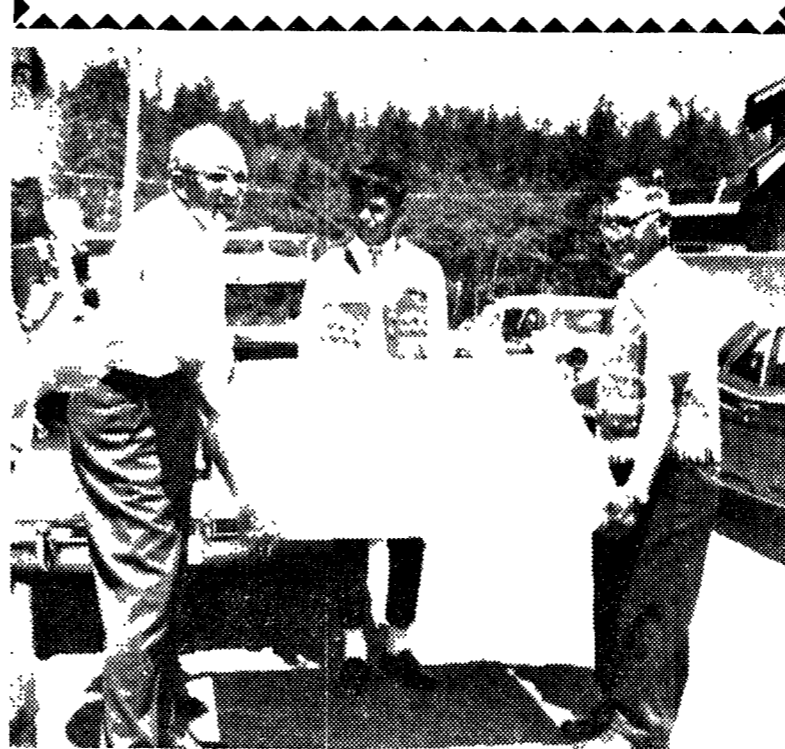

Summer Care of Tires

A warning against letting some of the air out of your tires when they are hot comes from the Rubber Manufacturers Association which says under-inflation could result when the tires cool down. The RMA recommends that you have inflation checked once a month, for pressures listed in the owner's manual for your car. Have the checking done only when the tires are cool. For sustained driving at high speeds, as on turn-pikes, the RMA says pressures can be increased to four pounds over the recommendations in the owner's manual.

State-Owned Timber Sales Approved

Doubling up, the Board of Natural Resources approved the sales of state-owned timber for September and October at its monthly meeting Tuesday, August 1. The combined totals of the sales are 71.7 million board feet, valued at \$19 million.

State Land Commissioner Bert L. Cole explained the board acted on two monthly sales since no meeting was held in July. The board normally meets each month and considers the sale of state-owned timber for the succeeding month.

The September sale offers 20 parcels of timber, totaling 39,360,000 board feet, appraised at \$11,120,145. The timber is located in 12 counties and the sales will be held on September 11 and 12.

The October sale offers 32,383,000 board feet in 14 parcels, cover-

ing nine counties. The timber is valued at \$8,242,003. The sales will be held October 2 and 3.

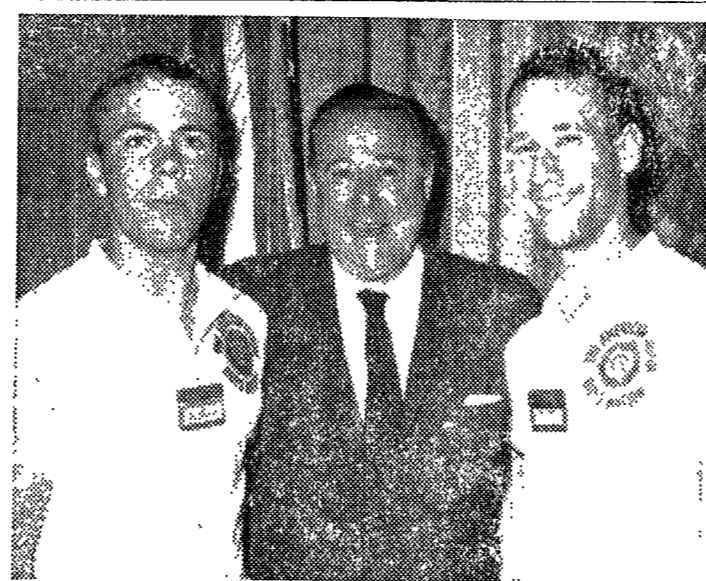

STRESS WHEN UNDERWATER

Skin diving enthusiasts are gaining thousands of new recruits each summer. Thousands of Americans of all ages and both sexes are spending summer weekends exploring lakes and streams from the vantage of the fishes.

From the medical standpoint, physicians say that diving makes demands on the body which are unlike those met above the surface. Navigating under water is heavy exertion and those with respiratory problems or heart and blood vessel disease should not attempt it, says today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. Diving is ruled out for those with

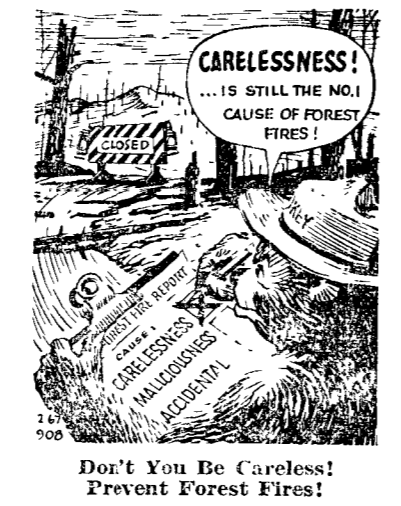
perforated ear drums. Ear plugs are for surface swimming only and should not be used for diving because of water pressure. The depth changes also requires that sinuses and ears be in good shape to equalize the pressure. Asking your doctor to evaluate your fitness for diving is a precaution that will pay dividends. Along with good health, the potential diver should be a better than average swimmer. A moderately skilled swimmer can dive with SCUBA equipment, but in an emergency it's swimming skills born of long practice and good physical conditioning may mean the difference between survival and death.

Never dive alone, the AMA advises. Use a buddy system and be certain that your buddy is competent and trustworthy. Learn to use artificial respiration and see that your buddy knows it. Plan your dives. Know where you're going, how deep and how long you can stay under. Work out a system of underwater communication signals for emergencies. Never dive when you are overly tired, have a cold or are just not feeling well.

Use quick release buckles on weight belts or SCUBA harness. You may need to cut loose and surface quickly. Don't indulge in horseplay and take needless risks. Watch out for boats while in the water. The power boat skipper may not know you're there, have a cold or are just not feeling well.

Watch your depth. Pressures mount rapidly as you descend. Don't hold your breath while ascending. Air will expand inside your lungs and should be allowed to bubble out as you are coming up.

The former Olave Soames and Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of Scouting, were married in 1912. Traveling extensively with her husband on behalf of Scouting, Lady Baden-Powell has continued her active role in the world-wide development of Guiding and Scouting for more than 50 years. In 1959 she was acclaimed as World Chief Guide at the World Conference held at Foleshill, England.

After her husband's death in 1941 Lady Baden-Powell took up residence at Hampton Court Palace in London where King George VI, in gratitude for Lord Baden-Powell's services to his country, offered her a "Grace and Favour" apartment.

As World Chief Guide, Lady Baden-Powell continues her world-wide travels on the behalf of the movement. For her tireless efforts, she has been honored by many nations. Compensation Funds Highest In 56-Year History

The financial level of the Workmen's Compensation Funds administered by the Department of Labor and Industries are the highest in the 56-year history of Washington's Industrial Insurance Act, announced Harold J. Petrie, Director of the Department, in a report issued this week to Washington State Legislators.

"Having collected over \$60,000,000 in premiums this past fiscal year, our reserves now stand in excess of \$154,000,000," Petrie stated.

Accompanying the written report were detailed charts which illustrated the unparalleled growth in both premium collections and reserve balances.

The report points up two of the more unique characteristics of this State's Workmen's Compensation program: one, Washington State Employers pay only 85% of the total premium dollar, and two, earnings from investments are plowed back into the funds and thereby contribute to the maintenance of relatively low premium levels.

Petrie concluded by making particular note of the fact that of every premium dollar paid to the Department, 102.5¢ is available for the payment of benefits to injured workmen.

Hitch Up Your Trailer Safely

The growing popularity of trailers makes it important that drivers be properly informed concerning their use, warns the Alstate Motor Club, and offers these helpful tips:

1. Make sure you have the right hitch for the job. Use a frame hitch in preference to a bumper hitch. Attach safety chains in case the hitch fails and the trailer breaks loose.
2. Make certain all lights and turn signals work correctly. Check these times before you start out. If you rent the trailer, have the attendant show you how they work.
3. Load the trailer correctly. Using the "60-40" principle—60 per cent of the weight is on the front half of the trailer and 40 per cent is on the back.
4. Check tire pressures on both the car and the trailer.
5. Check your car before you start. Tell the serviceman you are going on a trip and will be pulling a trailer. Tires, springs, shock absorbers, oil and transmission should be thoroughly checked.
6. Inspect the entire hookup each time you stop.
7. Other points to remember: Make sure you have complete insurance protection while you are using the trailer. Remember your new length and weight with a trailer. Allow enough passing room and don't use brakes too much. Steer firmly but gently. Keep the trailer in good mechanical condition, and never let anyone ride in it.

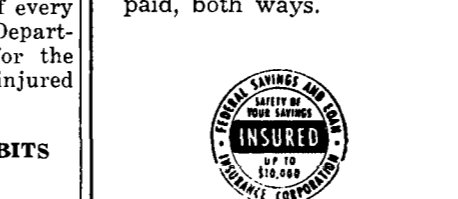

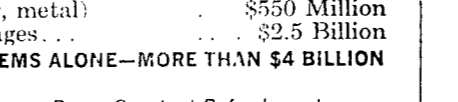
