QUILLAYUTE VALLEY SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 5th

Tuesday, September 5, will be the first day of school this year for the students of the Quillayute Valley School District at Forks. The first day will be in session for a full day, beginning at 7:30 a.m. FREE-REGISTRATION URGENT

It is urgently requested that pupils new to the area or who have not previously attended school here, or who did not pre-register last spring should do so during registration days. This is necessary in order to have class organization and supplies in readiness. Students are urged to do so at the school office of the high school building which will be open for registration 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, August 30 and 31. High school students who are employed during the day may register Thursday evening from 7 to 8 p.m.

GRADE SCHOOL REGISTRATION
 Pre-registration for last year's kindergarten pupils will be in the first grade was completed last spring. Those students new to the district or who did not register last spring must do so during August 29-31 at the Forks Elementary School office, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in order to save time and confusion on the first day of school.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES REQUIRED
 Birth certificates will be required for new enrollees, especially for those entering kindergarten and first grade. Hospital certificate or other proof of birth may be made the first couple of weeks of school.

The morning kindergarten session will be held at 10:30 a.m. and the youngsters will be transported home at that time. Children in the first three grades in the morning shift will conclude their classes at about 10:45 and will be bussed home then unless the majority of the parents on the run wish their youngsters to stay and take part in the lunch program. This decision has already been made by the parents in the Quillayute Prairie and La Push areas who wish their children to remain. They will be fed and their bus will leave at about 12:30 p.m. A questionnaire will be sent home to the other runs to determine the wish of the parents in this regard.

Children from the feeder Forks area will be attending kindergarten which will begin at about 12:00 noon. Their classes will begin at about 12:30 p.m. except for the kindergarten which will begin at about 12:45 p.m. The above information has to do with those who would be transported under normal circumstances. Those who would normally walk will still be expected to walk.

 Telephones in the La Push and Quillayute Prairie areas were out of service temporarily on Sunday, August 13, the service interruption resulted from cable failure near the Quillayute Air Field.

The cable which contains all circuits serving La Push and the Quillayute Area was disabled due to apparent damage from shotgun pellets.

F Peninsula Telephone Company repairmen traced the trouble and made repairs as quickly as possible. The affected circuits were restored to service by 4:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Clallam County Receives Largest Share Income
 Nineteen counties divided up almost \$15 million in Federal Representative of Natural Resources for fiscal year 1967. The money is based on income produced from county-owned lands managed by the state in 19 counties.

State Land Commissioner Bert L. Cole reported today the income produced from county trust and fee title lands approached the \$1 1/2 million mark for the second consecutive year. In Fiscal Year 1967, the total distributed to the counties was \$1,488,209 and in Fiscal Year 1966, \$1,480,259.

The Department of Natural Resources manages two types of land for the counties—county trust and fee title with a certain percentage of the income returned to the counties. The income producing activities on these county-owned lands include timber sales, Christmas trees and other minor forest products sales, agricultural leases and sales of sand and gravel. The county commissioners determine the final distribution of each county's share. Primarily the counties use the funds for schools, roads and county governmental operations.

The Department of Natural Resources manages 629,956 acres of county trust and fee title lands. Historically, most of the acreage was acquired by the counties during the depression years as tax delinquent property. Commissioner Cole explained.

Clallam and Skagit counties received the largest share of the income during Fiscal Year 1967. Clallam county received \$545,299 and Skagit county, \$266,863. Thurston county was the third largest recipient with \$156,736.

 Bible School at the First Congregational Church will begin on Monday, August 21st at 9 a.m. There will be classes for children from 4 years old through the eighth grade. Anyone is welcome to attend. Classes will be held from 9 to 11:30 each morning, and the parents are urged to have their children at the church on time. No classes will be held on Saturday or Sunday, August 26th and 27th, but the school will continue through Thursday, August 31st. There will be an evening program presented by the students on the last day of Bible School, and it will be held in the church sanctuary, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

All of the classes will be studying materials which deal with "Living in God's World." Students will learn about creation and the beauty and mystery of nature. Some field trips are planned so that some of the marvels of nature as they exist right here can be discovered.

This was a paid advertisement, but it was not paid for by the government or the Job Corps. It was purchased by the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, one of the many private enterprise sponsors of Job Corps Centers across the country.

Why is business interested in helping young men and women through the sponsorship of Job Corps camps? Do they make a profit out of it? No, they don't.

Yes, there is a small profit they make as a contractor operating a camp. But they could earn more the same with their money if they simply put it in a savings account.

It is their self-interest. Sure, they are interested in the well-being of the young man, "like most other Corpsmen," he's a school dropout.

Thousands of paperbacks of all kinds were made available, and now boys who never read a book before are reading two or more a week.
