Steelhead Planted Here

Migrant steelhead were planted this week in Lake Suburban, 15,000 in the Hood Canal. Game warden reports that fishing was good in Lake Suburban Sunday with 45 lb. cutthroats reported and several up to around 35 pounds. Numerous limits of smaller cutthroat, rainbow and silver trout were also taken.

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Trail Notes---

April 20, 1961

I saw an otter today—just downriver from the Smith place on the Quetzal trail. Bill Anderson, the Kahloch Ranger, told me about a log jam below Smith's. That I might use to cross the river. While I was looking over the jam I saw this otter, quite a big fellow, dragging something across the gravel bar in the middle of the river. Couldn't make out just what he had—looked like a duck—but I've never heard of otters catching ducks. By the time I climbed over

the pile of logs to where I had seen him, he was gone, probably to some side-hole under the drift. Now I'm going to be wondering if otters catch ducks. I know that they live primarily on crawfish, but I suppose they like a change of menu sometimes.

We moved here from the Anacapa trail, four miles or so downriver today. Spent yesterday on the Knochmans. Roy and Max—and what a day! Started early and spent all day in the snow going up that hill. Only about a half-inch at the bottom, fresh snow, but the higher we worked the deeper it became—two inches, four inches, six inches—then we started measuring in feet, till at the base of Knochman's cliff there was probably about 32 feet of snow. Of course that included the stuff that had blown or slid from the rock above and drifted around its base. Al Cunningham wanted to take a picture from the top of the rock to get there only to find the scenery all fogged in. We came dragging back to camp after supper time, home-weary tired. I am glad that trail is finished for the spring. The map says it stands at 3,387 feet, and I sure believe it.

We had a coyote chorus at Andrews place this morning. They picked a half way through tracking our feet and barked. They got all stirred up about the racket and kept going around in circles trying to get a look. Most aggravating to try to get a good photograph with that kind of going-on. Makes a fellow understand why multi-lensers got the reputation for using bad language. I don't believe in using hard language, or even thinking it, but it is easy to see why they use it with a different philosophy might be driven to it by the proximity of an uncooperative quadruped.

It is 9:30 p.m. and pouring down rain. The animals are tucked in for the night in a dry shed with a manager full of water—let it rain—who cares? Long as the river doesn't get too high for us to get out tomorrow.
