## Huskies Open Saturday

Never slighted by a low pre-season rating, Washington's football Huskies continue to show a growing optimism while the opening game with Idaho comes up this Saturday, September 17, in Husky Stadium.

Head Coach Jim Owens, whose smiles have been more frequent than usual on the practice field, has cut off a double daily work schedule as he prepares his charges for the annual Varsity battle.

Tired, but true, after a two-day grind, Washington appears ready to start with a better attitude than in previous years, which was the main subject of Owens' tough practice schedule.

Despite the improvements of the squad throughout the drills, Washington has been rated in the middle of the pack in the race for the AAUW Conference title, due mainly to the lack of an experienced quarterback and a speedy defense.

Although both facets of the Husky attack have yet to be put to the test, astute observation at work-ups has led to the belief that both problems should be solved—and solved in time to defeat the most highly regarded teams in the Northwest.

The signal calling duties have fallen into the hands of Junior Tom Spaulding, a Grants, Ore., native whose passing, running and dribbling on the field have proved steadily since the opening workout.

The Husky defense, which will be faced with the horrendous task of stopping Varsity fullback Gary McCall has set a goal of \$6,000.00 and again asks that everyone seriously consider FAIR SHARE.

The general chairman for the campaign is again, Art Metz who is ably assisted by the same Dave McDonald who has some strong help in the backfield, especially with special quarters John Ferrara, a 6-2, 200-pound letterman and halfback Joe McCollum (5-9, 165).

The Husky ship-ment, in-approachable size-wise to the V-dad's suffered a setback last week when Edmar Sorenson (5-11, 170 Junior) injured his neck and is expected to be out for the season.

Kickoff time for the Husky Stadium expected to be 2 p.m. Next week the Huskies take on the Air Force Falcons in Seattle.

### West End Democratic Club

It was Candidate Nio at the September meeting of the West End Democratic Club. All Democratic candidates for the local partisan positions were present except one.

Frank Feeley, Assessor; Alice Thorne, Auditor; and Norma Sorenson, Clerk, running unopposed for reelection all spoke briefly on the need for an enlarged Court House for more efficient operations of their offices.

Harley Bishop, one of the candidates for Sheriff, noted that he has been a police officer in Port Angeles since 1947 after a period of time in Bremerton. He stressed the need for recognition to improve efficiency in the department, the need for training of personnel, and more work in the area of search and rescue.

Forrest Reed, also a candidate for Sheriff, is from the Port Angeles Police Department, serving as Captain for 15 of his 22 years. He was retired a year ago. He also stressed the need for training because of the changing attitude towards law enforcement. He emphasized the need to be respected by the population before law enforcement can be effective. Mr. Reed likewise referred to the need for expansion of the search and rescue aspect of the office, noting that as a pilot he has participated in work of this nature.

Next to speak were candidates for Prosecuting Attorney: Nathan Richardson, the incumbent, spoke first. He reported that half of the activity of his office deals with the problems of non-support cases. He offered two testimonials of praise for the success of his office in enforcement.
