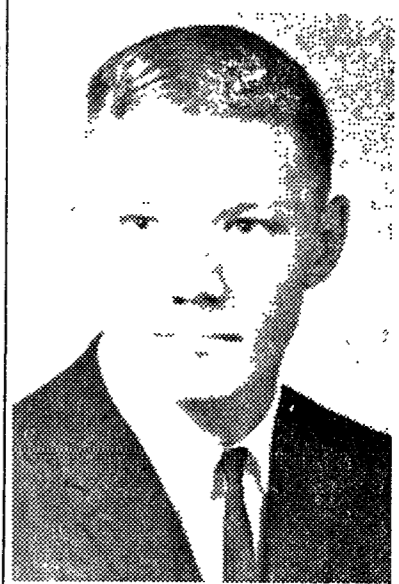

Residents of Forks, apprehensive of the seeming influx of cougars, recently met and urged that the cougar in that area be taken off the game animal list, declared a predator, and a \$75-\$100 bounty per head be placed on the big cat.

Recent State Game Commission action, while rejecting a bounty reinstatement as inefficient, did remove the bag limit on cougar for Clallam, Jefferson, Grays Harbor and Mason counties.

The cougar is classed a game animal in Washington, with a bag limit of one per year in all areas except as modified by this Commission action. Western Washington offers a year-round cougar hunting season, while Eastern Washington counties are closed to cougar hunting during the months of January, February, March and April only.

A regular hunting license is required of anyone hunting cougar, but no special tag or permit is necessary.
