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Area Resident Named Peace Corps Volunteer
 James Michael Klahn, son of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Klahn, Forks, has been named a Peace Corps Volunteer, having completed twelve weeks of training at the University of California at Davis, California, on home leave prior to a September 20 departure for India.
 Volunteers in this group (India 17, 18, & 19) will work in poultry production, agricultural extension and applied nutrition, supplementing Peace Corps efforts in these fields. Part of the volunteers will be assigned to areas that have not had previous Peace Corps Volunteers. The remainder will be assigned to rural Indian villages, replacing Peace Corps Volunteers who have completed their two year's service.
 With the arrival of this group, nearly 600 Peace Corps Volunteers will be working in India in Agricultural Extension, Poultry Production, and applied nutrition, and as mechanics and secondary school teachers.
 During training the Volunteers studied Hindi (one of the languages of India), Telugu (a major South-Indian Language), Malayalam (another Southern Indian Language), Indian culture and history, United States History and world affairs.
 Persons interested in starting a two-year Peace Corps assignment this fall should contact the nearest Peace Corps office as soon as possible and take the Peace Corps placement test, which is given throughout the country the second Saturday of each month. All pertinent information can be obtained at post offices or by writing the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

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Idaho-Huskies Open Football Season
 Idaho, once regarded in football circles as a breather, is expected to have the Washington Huskies pumeling and offing this Saturday, September 18 when the two teams open their grid schedules at Seattle. Game time is 2 p.m.
 Close to a sell-out crowd will be on hand at the 55,000 seat H.W. Stadium. There are still reserved (25,000) and unreserved (42,500 & \$1.00) tickets for sale.
 This will be the 31st game between the Huskies and Vandals. The last time they met was in 1960, and the last time Idaho hosted Washington dates back to 1955.
 Coach Steve Musgrave is in his inaugural season as Vandals headmaster. He formerly was a top assistant to Doc Anderson, who switched to Oregon State this season.
 The Husky defense, riddled by graduation following the 1963 season, will be put to a severe test in stopping hard-charging fullback Ray McDonald. The 240 lb. Idaho junior is regarded by many as the best running back in the country. Washington's offensive unit, on the other hand, is the least-and-better unit in '65. The first string offense, all letters and experience in both running and passing departments, has most fans thinking of a Husky attack.
 Coach Jim Owens says his Huskies will be passing more this season, due to quarterback Ted Hillin, and receivers Frank Etter, Tom Spaulin and Greg Peters. Hillin is the top signal-caller, and the other three are neck-and-neck in a battle for the No. 2 spot.
 The running game will be by no means underemphasized. Tabled halfbacks Ron Medved and Steve Bramwell are both seniors with two varsity letters while Jeff Jordan, a junior letterman, is the returning first stringer.
 Washington, of the AAUW Conference, had a won 6, lost 4 season record in 1964 while Idaho, Big Sky Conference, posted a 4 and 6 record.

Junior-Senior High Enrollment
 The enrollment of Forks Junior-Senior High has increased by thirty-six over last year's number of students. The senior high now has 236 students compared to an enrollment of 222 last September. The junior high has 243 students compared to 225 last year. A total of 481 students are now attending our junior-senior high.

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Direct Dialing Due Oct. 3
 Direct Distance Dialing will be available to all telephone subscribers living in Portis, Clallam Bay, Sekiu, Neah Bay, and surrounding areas effective October 3, 1965, according to an announcement made by M. R. Hull, President of Peninsula Telephone and Telegraph Company, Forks, Washington.
 On October 3, 1965, Peninsula Telephone Company subscribers can dial directly, without the aid of an operator, all station-to-station calls to most telephone areas anywhere in the United States and Canada. Hull stated, "Subscribers will now be able to dial across the nation with the same ease as they now call across town."
 Peninsula Telephone Company is in the process of installing over 75,000 of new DDD Center Office equipment. Installation of the equipment is being accomplished by company employees and is scheduled for completion during the last week in September.
 Telephone subscribers will be mailed a booklet of instructions during the last week of September which will tell everything a subscriber needs to know about Direct Distance Dialing—where you can reach by DDD and exactly how to use it. As a parting reminder Hull encouraged, "We would hope all subscribers use Direct Distance Dialing in placing all their station-to-station calls after October 3, 1965. Remember that DDD is fast, easy, and convenient."
