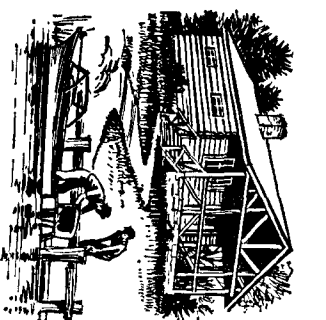

Girl Killed On LaPush-Mora Rds.

The young life of a 15-year-old girl was snuffed on Friday afternoon when the car she was a passenger slammed into an embankment on the La Push-Mora intersection. Cynthia Cobe, daughter of Marjorie L. Cobe, Port Angeles, was dead on arrival at Forks Community Hospital. The vehicle was operated by Wilton Robinson, 45, of Port Angeles.

According to investigating officers, the car failed to stop at a stop sign at the LaPush-Mora road and hit an embankment.

The driver and another passenger, Thomas Becker, also of Port Angeles, were taken to Olympic Memorial Hospital where they were listed in satisfactory condition.

Motorcycle Accidents Double In A Year

The State Safety Council said today that according to traffic accident statistics fatalities involving motorists are double what they were last year.

Where there are 10 fatalities last year there are 20 to July 15, 1966.

The principal violations contributing to these accidents were speeding and failure to yield right of way. The types of accidents were: collision with another motor vehicle, running off the roadway and overturned on roadway. The same was true in the rural areas of Washington during 1964 when in 41 accidents involving motorcycles there were 458 persons injured. It becomes clear that a person's chance of becoming injured, the State Safety Council continued, when involved in a traffic accident, is much greater riding on a motorcycle than in an automobile.

The motorcycle, however, was not in violation of a motor vehicle law in 65% of the investigated accidents. Apparently the violation was committed by the driver of the other motor vehicle involved or there were no traffic violations committed prior to the accident, the council said in violation in the remaining 35% of the accidents.

Motorists reported that they could not see the motorcycles in time to avoid the accident. It would seem, the State Safety Council says, that it remains for the cyclists to be alert at all times. If there were no case for defensive driving this sharp increase in traffic accidents involving motorcycles should be proof.

State Land Sales

The state Board of Natural Resources authorized August sales of 24,138,000 board feet of standing timber, a total of 1,497,225 acres.

Public auctions will be conducted August 30 and 31 for the sever tract in Clallam, Jefferson, Skagit, and Whatcom counties. The land Commissioner Bert L. Cole said the opinion of other Board members on a Department of Natural Resources request for right of way for a road through the tract owned timber.

The Board decided it would not be proper for Cole to accept normal compensation in exchange for the right-of-way. Cole has received the land prior to becoming land commissioner.

Cole said he is seeking the Attorney General's opinion on any possible course of interest before proceeding with the right-of-way transaction. It involves the acre of land for which the state proposes to pay Cole \$160.

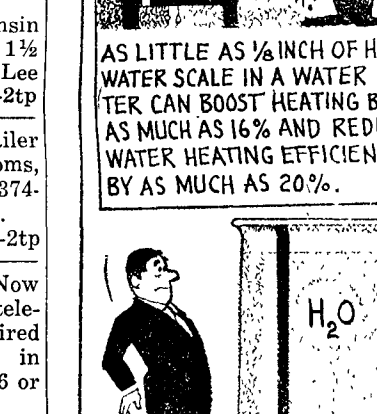
