

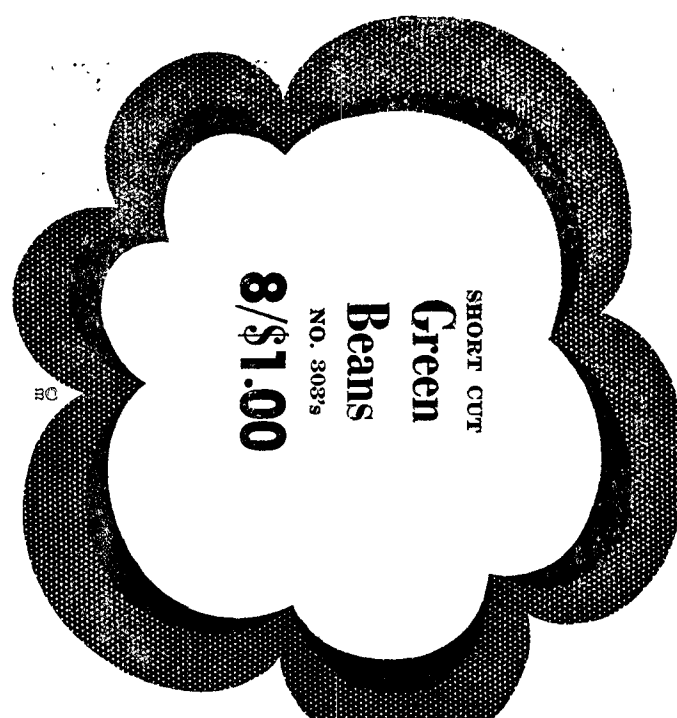

The flurry of sending Christmas letters and mail has added point to the Hope Hodges' comments on her

reading of "My Appointed Reward" by J. Edward Day. Most of us are familiar with the problem indicated by Day in his chapter headed "Man's Best Friend Has Teeth". His keen sense of humor undoubtably proved a most useful asset in overcoming the many difficulties of his unexpected office. His administrative ability and his pride in a good job well done are both apparent in his report on the Zip Code. "Same-day collection and delivery improved mail service in a great many cities," he writes, "but the greatest operating improvement during my tenure in the Post Office was the Zip Code. You might say that Zip put a ring in the Post Office."

Besides turning our thoughts to the holidays season has made us all very much aware of cook books. Promotion Announced

Olympic National Forest Supervisor, R. E. Worthington today announced the promotion and transfer of Warren A. Post from the District Ranger position at Quinalt to Waterhead Management Forester in the Division of Watershed Management, National Office of the U. S. Forest Service at Portland, Oregon. Post will be replaced by Jerry J. Brown from the Wenatchee National Forest.

Worthington said that in his new job Post will be responsible for the Columbia River Basin Interagency Planning Committee. Post came to Quinalt as District Ranger from Mt. Baker National Forest, Bellingham, Washington.

He is a 1952 graduate of the School of Forestry at Montana State University.

Post has been in the Forest Service on the Umpqua National Forest since 1955. Before that he was in the Forest Service on the Mt. Hood National Forest where he was, at different times, in charge of timber management, recreation and land management on the Zigzag Ranger District.

Brown and his wife, Patricia, are due to arrive at Quinalt with their children on or about January 16.

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
