June Sales Ends Fiscal Year 1967

The largest sale of state-owned timber during the past 12 months brought in over \$3 1/2 million in bids on June 26 and 27. The state Department of Natural Resources sold over 136 million board feet of timber in June.

More than a quarter of a million new flowers may be blooming in Washington and Oregon communities. The bids totaled \$5,688,375 for the 136,327,000 board feet sold. Five parcels of timber were not sold due to the lack of bidders.

The Heart Association does point out that a slim, non-smoking woman with low blood fats and no hypertension can have a heart attack. It is just that she has better chances of escaping.

The sharply defined portrait of the heart attack candidate is based on statistics compiled by a study that has been underway since 1945 in Framingham, Mass., where 5,400 residents are being observed over a 20-year period.

This portrait should be a cheering one, the Heart Association says. Anyone who recognizes himself in the picture can change everything but his sex. The way to drop out of the race toward heart attack is simple: Just Stop. That is, stop smoking cigarettes. Stop eating so much, particularly of fatty foods. And stop avoiding your doctor. He can help control high blood pressure.

Tax Commission Abolished

Departing from a procedure of 42 years, the new State Department of Revenue started operation July 1 applying the three-man Washington State Tax Commission, a department that was established under the regime of former Gov. Roland H. Hartley in 1924 when he made substantial changes in state government with the introduction at that time of the code department.

The Tax Commission is one of the last survivors of that era, and was abolished by the 1967 Legislature, the change to take effect with the start of the 1967-69 biennium, the state's fiscal period.

The new law provides that the head of the department will be designated as director and will have the full responsibility for the assessment and collection of all the taxes as well as the administration of all other programs formerly handled by the Tax Commission.

The change of the Department of Revenue also brings into existence the Group of three men, appointed by the governor, will sit as a quasi-judicial body to listen to appeals from the director's orders as well as appeals from county boards of equalization by assessors and property owners. Public utilities likewise may appeal from the director's determination on equalized assessed valuations.

Parties appealing decisions may ask for an informal or a formal hearing, which will be held according to such rules and procedures as the new board will promulgate. These will be announced as soon as the new board takes over and formally organizes.

At the same time the new Revenue Department also will be reorganized into a more efficient organization.

organization by streamlining its activities and more clearly defining the lines of authority. The director will be responsible for the entire operation of the department. Under the new arrangement there will be seven divisions, each to be headed by an assistant director for the administration. The new divisions will be research and information staff services, field operations, office operations, interpretation and appeals, property tax and inheritance tax.

In a further tightening of the organization, the department will be divided into three geographic regions. The Seattle regional office will comprise the counties of Northwest Washington, the Tacoma office will be composed of the Southwest, Washington and Eastern Washington and the Spokane office will be composed of the Central and Eastern Washington and each of these offices will report directly to the assistant director of the field operations division.

The local offices in the various other cities of the state will remain as they have been in the past. A further explanation of the new law shows that when parties have been assessed what they feel is an unjust tax they may first ask the director for a review of their case. If they still feel aggrieved they may go to the Board of Tax Appeals either on a formal or an informal basis, the choice to be either the revenue department's or the taxpayer's. If an informal hearing is held and the taxpayer wants to appeal to the superior court, he must first prepare his own record as though he were starting his original action there. If a formal hearing has been held before the appeals board, a stenographic report will have been made by a court reporter at the board hearing, and the record made before the board will be the basis of the court hearing.

In the event there is a hearing on the record it will be held before the board. No further witnesses may be heard, no further exhibits may be introduced and the parties must confine their arguments to what is in the record of the board hearing. Both these types of appeal come, of course, only after the taxpayer's director has given his decision on a review, but the taxpayer may bypass both the director and the appeals board and go directly into court. However, the tax must first be paid before going to court.
