The Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 will complete its second year of inclusion in the educational program of the Quillayute Valley School District. This Act is also referred to as Public Law 88-10 in its abbreviated form as ESEA.

FORKS FORESTRY EXPLORERS TOURS NURSERY

The Forestry Explorers Tour 4, Forks, journeyed to L. T. Webster State Forestry Nursery near Olympia Saturday, April 22. The boys and girls collected in a barrel. The seeds are devolved and cleaned in various shaking operations.
The seeds, about 40,000 per pound for Douglas fir, are enclosed in plastic bags and placed in board cylinders, then stored in a cold room kept at zero degree and 100% humidity. Careful tagging for identification of each lot of seed is necessary. Foresters use only seed of known locality of origin and nursery stock grown from such seed.

The seeds are planted in long beds. A farm tractor tows a special seed planting device which sets out the seeds 8 rows to the bed. The Webster Nursery is constantly being expanded to satisfy the needs of both private and public lands. The nursery has been expanded to nearly 200 acres. Present capacity is 40,000 seedlings.

The bulk of the trees grown are sold at 2 year olds, although transplants are available.

Approximately 35,000 bushels of cones were collected last fall for use at the nursery. The cones were placed on racks for proper air circulation in two long open storage sheds. Butler said they had the fattest squirrels in Thurston County raiding the cones at the nursery.

plants are becoming more and more popular. The Conference program is structured around the theme "THE ECONOMICS OF LOGGING", and several important problems related to the industry's economy will be discussed during panel discussions.

Recruitment and Training of Personnel, a major problem facing all industry today, will be the subject matter for a group of panelists made up of personnel managers representing four key northwest industries, the chairman continued.

A career film entitled, "Opportunities in Logging", developed by the Pacific Logging Congress for use by school counselors will be presented as a part of this panel presentation.

The term automation is not generally applied to logging operations, Buchmann stated, but a brief look at the progress through a few short years from the old horse-drawn falling saw and horse-drawn skidder, to the modern gasoline-powered chainsaw and heavy yarding equipment give ample notice that the industry plans to keep pace.
