SDNR to Propose Changes in Lands, Timber Sales

Don Hopkins, supervisor of the Forest Management Division, Department of Natural Resources, spoke to the members of the North Olympic Chapter, Society of American Foresters, Friday, January 8, at Port Angeles, on the proposed legislative changes affecting state lands and timber.

The proposed legislation will standardize sale procedure that is now handled by four sections of the state, depending on the kind of timber to be sold at a public auction.

District Administrators will be authorized to make sales appraised at less than \$2,000 upon 10 days advertisement. When timber sales are appraised at more than \$2,000 and less than \$5,000, they may be advertised at more than 20 days and the State Board of Forestry shall be authorized to proceed with such sales without prior board approval. Timber sales at \$5,000 or over require board approval. Sales of less than \$2,000 must be advertised to allow operators to bid on the timber.

It is proposed that each deposit on timber sales be set at a minimum of 20 per cent of the bid value. When larger road costs are involved, the deposit may be increased. Substitution of surety bonds up to the value of the bid is to be required in lieu of cash.

It is proposed that a \$500,000 emergency fund for fire protection be set up. \$20,000 of this amount to be appropriated from state funds to be raised by increasing the present 7½ per cent forest patrol tax to 8 per cent.

Traffic Deaths On Decline

Four traffic deaths occurred during the week ending January 11, bringing the 1938 traffic death toll up to 7. This is six less than reported last year.

So far this year five deaths have occurred in the rural areas, and two in the cities.

Two pedestrians were among last week's four traffic deaths. The continuing violations for the city were two were inattention and on the wrong side of the road, not in all cases.

In 1937, 32 traffic deaths occurred in the rural areas, while 10 occurred in the cities. A concerted effort on the part of both enforcement and the driving public can bring down the January toll.

Last week recorded three deaths, a record which hasn't been broken for many months. Continued reports of this nature can mean a reduction this year.

The Game Department reported 21 anglers on the Sol Duc and 12 on the Hoh. Streams are beginning to clear and drop and by this weekend should be good.

Check hunting in coastal counties has been very slow, but two elk were taken in the special season in the Elwha River area.
