DEPRESSANTS — Identification of Barbiturates — Barbiturates are known to drug abusers as bars, candy, goofballs, sleeping pills or pe-ruts. Specific types are often named after their color or shape. For example, yellow capsules are known to abusers as yellow jackets, or nickies. Red capsules are known as reds, pinks, red birds, red pills, seggy, and so on. Red and blue capsules are known as rainbows, red and blues, or double bubble. Solid blue capsules are known to abusers as blues, blue birds, blue devils, or blue heaven.

FIRST DAY: nervousness, headaches, anxiety, nose twitching, tremor, weakness, insomnia, nausea, changes in blood pressure, and increasing discomfort as the day progresses.

SECOND AND THIRD DAYS: Convulsions—dangerous and possibly fatal; mental confusion, delirium, hallucinations, and exhaustion.

The Ranger arrived in Subic Bay in time for the New Year's holiday. Many crewmen took the opportunity to visit Manila and other areas of the island during the in-port stay.

The carrier launches its aircraft primarily at supply routes and transportation points in North Vietnam to help impede the flow of supplies to the south.

Washington State's Game Department has just completed thirty-five years of operation in perpetuating the wildlife and providing hunting and fishing opportunity for the people of the state.

The official birthday was last Sunday, January 21. It was on that date in 1933 that the first Game Commission was sworn into office by Governor C. D. Martin. The Game Commission was and is a body of six men appointed by the governors of the state to set seasons, establish policies, and appoint the director of the State Game Department.

The agency was established through passage of Initiative No. 62, one of five initiatives presented to the voters at a general election on November 5, 1962.

Initiative 62 as passed by the voters, created a single state department to administer the game and game fish resources and completed a separation of food fishery management (salmon) and the management of game species.
