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# I Had No Crystal Ball...

Some people gaze into a crystal ball and see, or pretend to see, what lies in the future. I had no crystal ball, was never good at predicting and not, by the widest flight of the imagination could I have foreseen some of the happenings of my lifetime.

I couldn't have imagined that the casual remark of a fellow teacher could change the entire course of my life. The remark, that did that little thing was simply, "They still have an occasional short summer term of school in western Chatham and Jefferson Counties." The remark stuck by me and when, the following spring the spring of 1900, I wrote to the clerk of the school board at the lower fork River, (having got his name from the Jefferson County superintendent) I did I dream that the name wrote on the envelope would, within two years, become the name of my own son, Henry Fletcher.

When, a few months later, I said good-bye to my parents at the little union high school on Vashon Island, I didn't even imagine that Hazel Boyington, freshman, would be vividly brought to mind 50 years

later when her son, John Hitchcock, would come to my home town as superintendent of schools.

When I watched a comely young woman come on board the BELLE-LEIGHAM there was nothing to intimate to me that years later Anna Klain's home would be only a block from my own, and that my next door neighbor, and that before neighbors that Richard and Kay Klain, no one ever had. Nor was there anything to suggest to me that the infant daughter Anna was carrying in her arms that day would, after 50 years, be living only a few miles distance from me and that her son, Earl Kennedy, would be mayor of my home town.

When Marie Ruedelle showed me to a room in the Chatham Bay Hotel, nothing was farther from my thoughts than that 50 years later her six-year-old niece would be my next door neighbor and that Paula Klain would be like a daughter to me.

I forgot to mention that during the evening I arrived at Chatham Bay a middle aged man introduced himself to me as K. O. Erickson, Chatham County commissioner from the West End. Nothing intimated to me that 20 years later K. O. Erickson would be my husband and finance the biggest small town business venture our Island had. That our association in that venture would be most pleasant and satisfactory.

When Dr. Butler disappeared in the sprawling house at Sappho I little dreamed that 30 years later, during one of those periods when we had no local dentist, Dr. Butler with practicing in Port Angeles, would give me the dental aid I needed.

While I crouched beside a quiet little boy under a cotton umbrella on an open beach, I had no pronouncement that some 20 years later, during one of those periods when we had no local dentist, Dr. Butler would give me the dental aid I needed.

When I saw a young woman in a red coat standing beside a roadside mail box, the thought never entered my head that a little over a year later Grace Paleosee Astorly and I, brides of the same month—the same week—would be calling to each other as we hung clothes to dry each in her own back yard, that for 50 years we would be friends, and frequently visit together.

I had no crystal ball. I could not dream, when I made that 72 hour journey from my home to the lower fork, that 50 years later I would make that same distance in as many minutes. But sometimes it seems to me that so many things in my life were, in some small way, foretold, indicated, that first day I spent in Chatham County.

## Trail Notes--

Not much in the way of monotony on the trail crew. What I mean — we hardly stay in one place long enough to get very tired or to start work laying planks at Lake Ozette; this week building a corral fence at Graves Creek on the east fork of the Quinalt. A badly needed fence it was, too. Without it in the spring we have to haul the horses seven miles down the road to leave them in the Park. The Bunch ranch, that the Park has taken over for a winter horse pasture.

That storm we had last Monday lake raised several feet and some of the houses and summer cabins on the shore were nearly inundated. The north shore road beyond the Quinalt Ranger Station was impassable due to high water, especially in Pinley Creek. Part of the Park road crew was there doing their best to save what they could of the road.

Lake Quinalt lies in a rather steep sided valley, but upvalley from the lake the ground is quite flat and the water runs in a series of creeks feeding into the north and east forks of the Quinalt river. During a heavy rainstorm these tributaries become saturated with water and the runoff from the hills and canyons is all within their banks. So it overflows, the water and fields and woods. Luckily most all this Peninsula country has excellent drainage and it doesn't take long for it channel into regular water-ways once the rain stops.

In our attempt to reach Graves Creek we had to back track from the north shore road to fill and go up the south shore road. We didn't get very far there either. Just past a river coming down the road, and knowing that the ground beyond was even lower, we chose to turn back and returned to Kalaloch bunk-house, unpacked our gear, and made ready to spend the night.

Wednesday the water was down again and I am happy to report to you tax-payers that during the remainder of the week we were able to finish our assigned task of building that corral fence. Not a day of night or heat of day can from their duty the trail crew.

We forge ahead — even against a flood.

On fallen trees, or just plain mud. We think: rains and rain paths down.

We all made look out and frown.

We know 'till stop — we call it's bluff.

By staying in, when the weather's rough.

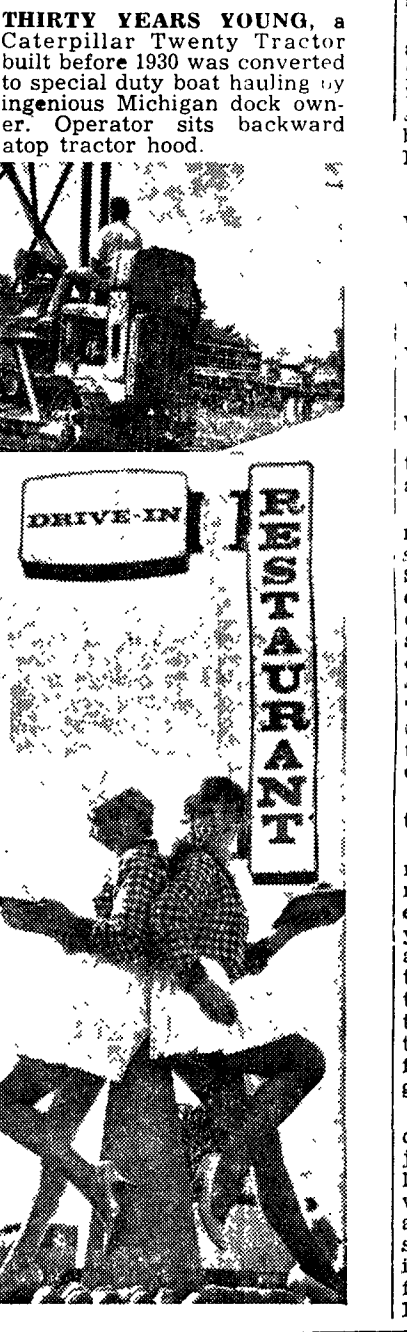
By that that awful poetry? Really I think I can do better than that — and maybe I'll try again sometime.
