BOUCE OF A FREE PRESS
No country has a press equal to that of the United States. The 10,000 smaller newspapers scattered over the length and breadth of the land represent a body of independent thought that is indispensable to the preservation of our economic and political liberty.

When the suggestion was made recently that the best interest of consumers might be served by more stringent regulation of advertising, no great imagination was needed to see the connection between restricted advertising and press censorship. The close relationship between advertising and the free press was presented recently by C. B. Dyke, writing in the Fairmount, N. D. Star. In his words, the home town newspaper reader "... wants his weekly to tell him about his friends, goings and comings, births, weddings, all sorts of local happenings and the neighborhood gossip ... But he also wants to see what his local merchants have to offer in their advertisements ... It costs money to put out a newspaper. Just like it costs money to run a grocery store, service station, garage or cafe. The major income is derived from Advertisers ... Everyone knows that Jones has a store in town, but they also like to see what he has to offer in his ad." Active advertisers are the foundation of the free press.

That is why freedom of the press is freedom of enterprise and the unrestricted right to advertise will all sink or swim together.

OUR BOYS IN THE SERVICE
Navy Ensign ROBERT F. HENRY, son of Mrs. Frank R. Henry of Forks, was involved in a gunfire exchange with shore installations near the mouth of the Song Ma River in Vietnam, aboard the guided missile armed destroyer USS Joseph Strauss.

His ship was providing coverage for the destroyer Hubbard, which was stopping enemy cargo and ammunition vessels moving south. Shore batteries opened fire on the destroyers, coming as close as 250 yards. The Strauss moved to avoid being hit as she opened fire with her five-inch fifty-four gunnights on targets in the vicinity of Sam Son.

After several minutes of firing, the Strauss moved seaward. As a result of the firing, two large shore batteries were destroyed and secondary explosions were observed.

REWARD OFFERED FOR ROBBERS
Thieves broke into Laffer's General Store sometime Sunday night, May 21 and absconded with several thousand dollars worth of valuable merchandise. Entry was gained by a broken back window. The robbers apparently operated with the night lights on, although amber curtains were covering the major portion of the front windows.

The valuable merchandise included a large amount of guns and ammunition.

Local police authorities are investigating the robbery. The Laffer's are offering a reward of \$250.00 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty persons.

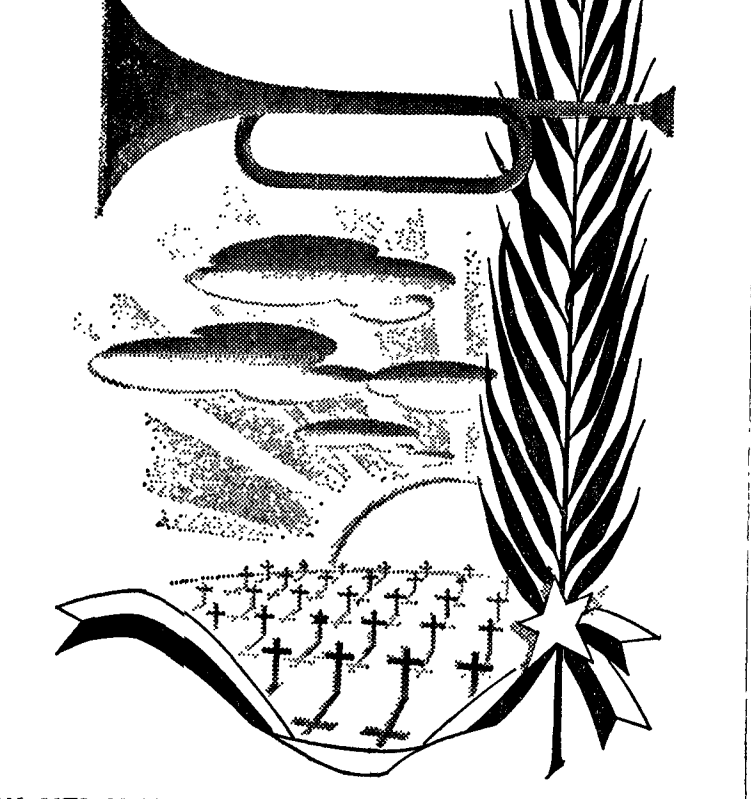
