Special School Levy Defeated By 7 Votes

The Special Levy Election of the Quillayute Valley School District No. 402 was disappointingly defeated Tuesday by a mere 7 votes.

The Special School Levy Election was presented to the people in this district because of several issues which confronted the operation of the schools here.

Salaries of staff instructional staff members are \$183 lower than in schools of similar size in the State and are an additional \$287 lower than the average high school district in Clallam and Jefferson counties.

The situation was brought to the voters of the school district to give them a chance to determine whether they wished to continue the education of their children as at present or whether they wished to limit their educational experience.

This does not take into consideration the humanitarian aspects—people living again—not vegetating. If a rehabilitated person cannot go back to work, at least he will be able to return to his family, as well as he ever can be.

Bids for Bogachiel Bridge to be Called

According to present plans the bids for building a new bridge across the Bogachiel river on the La Push road will be called for on May 19.

The new bridge will be a steel girder and concrete deck combination with a twenty-six foot wide roadway.

The Board of Natural Resources approved the sales for June at the estimated cost of the project is \$200,000.00 and that they hope to receive \$50,000.00 of Federal Aid to Secondary Highways money.

The most valuable sale is the Cripple Creek blowdown sale in Lewis County. The 13.9 million board feet, located about 23 miles east of Castle Rock, is valued at \$54,675.

The largest volume of timber to be sold is in the Noham Creek No. 3 sale in Jefferson County. The state will sell 21,022,000 board feet, appraised at \$48,866, on June 28 at Forks.

Commissioner Cole reported the June sales include the largest number of timber sales to be offered at one time. The state will offer 18 thinning sales, totaling 10.2 million board feet.

The largest thinning sale which has been scheduled for the state is in a specific area to permit remaining trees to grow better, in the Snow Creek Thinning sale in Clallam County. The sale offered 21 million board feet appraised at \$17,505.

The June sales to be held in the following counties: Clallam, Clark, Pacific, Pierce, Skagit, Snohomish, Stevens, Thurston, Whatcom, and Yakima.

Lower Hob Road No. 3 sale—21 million board feet, appraised at \$48,866, located about 84 miles north of Hoquiam, to be sold June 28 at Forks.

Winfield Ridge sale—12.7 million board feet, appraised at \$235,198, located about 20 miles south of Forks, to be sold June 28 at Forks.

Applications For Postmaster

An examination for Postmaster at Beaver, \$535 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until May 24, 1966, the commission has announced.

Competitors for the postmaster in this city must have at least 1 year of experience (Federal law above high school level may be substituted for 3 months of experience) showing that they have the ability to maintain simple records of accounts or that they have given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can meet and deal with the public aware and effectively. Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned and on their experience, and the post office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance.

Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed unless they are citizens of the United States, of good moral character, and of good reputation.

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Viet-Nam Film Shown Sunday

"Viet-Nam Profile," just-completed film production by Dr. Bob Pierce for World Vision, Inc., will be presented in a special premier showing at Forks Bible Church, Sunday, May 15, at 7 p.m.

Eighty minutes in length, the sound-color documentary film takes the viewer throughout war-torn Viet-Nam, portraying "the drama of God at work in the midst of war."

Dr. Pierce, President of World Vision, Inc., has spent the major part of the last two years in Viet-Nam, filming and directing production of "Viet-Nam Profile," while also establishing his organization's vast relief program there.

"Viet-Nam Profile" portrays the people of the war-torn little country, including colorful aboriginal mountain tribespeople as well as the Vietnamese people themselves. It takes the viewer into scenes of actual combat, follows missionaries and Vietnamese Christians in their faithful and often heroic labors for Christ, and depicts the suffering of a typical V.N. chaplain.

The Forks High School track team picked up its first victory of the season in a triangular meet at Sequim last Friday. The final score was Forks 64 1/2, Sequim 62 1/2, and North Mason 57. A narrow victory in the final event of the day, the 880 relay, enabled the Spartans to pull off the unexpected. Members of the winning relay team were Ron Kraft, Larry Gooding, Mike Graham, and Gary Peterson. Gary and Stan Peterson teamed up in the mile to excite the spectators. Stan made several attempts to pass Gary and his final move to the finish line was thwarted by a last effort spurt by Gary to win by one foot. Ron Kraft was the individual point leader for the most with 14 1/2 points. Ron won the high hurdles, the 440 yard dash, placed second in the high jump, and ran the first leg of the 880 relay.
