Many Employers Confused

Many employers in the ten Western States are confused when they receive a bill from the Internal Revenue Service for quarterly with-holdings.

These employers purchased depository receipts from their banks for withheld social security taxes. They filed the required Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, Form 941 on time, but retained the depository receipts for their records.

Form 941 calls for these depository receipts to be attached to the return, thus validating the credit claimed for taxes deposited.

Forms 941 filed without all depository receipts caused the computers to generate notices and bills for what appears to be an unpaid liability.

Taxpayers receiving such notices or bills should promptly respond by forwarding the retained depository receipts with a copy of the original correspondence to the Internal Revenue Western Service Center, Ogden, Utah.
