Things here don't seem too bad as long as you don't think about home. The weather is starting to warm up. It rained only one night and the rest of the time has been fast Show, Vagabond.

The people are pretty friendly and seem to be very nice. They are hard working, but it takes a while to get them to understand what you want them to do. Most of them have names like Soe, Choi, Kim, Lee, and short names like that.

One of the guys I bunk with is a Korean (Korean soldier). He has a book to learn English and I have one to learn Korean so we help each other out with pronunciation.

Korean is a very difficult language to learn because it has so many characters. Some of the Koreans speak fairly good English but the G. I.'s don't speak any Korean.

While I was out on one of the ranges, I saw something that reminded me of what Mom always told us kids. We were on the range and there were some Koreans outside the barbed wire fence which surrounds the range. They were selling us little things they had made or anything we would buy. Well, when we ate show, they all got out a pan and pushed it through the fence for us to put our garbage in. As I sat there eating and looking at them looking at their pans, waiting for us to dump our leftovers in them, it almost made me lose my appetite. I got to thinking about how Mom always told us that people overseas would love to have the food that we throw away, and I realized it wasn't just a bunch of talk. Just remember that all the things you have shouldn't be taken for granted: the people over here haven't even seen some of the things you use everyday.

About the enclosed pictures. One is of a village outside our compound. You can see the grass huts they live in. In the foreground are rice paddies. They cover Korea.

In the next picture, beside me, are my two chingos, Choi and Shim.

The last picture is of Musance, a rather large village. This is more or less the shopping center. I went down there with Shim and Choi and went through the stores and we went and had some Ram-yun. Ram-yun is a Korean food much like noodle soup. I ate it with chop

### Dental Care For Honorably Discharged Vets

Full mouth dental care should be based on up to 90 days of service. That application should be made within one year after separation from the service and that treatment be completed within 24 months from the date of discharge. Other recommendations emanating from the conference and approval of entitlement to service connection for all honorably discharged veterans is one of six proposals approved by the recommendations committee at the 4th annual American Legion National Rehabilitation Conference held recently. mittee stipulated that such dental care should be based on up to 90 days of service. That application should be made within one year after separation from the service and that treatment be completed within 24 months from the date of discharge. Other recommendations emanating from the conference and approval of entitlement to service connection for all honorably discharged veterans is one of six proposals approved by the recommendations committee at the 4th annual American Legion National Rehabilitation Conference held recently. In its recommendation, the com-

War II and Korean War veterans are furnished this benefit. (Pursuant to the Law 90-77 provided that for a Vietnam veteran to be entitled to assistance toward the purchase of an automobile, it must be shown that the entitling disability or disability is the result of a service-connected factor of military service. This restrictive feature does not apply to World War II and Korean War veterans.) Also, it is recommended that the amount of monetary assistance be increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000. Since The American Legion was unsuccessful in its efforts to implement Res. 191 of the 1967 National

Convention through administrative action, it is recommended that the organization now sponsor and support legislation to provide assistance toward the purchase of an automobile for widows of those war veterans who die of a service-connected disease or injury after separation from active duty with the armed forces. The National Rehabilitation Commission is presently mandated (Res. 250, 1966 Convention) to oppose the reduction of VA burial benefits in those instances where a deceased veteran is entitled to more than one federal burial benefit.
