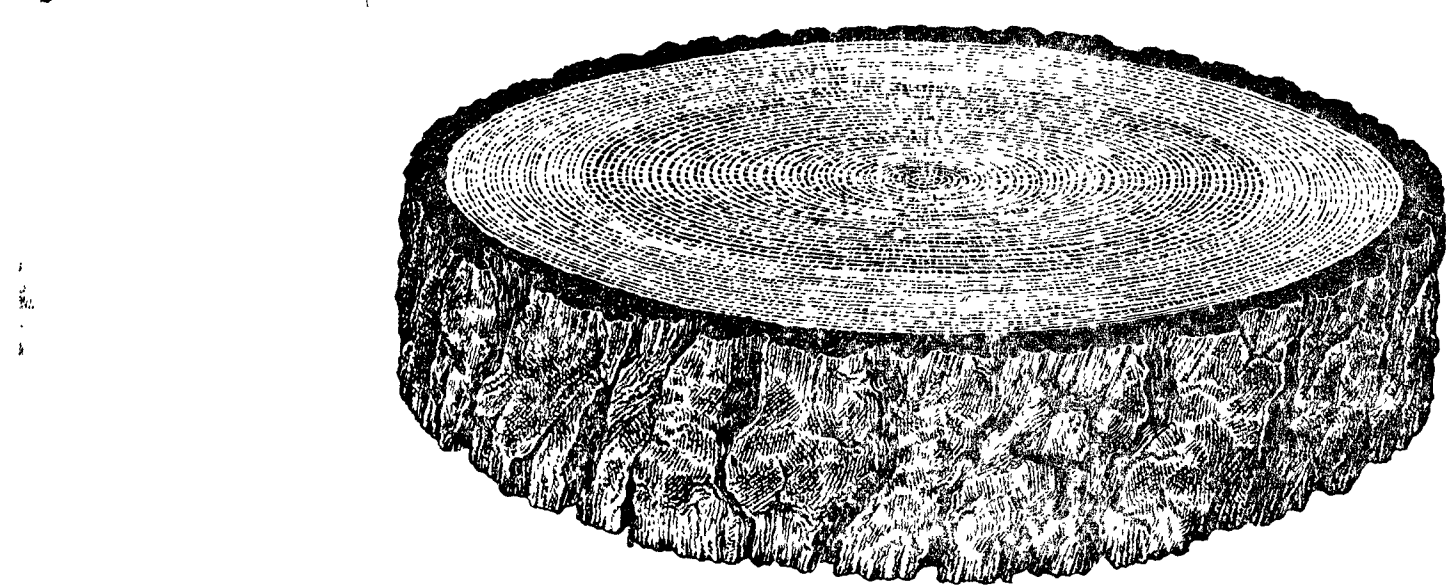

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Kirkman and family visited over the Christmas

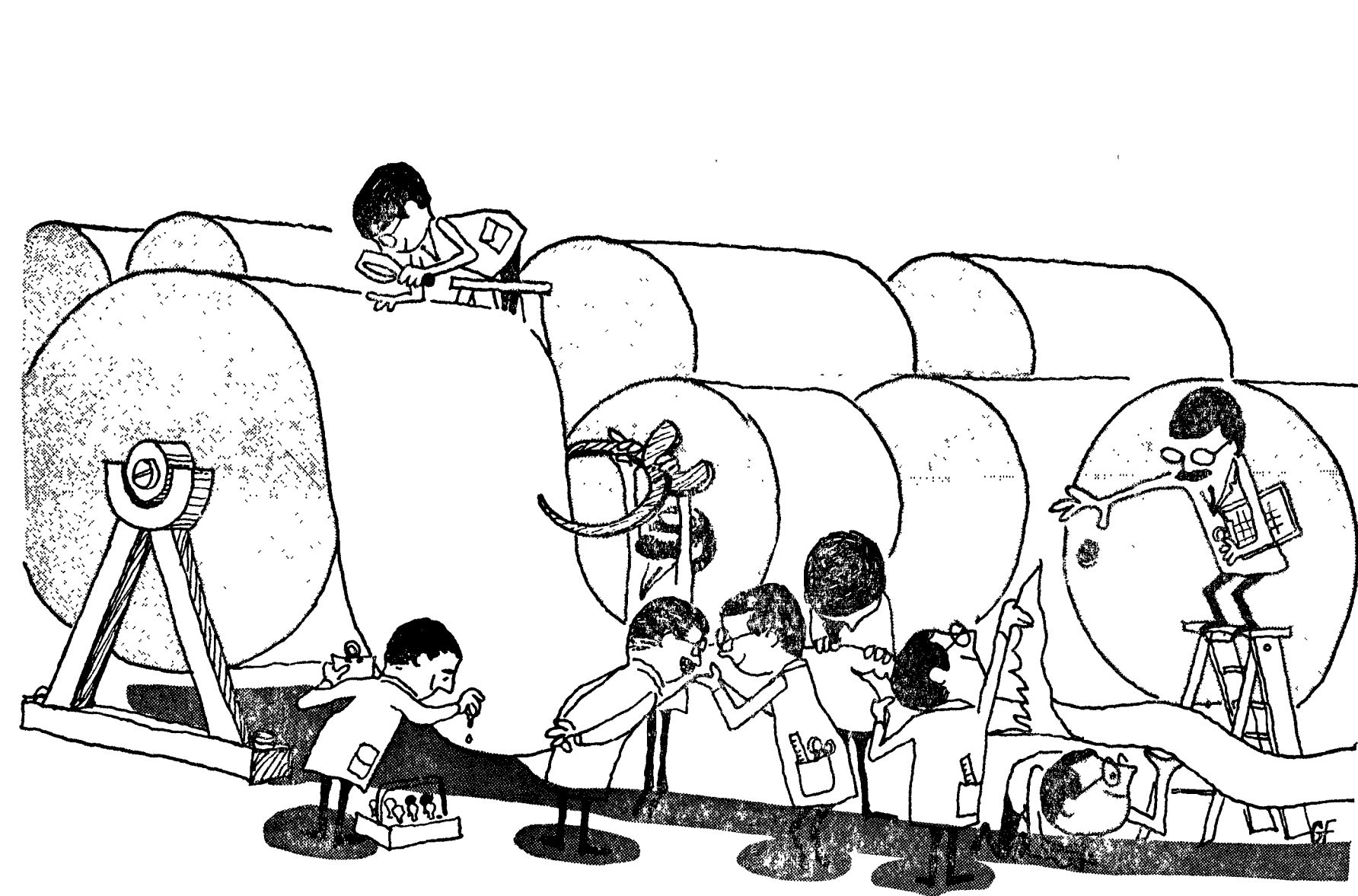
(his 70th) and succeeded beyond Mrs. their greatest expectations. His many friends join in wishing George many more happy birthdays.
