Report On Reducing Tolls

Representative Paul Conner (D-Port Angeles) said today the Legislative Joint Committee on Highways has asked the State Toll Bridge Authority for a report on reducing tolls on the Hood Canal Bridge.

"I will be the experience that has taken place in increased use of the Hood Canal Bridge, it seems proper at this time that a report be made on the feasibility of reducing the tolls," the Port Angeles legislator said.

"We have to take a realistic look at the need for revenues to pay off the bridge and the ferry system. However, the increased revenues of \$15 million for the ferry system this past year should indicate that there may be room for reducing the tolls and at the same time retain the needed revenue to pay off the bonds."

Representative Conner said such a study may indicate that a reduction in tolls could increase traffic on the bridge to a point where the revenue level for refunding the bonds would not be affected.

The Joint Committee on Highways, of which Representative Conner is a ranking member, acted favorably on his request for a study by the Toll Bridge Authority at its meeting in Seattle, November 24. Senator Al Henry (D-White Salmon) said the Toll Bridge Authority will be directed to make the study immediately.

Your Aching Back—TO PREVENT THOSE PAINS, STRAIGHTEN UP AND RELAX

Oh, my aching back! How often have you heard someone say that? Or said it yourself? Backache is such a common ailment among civilized men that there are very few adults who haven't had a touch of it now and then.

Some physicians credit soft beds, soft chairs and other comforts of modern civilization with an increase in the number of persons who suffer from low back pain, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Once called lumbago, back pain is often caused by poor posture, obesity, ill-fitting or inappropriate shoes, a sedentary life, overly strenuous work or participating in sports. It may also be due to disease not directly relating to the back or to injury or strain.

Good posture of the entire body is important in preventing low back with the cause. When it's due to pain. Sit with the head, shoulders strain, usually rest, heat and a pain reliever will help. Massage, used in the spine should be straight. Not the military "ramrod" posture, but comfort. Your doctor may also suggest:

- A soft, saggy bed and low, soft chairs contribute to backache. Improve posture.

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THE Car's On Fire! What Should You Do?

A sudden fire in a moving automobile can create a panic. One moment everything is fine; the next moment smoke and flames are pouring from under the hood or the interior of the car, generally the upholstery.

"Good housekeeping is essential in a car as well as at home," advises Kent Stoner, regional representative of the Allstate Motor Club. "An auto fire should be kept under control. If it occurs it can be controlled. The main thing is to remain calm and extinguish the fire.

"However, if the fire is in the gas tank area, in the trunk of the car or in the rear, it is important to get out of the car as quickly as possible. Let the fire department handle it. It is in the case of any fire anywhere—home or highway—a fire department should always be called at the earliest possible moment by whatever means are available."

With the appearance of fire or evidence of fire, steer the car off the road and out of traffic. For engine fires turn off the ignition immediately. If you have a fire extinguisher in the car, use it. 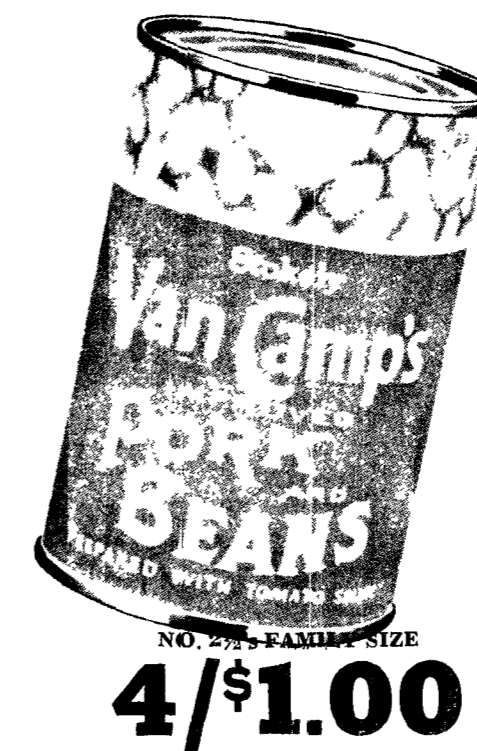

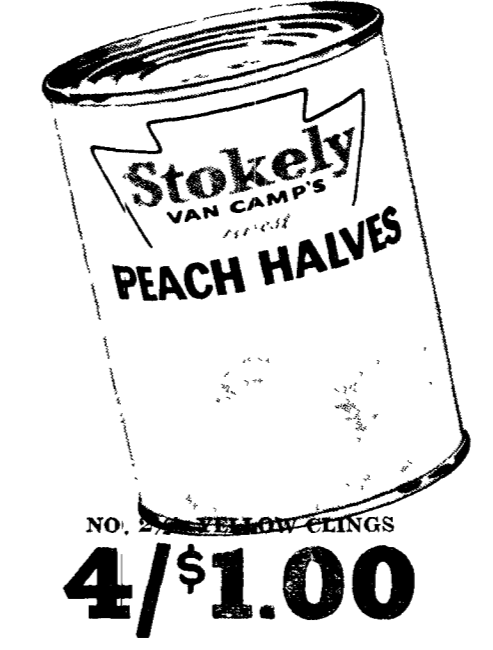
