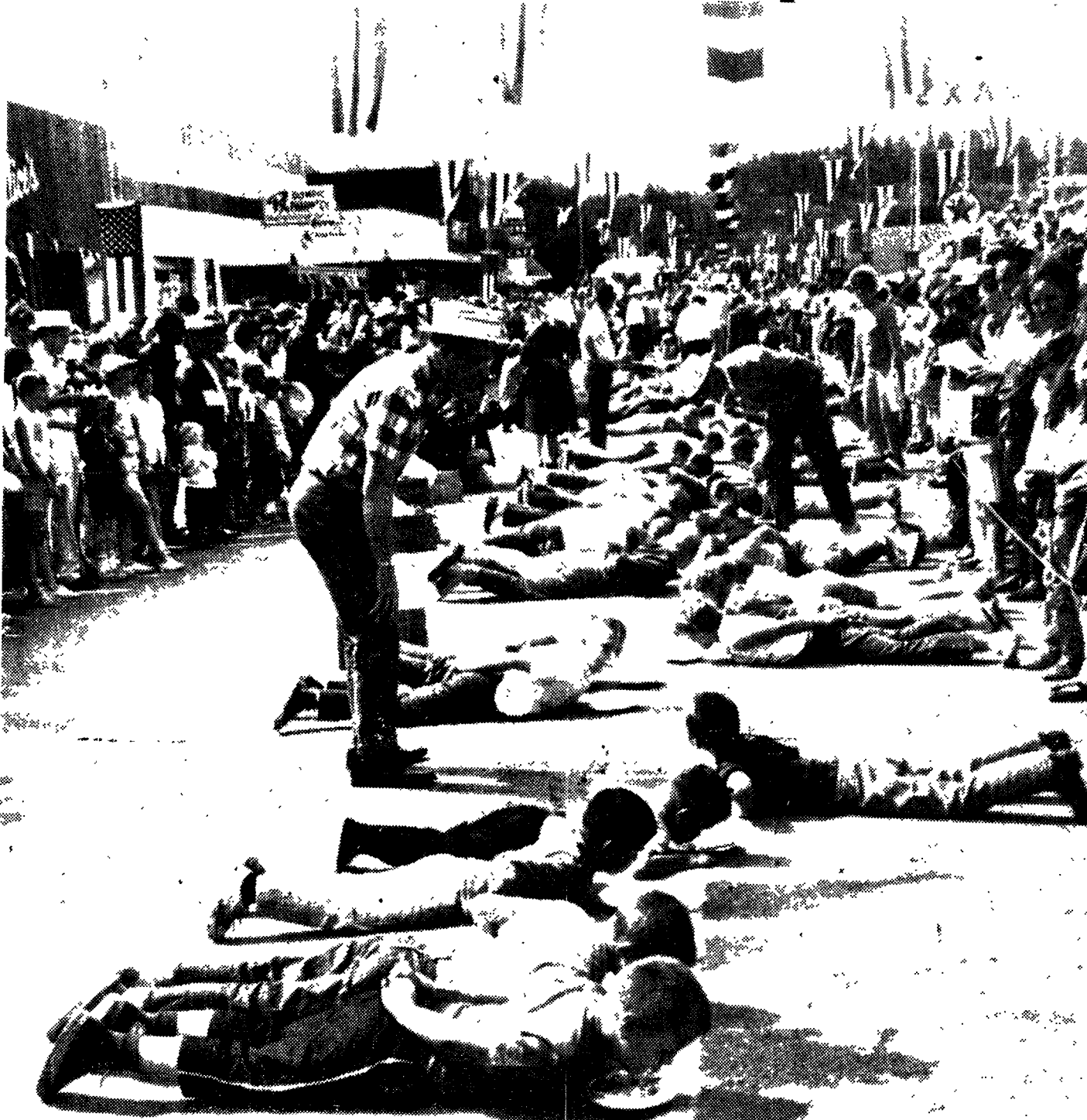

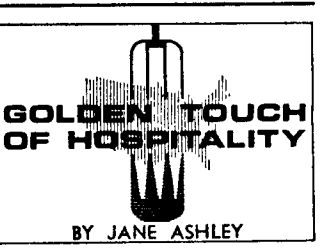

**Peninsula T&T Announces Rate Revision**

Peninsula Telephone and Telegraph Company, Forks, Washington, has announced that effective July 1, 1968, there will be a revision in intrastate long distance rate periods. This revision means long distance calls made between two points in Washington State will be rated according to the same rate periods which are now in effect for interstate calls.

As of July 1, 1968, the day rate will apply from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday; the evening rate from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday; and the night rate from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. every day. In addition, the night rate will be in effect all day Saturday and Sunday. The revision does not affect the "Open for 8:00 After Ten" plan which provides a person with ten minutes of calling for \$1.00 after 10:00 p.m. seven days a week as long as the call is to a station-to-station.

In addition to the changed rate periods, two more days have been added to the lower holiday rate schedule. July 4th and Labor Day will now carry the low night rate. Other holiday rate days are Christmas Day, New Years Day, and Thanksgiving Day.



It's Strawberry Sauce  
As a switch from strawberry shortcake, make a fresh strawberry sauce to serve over ice cream or sponge cake.

**Fresh Strawberry Sauce**  
1 pint fresh strawberries  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1 tablespoon corn starch  
1/2 cup water

Red food coloring, optional  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
Wash and hull berries. Cut up enough to make 1 1/2 cups; mash, mix with sugar and then starch and water. Combine with corn syrup. Blend corn with mashed berries in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened and clear. Add a few drops food coloring, if desired. Cool. Cut about half the remaining berries in two. Sprinkle lemon juice over whole and halved berries; add to cooled mixture. Chill until serving time. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

**Circus Coming June 28th**

The true American Circus, complete with Big Top, Wild Animal Menagerie, Tying banisters, sawdust and pink lemonade will be on hand when the Carlon & Barnes Tying Wild Animal Circus makes its appearance in Forks on Friday, June 28th at 8:00 p.m. The first performance occurred at 8 and 9 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Forks Lions Club.

The show travels in a convoy of giant trucks and trailers and carries an administrative and working crew of over two hundred people. The circus, modern circus, the big show, has been completely rebuilt and modernized to make possible the handling of such a large project which normally exhibits seven days a week. In seven different towns and during the forty week season which will take them from their opening stand in northern Texas to over thirty states and three Canadian provinces and back to the Texas Gulf Coast where the show will go into winter quarters to make ready for their 1969 season.

The show is on its 68 annual tour and carries about every type of circus act, including many animal acts and personalities that have appeared on Hollywood television series on CBS-TV network, "Sly King", otherwise known as Kirby Grant. The funds derived from the circus sponsor the Little League program according to the Lions Club Board of Directors.

**Savings Bond Purchases Up**

The purchase of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in the State of Washington increased sharply in April, according to James E. Phillips, Volunteer Savings Bonds Chairman. He points out that this increase occurred a full month before the new high interest rates on Savings Bonds had been announced.

A total of \$5 million 780 thousand bought in the state during the month shows a gain of over 13 per cent above sales in April, 1967. In contrast, national sales of \$426 million are only 2.79 per cent above the figures for the same month last year. According to the chairman, sales in the county amounted to \$33,078.

On May 31, President Johnson announced an increase in the rates paid on all Savings Bonds, new and old. E and F Bonds bought after June 1 will earn 4 1/2 per cent when held to maturity. This is the highest rate allowed by the law, and the increase is paid in the form of a bonus at maturity.

**Savings Bonds Bought June 1**

Savings Bonds bought before June 1 are also increased the same amount for interest accruing after June 1, and their increase will be realized at their next maturity date. Thus, all Savings Bonds outstanding back to the first issued in 1941 have been improved and it will be unnecessary to cash them to benefit from the increased interest rates.

The new Freedom Shares, first issued in May of 1967, have had their rate increased to 5 per cent when held to maturity. And new Freedom Shares may be bought "over the counter" in conjunction with an equal or greater face value of E Bonds.

### AROUND THE HOUSE

Exterior Decorating

A total of forty pupils will be enrolled in the two daily classes. The class times will be from 8:00-10:00 a.m. and 10:15-12:15. Materials will be provided by the program.

The art program at Forks Elementary School is made possible through Public Law 89-10, Title 1 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

### Peninsula College Commencement

Peninsula College will hold its sixth commencement, Friday, June 14, at 8:00 p.m. in the college gym. The public is invited to attend.

Dr. Dale E. Turner, University Congregational Church in Seattle, will present the commencement address to 95 graduating students. Dr. Turner graduated from Yale Divinity School in 1943 and received his Doctor's degree from West Virginia Wesleyan in 1955.

He spent the summer of 1961 working in the slums of Tokyo, Japan and in 1963, Dr. Turner preached a mission in Great Britain. He has spoken before numerous service organizations, high schools and colleges, and is a member of the board of the Metropolitan Y.M.C.A. Goodwill Industries, and Neighborhood House. Dr. Turner began work as a minister at University Congregational Church in 1958.

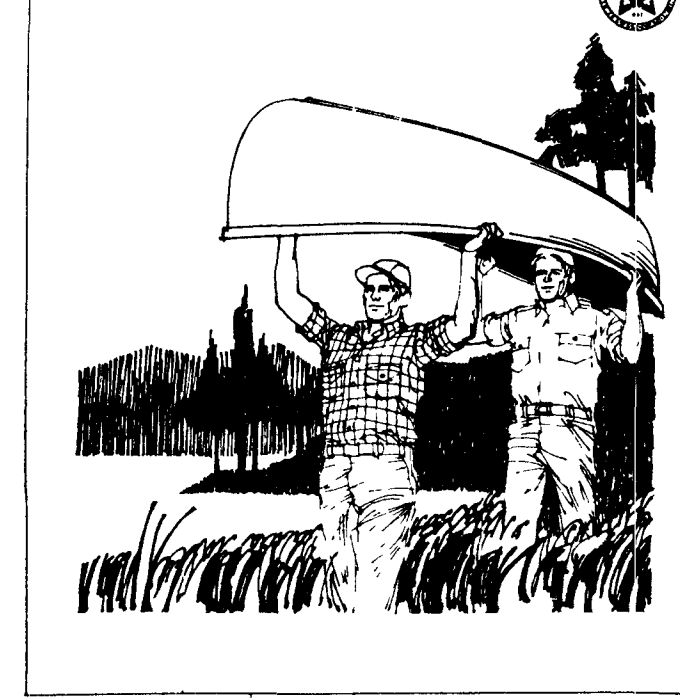

Announces

School Grant

Queets Clearwater School District No. 20 has been allocated \$4,459 in federal impact funds, Congressman Lloyd Meeds announces today. The federal funds are designed to help support the education of children whose parents live or work on federal property and, therefore, may not pay some school-supporting local taxes.

In making the announcement, Meeds pointed out that some portion of these funds will be deducted by the state from its equalization money. The state can subtract up to 70 per cent this year and 85 per cent next year of these impact aid payments from its contributions to local schools according to a law passed by the Legislature in 1965.

A suit has been filed to prevent the state from discounting impact funds. A similar state law in Virginia was struck down by a Federal District Court recently and the state was required to repay all local school districts from which it had, effectively, withheld funds.

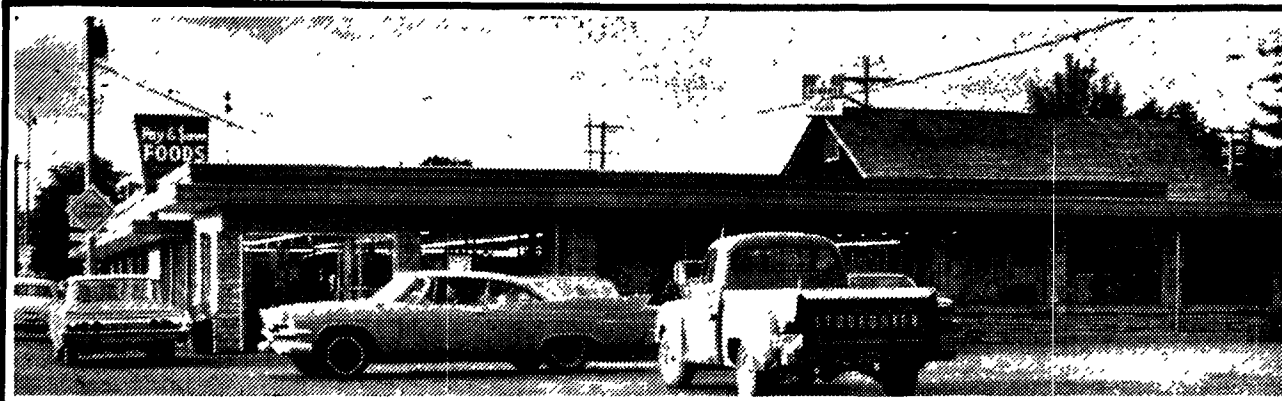
