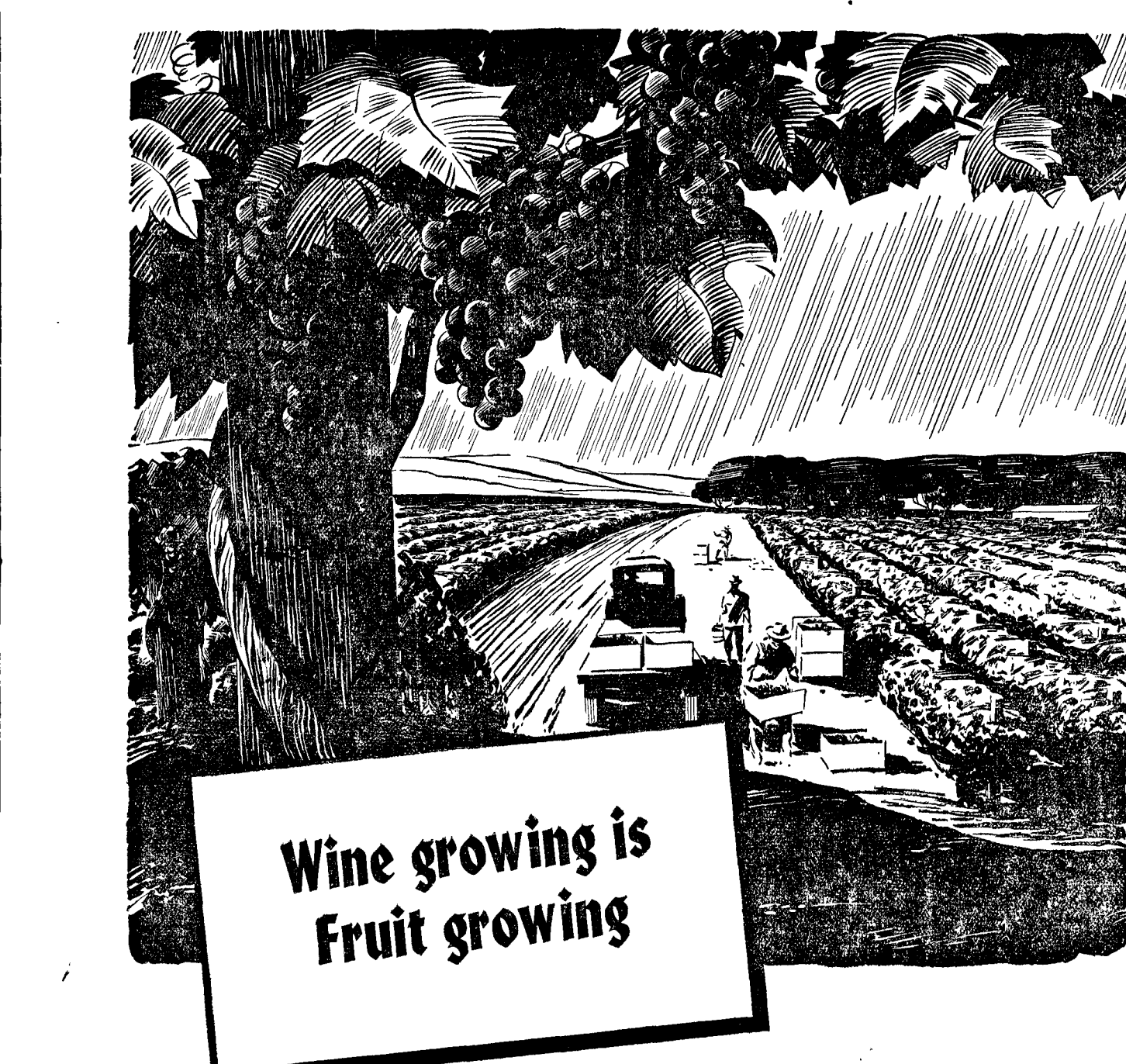

Today, for example, the average price for grapes is more than SEVEN TIMES THAT ORIGINAL PRICE.

YES, WINE GROWING IS FRUIT GROWING. AS THE WINE INDUSTRY GROWS SO GROWS THE INCOME TO WASHINGTON FARMERS FROM THE SALE OF THEIR FRUIT AND BERRY CROPS.

WHY WINE IS VALUABLE . . . In 1936 the wine industry consumed only 100,000 pounds of fruit. In 1945 the wine industry consumed over 30,000,000 pounds of fruit. In 1933 wine grapes were worth \$10 per ton. In 1946 wine grapes are worth seven times that amount or more. In 1935 loganberries sold for \$100 per ton. In 1946 the price is more than five times that amount.
