More Turkeys Released

The State Game Department announced today that 25 more Merriam's turkeys were flown into the Yakima airport last night for release in the Kittitas county.

The turkeys were provided by the Arizona Game and Fish Commission. Another batch of wild turkeys was received from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish last month.

The first release was in the area calculated to give the birds the best possible chance to establish themselves in the wild.

Previous releases of wild turkeys in Washington, most of which took place under the county game management and New Merriam's turkeys were flown into the Yakima airport last night for release in the Kittitas county.

It is hoped that the turkeys from the southwest, which are strictly wild-trapped birds, will prove better adapted to Washington habitat conditions.

The Washington Game Department expressed appreciation to the Arizona Game and Fish Commission for providing the turkeys. Capturing the turkeys in their home ranges involved considerable time and expense on the part of the southwest agencies.
