## The Walter Mason To Be Honored

Seaman Recruit CLIFFORD H. SCHOLLS JR., USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Mason of La Push, was graduated from eight weeks of basic training at the Coast Guard Recruit Training Center.

Guided by experienced Coast Guard senior petty officers during his training, he studied the fundamentals of such military and naval subjects as seamanship, infantry drill, shipboard procedures, and at-sea survival techniques. The basics of military customs and courtesies, and familiarization with the Coast Guard's mission and responsibilities polished the skills he needed to make the transition from civilian to Coast Guardsman.

The Coast Guard is part of the Transportation Department and is the United States' major maritime safety organization.

Bullerman Third Class KENNETH L. CRUSE, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Cruse of Star Route One, and husband of the former Miss June E. Quimby, all of Forks, is serving aboard the destroyer tender USS Frontier which is deployed to San Francisco.

## Buy Bonds For Christmas

The sale of U. S. Savings Bonds in Washington State in October amounted to \$4 million 229 thousand. This is an increase over September sales but still leaves 1967 sales of about \$6 million in the state about 5% below the same period in 1966.

Sales in the county were \$35,540 according to volunteer chairman James E. Phillips. Nationally, Savings Bonds sales for October were \$404 million and for the first ten months of the year were \$4 billion, 172 million.

"With the advent of the Christmas season," the chairman said, "sales will be aided by citizens buying Bonds as Christmas gifts. Banks are stocking supplies of free gift envelopes to hold these Bonds. Among those who traditionally buy Bonds for Christmas gifts are parents who give them to children to help in future education, a family gift to start building a nest egg for future emergencies, and companies which give Bonds to employees as holiday bonuses."
