

20 Parcels Of Timber to be Sold

Over 68 million board feet of state-owned timber will be offered for sale in 12 counties on December 27, as authorized by the Board of Natural Resources at its monthly meeting, Tuesday, November 1.

The 20 parcels of timber, appraised at \$1,055,241.50 will be sold at public auction, said State Lands Commissioner, Bert L. Cole.

Sales will be held in Clallam, Jefferson, Kittitas, Klickitat, Mason, Okanogan, Pacific, Pend Oreille, Skamania, Spokane, Stevens, Thurston and Yakima counties. The largest and most valuable sale is the South Fork Hoh No. 2 in Jefferson County, located about 32 miles by road south of Forks.

CLALLAM COUNTY — Upper Maxwell Creek—470,000 BF, appraised at \$184,260, located about 12 miles by road south of Forks. The sale will be held in the Forks District office.

JEFFERSON COUNTY — South Fork Hoh No. 2—629,000 BF, appraised at \$130,379.50, located about 31 miles by road south of Forks. Dimmie's Parties No. 1—1,929,000 BF, appraised at \$42,908, located about 19 miles by road south of Forks.

Both of these sales will be held in the Forks District office. Big Quilcene Sale—1,140,000 BF, appraised at \$25,880, located about 4 miles by road south of Quilcene. Ludlow Thinning No. 4—677,000

Log Exports Total 288 Million Bd. Ft. In 3rd Quarter

Softwood log exports total 288 million board feet, Scribner log sales in the third quarter of 1966, according to data currently being assembled by the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station for its quarterly marketing report, "Production, Prices, Employment, and Trade in Pacific Northwest Forest Industries." The report volume represents a 0.2 percent increase over second quarter shipments.

Log exports from the Washington Customs District were 198 million board feet, up 8.8 percent from the second quarter. In the Oregon Customs District, shipments increased by 1.7 percent to a third quarter total of 100 million board feet.

Japan received 91 percent of the total volume exported, or 263 million board feet. About 9 million board feet of the total shipments, or 3 percent, went to Canada.

Douglas-fir made up 10.2 percent of the total shipments, and Port Orford-cedar 3.9 percent. The remaining 85.9 percent was softwood species, primarily western hemlock and true firs.

The average value of all log exports fell slightly from the second quarter to a level of \$25.48 per thousand board feet. Douglas-fir averaged \$80.46 per thousand board feet, at \$80.46 per thousand board feet,

Salmon Are Returning

Chinook and coho (silver) salmon are returning by the thousands to the hatcheries and fall chinook egg requirements for hatchery rearing have already been obtained, Fisheries Director Tom C. Tollefson said.

In addition to an adequate egg supply for hatchery needs, stream areas above hatchery sites have been adequately seeded for natural spawning.

The total hatchery count for chinook stands at 61,088 fish and will not occur until mid-November. It is apparent that eggs needed for the upcoming hatchery rearing season are not adequate seed for natural spawning in the hatchery streams.

Preliminary catch figures on chinook indicate that the total will be nearly as good as last year's reports fell slightly from the second quarter to a level of \$25.48 per thousand board feet.

The records-managing spruce is easily accessible to public view. It grows a scant 1,600 feet off U. S. Highway 101, about 21 miles south of Forks on the second road to the right, a man-dwarfing 7.8 feet in diameter at DBH (Diameter Breast Height) 4 1/2 feet from the ground. Some 248 feet tall, the giant tree has a circumference of 56.5 feet and contains 60,000 board feet of lumber, enough for five houses.

Estimated to be about 600 years old, the Helen Clapp tree was sprouting from the sprongy forest floor about 100 years before Columbus first touched America. The spruce's background has touched the life of many station. Towering above all other trees in the upper Hoh valley, it is a forest landmark.

The king spruce deposes the former champion of its species, a Sitka spruce with a diameter of 14.4 feet. The Sitka spruce was even harvested along the Hoh River in the usual pioneers.

For the first time in the history of the Hoh River region, a cord tree, the famous "Queen of the Forest" 14.6 feet in diameter at DBH, with a circumference of 49.5 feet. The thousand-year-old tree, located in Olympic National Park, sparked a controversy with the state of Oregon, which claimed its status as a national tree.
