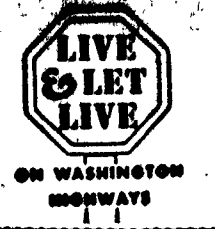

THE WORLD HAS CHANGED SINCE 1913... Washington State was only 24 years old, back in 1913.

It was a period of problems and panaceas, some infantile, some strange. The governor, for example, recommended in his inaugural address that 25 legislators would be enough to run the state!

It was in this atmosphere of youthful confusion and uncertainty that two Washington state prohibition acts were born. One, the State Prohibition Act which prohibited the sale of liquor; the other, the State Prohibition Act which prohibited the redemption of so-called "reading stamps" for merchandise.

Today, 45 years later, the first of these undemocratic laws has long since been repealed. The state—like the nation—learned the folly of its ways and returned freedom to the people. But the other prohibition act is still on the books. In fact, Washington continues to be one of only three states in the nation which deprives its citizens of the advantages enjoyed by 45 of the 48 states.

This is the 1913 statute which says that stamps can be redeemed only for cash. Citizens of Washington cannot redeem such stamps for any of 1,500 items of nationally-known merchandise which Sperry & Hutchinson, for example, makes available to the citizens of 45 other states. They must take cash!

This antiquated prohibition act, now nearly half a century old, is unfair to the citizens of this state for two reasons: 1. It prohibits stamp savers of Washington State from sharing in the benefits enjoyed by stamp savers in other states; and 2. It penalizes the citizens of Washington State because the S & H stamps, for example, have a 50% greater value when redeemed for merchandise than when redeemed for cash. In other words, while Washington citizens are redeeming their stamps for \$2.00 in cash, their neighbors in Oregon, Idaho, California and 42 other states are redeeming their stamps for values of at least \$3.00 in fine merchandise.

Isn't it about time that this musty old prohibition act was repealed? Our present State Legislators, of course, did not create this legislation which discriminates against the citizens of the state, but they can correct it. Their objective and desire, after all, is to serve you and, since they can't know how you feel about such things unless you tell them, why not mention it in a post card, telephone call or the next time you see them. The 1909 session of the Legislature opens in January, and this is a good time to make known your wishes.
