VFW News . . .

Veterans planning to attend schools and colleges this fall under the provisions of the new G. I. Bill were warned by John B. Kirisch, Manager of the Seattle Veterans Administration Regional Office, that they must first secure their certificate of eligibility from the VA.

Each veteran must apply for his certificate as his proof of eligibility to present to his college upon enrollment. Each veteran is also assigned a claim number which he will use in all correspondence with the VA concerning his rights and benefits under the law.

Back Country Safety Urged

"Once you enter the wilderness you must set a pace that your body can sustain hour after hour. Your roving eyes should search out the route ahead, checking landmarks and evidence of game. Upon travel will consume enormous amounts of body energy. Avoid overuse of lungs, heart and muscles. Many hunters advocate five steps and a long, slow look for sign of game."

Crab Fishing Extended

The presence of a good quantity of large, fine quality Dungeness crabs in coastal areas has allowed the Department of Fisheries to extend the Dungeness crab commercial fishing season an extra month with season to close October 15 instead of a previously scheduled closure on September 15. Season opened December 1, 1965.

Road Use Regulations Effective October 1

New road regulations by the Secretary of Agriculture will go into effect in the National Forests of Oregon and Washington Oct. 1. The regulations provided for haulers of non-federal products to bear a proportionate share of investment and maintenance on certain roads. Applicable roads will be assigned and signed as Special Service Roads. The rules of use will be posted on the roads and also will be legally advertised.

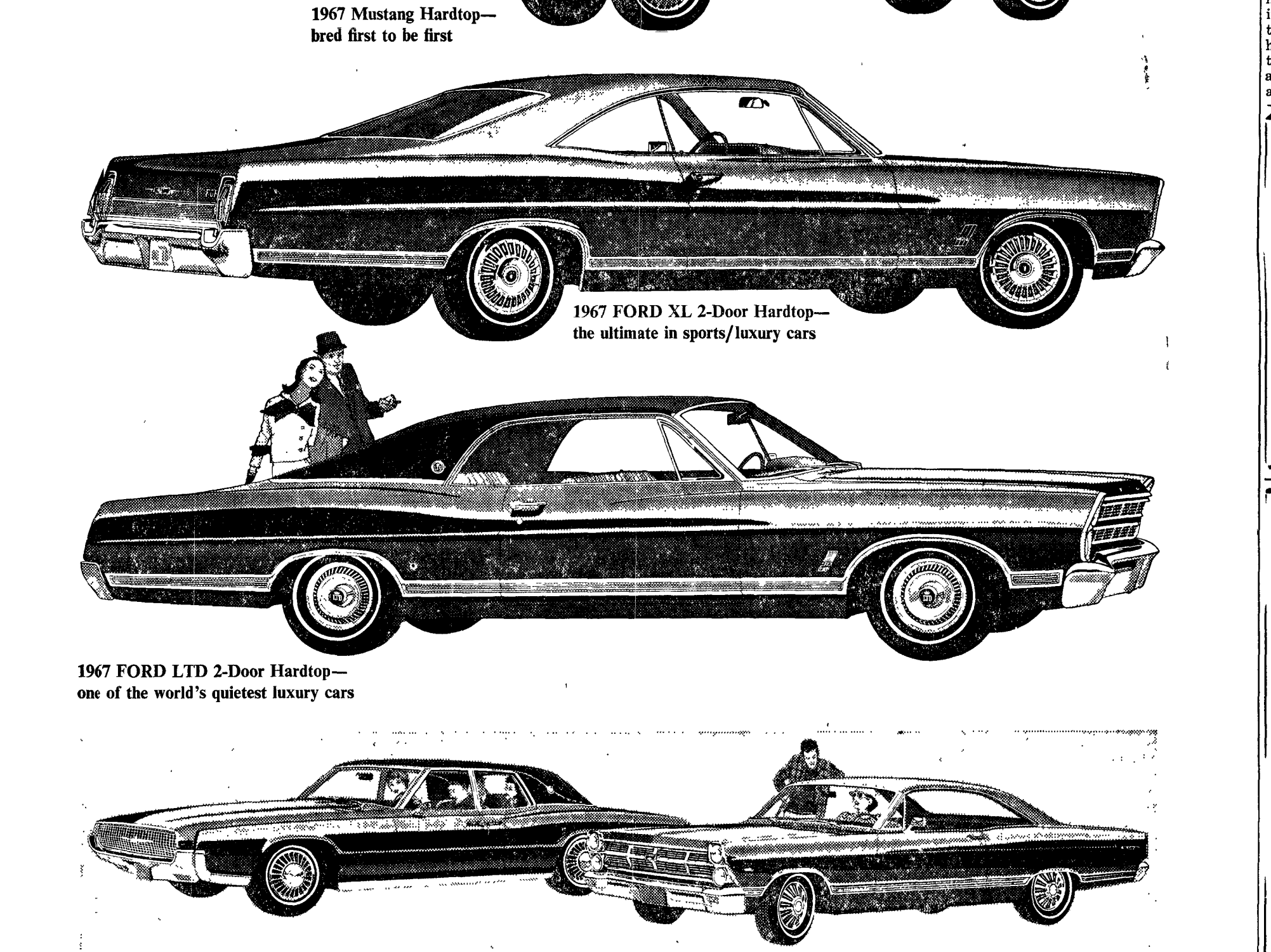
Teacher Travel

Teachers travel more than most people, according to the Washington Education Association. The WEA points out that the tens of thousands of teachers who are returning to school with the hundreds of thousands of students included many who have toured the world with cameras and curiosity. "What they learned as they traveled will pay off in classrooms across the state this school year."

Like anyone else, teachers bring home pictures, souvenirs, and handwork from other lands. Such items are often used in class to explain customs and characteristics of other peoples and other nations. "What a teacher learns as he travels may significantly add to classroom discussions of international affairs, for the teacher has had the opportunity to learn what it is like in other countries," says WEA President Gladys Perry. Mrs. Perry, a teacher at Seattle's North Beach Elementary School, spent part of the summer in Seoul, Korea, where she attended the annual convention of the World Confederation of Organizations of the Teaching Profession.

Teachers often travel as part of an educational tour for which they may receive college credit. They may travel to gain more competence in their subject area. They journey to where an idea was born or where history happened. And they return to their classrooms in the fall with a greater knowledge of our world and a keener interest in it.

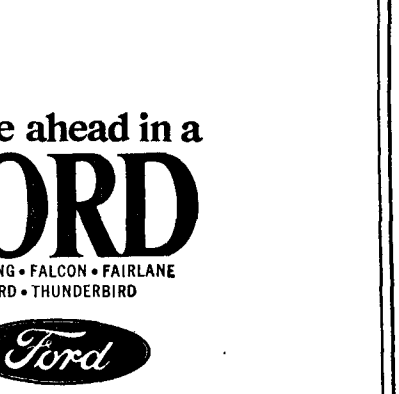
