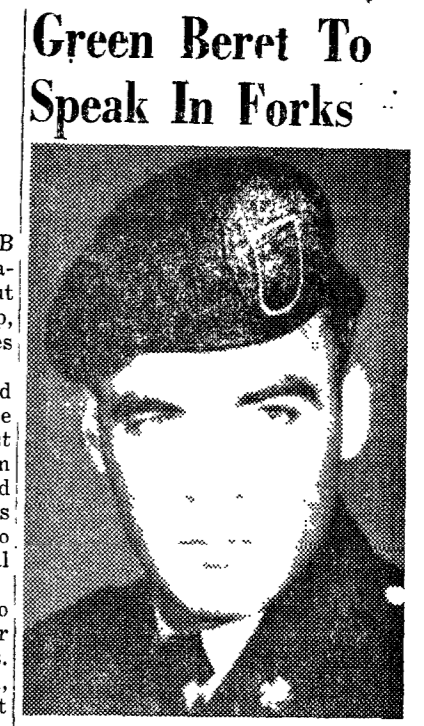

His subject will be THE VIET CONG AT HOME AND ABROAD. Volunteering for service in 1960, Davidson received extensive training at Fort San Houston, Texas, Fort Benning, Georgia, and Fort Bragg, North Carolina. He specializes in medicine, but also was required to be proficient in guerrilla warfare, demolitions, counter-insurgency, including qualification as a parachute jump master. By 1963, along with the eleven other "Green Berets" that go to make up a team, he found himself in the middle of the famous "War Zone 4" which was then dominated by the terrorist forces of the Viet Cong. What he has to tell about the trails and frustrations that this small, elite unit of the U.S. Army Special Forces had to undergo in order to bring home to you this test bank knowledge qualifies him to answer such questions as "What is the National Liberation Front?" **NEDT Tests To Be Held**  
More than 800 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th grade Forks Junior and High School students will take the three-hour National Educational Development Tests (NEDT) on February 26, 27, 28, and 29, according to James A. Traver, Principal. "The NEDT batteries," James Traver said, "is a series of tests in English, social studies, mathematics, natural sciences, and word usage designed to measure each student's ability to apply basic learning skills rather than his ability to memorize facts. We will use the test to help students parents, and teachers identify in each student's educational development and in making a realistic appraisal of his educational and vocational goals." Published by Science Research Associates, Inc., the nation's largest commercial publisher of standardized tests, the NEDT batteries has been administered to more than five million students throughout the country since it was introduced in 1959.
