

Ordinance No. 107 continued from page 11 the average annual amount required for the payment of all of such principal and interest after necessary costs of maintenance and operation of the System have been paid but before depreciation. After the retirement of the Outstanding Parity Bonds, the computation of such average annual amount shall exclude the principal amount of Term Bonds.

(b) That it will at all times keep and maintain the System in good repair, working order and condition and will at all times operate the System and the business in connection therewith in an efficient manner and at a reasonable cost.

(c) That it will not sell or otherwise dispose of any of the properties of the System (unless the same are no longer used, useful or necessary in the operation thereof and in the producing of revenue required to meet all obligations of the town payable out of such revenue), unless provision is made for payment into the Bond Redemption Fund of a sum sufficient to redeem and retire all of the Outstanding Parity Bonds and the Bonds then outstanding in accordance with the terms thereof.

(d) That it will not furnish water to any customer whatsoever free of charge.

(e) That it will carry fire and extended coverage insurance on the System as is ordinarily carried on the properties of similar public utilities by private companies engaged in the operation of the same to the full insurable value thereof, and will also carry adequate public liability insurance, war risk insurance as under good practice are ordinarily carried on the properties of similar public utilities by private companies engaged in the operation of the same. The premiums paid for all such insurance shall be regarded as paid as an expense of maintenance and operation of the System.

(f) That it will keep and maintain proper books and counts with respect to the operations, income and expenditures of the System that are in accordance with proper and legal accounting procedures. That on or before sixty days after each fiscal year of the Town's operation of the System it will prepare or cause to be prepared an operating statement shall contain a statement in detail of the gross revenue, operating and maintenance expenses and expenditures for capital purposes of the System for such fiscal year, shall contain a balance sheet as of the end of such year showing the status of all Funds and Accounts created by the various ordinances authorizing the issuance of outstanding bonds payable from the revenues of the System, shall contain a list of the insurance policies in force at the end of such fiscal year, setting out the amount of each policy, the risks covered thereby, the name of the insurer and the expiration date of such policies, shall contain the number of customers of the System per class of customer and the gross revenue per each class of customer of the System. Copies of such statements shall be placed on file in the office of the Town Clerk, shall be sent to McLean & Company, Inc., Tacoma, Washington, and shall be open to inspection at any reasonable time by the holder of any of the Bonds or any other outstanding bonds of the Town payable out of the revenue of the System. All expenses incurred in the making of such statements shall be regarded as paid as an expense of maintenance and operation of the System.

Section 12. Issuance of Parity Revenue Bonds. The Town hereby further covenants and agrees with the owner and holder of each of the Bonds for as long as the same remain outstanding that it will not issue any Parity Revenue Bonds except: A. The Town reserves the right First: For the purpose of acquiring, constructing and installing additions, betterments and improvements to and extensions of, acquiring necessary equipment for, making necessary replacements or repairs or capital improvements to the System, or Second: For the purpose of refunding by exchange or purchasing and retiring at or prior to their maturity any outstanding revenue bonds or revenue coupon warrants of the Town that may have a lien on the gross revenue of the System for the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon junior and inferior to the lien on such gross revenue for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds and the bonds, to issue additional and/or refunding revenue bonds therefor (herein called "Parity Revenue Bonds" as hereinbefore defined) and to pledge

that payments shall be made out of the gross revenue of the System to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on such Parity Revenue Bonds on a parity with the payments required to be made out of such gross revenue to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds and the Bonds upon compliance with the following conditions:

(1) That at the time of the issuance of such Parity Revenue Bonds there is no deficiency in (a) the Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1953 or Reserve Account created therein, and (b) in the Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1968 or Reserve Account created by Section 8 of this Ordinance.

(2) That the Town will covenant in each ordinance authorizing the issuance of Parity Revenue Bonds that it will establish, maintain and collect rates and charges for water (and sewage collection and disposal service should the sewer system be combined with the water system) for as long as any of the Outstanding Parity Bonds, the Bonds and any Parity Revenue Bonds are outstanding that will make available for the payment of the principal of and interest on all of such as the same shall become due an amount equal to at least 1.5 times the average annual amount required thereafter for the payment of all of such principal and interest after necessary costs of maintenance and operation of the System have been paid but before depreciation. Such covenant may provide that the principal amount of Term Bonds may be excluded from the computation of such average annual amount after the retirement of the Outstanding Parity Bonds.

That the Town will also covenant in each ordinance authorizing the issuance of Parity Revenue Bonds that it will pay into and maintain the Reserve Account created by Section 9 out of the gross revenue of the System and out of any other moneys legally available thereto approximately equal monthly amounts which, together with the balance then in such Reserve Account will equal within five years from the date of issuance of such Parity Revenue Bonds the maximum annual amount (excluding the principal amount of Term Bonds) required to pay the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds and all bonds payable out of the Bond Fund including the Parity Revenue Bonds to be issued. The whole or any part of the money in any other reserve fund or account created to secure the payment of the principal of and interest on any revenue bonds or revenue coupon warrants being refunded by any such Parity Revenue Bonds may be transferred to the Reserve Account at the time such outstanding bonds or warrants are redeemed to satisfy the above requirement, and

(3) That at the time of the issuance of such Parity Revenue Bonds the Town shall have on file a certificate from an independent licensed professional engineer experienced in the design and operation of municipal utilities showing that in his professional opinion the revenue of the System, (plus any additional revenues anticipated to be received as a result of the acquisition or construction of the improvements in connection with which such Parity Revenue Bonds are to be issued) shall be sufficient after payment of normal operating and maintenance costs and taxes to equal at least 1.5 times the average annual amount required for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds, the Bonds, any Parity Revenue Bonds the outstanding, and the Parity Revenue Bonds to be issued, as all of the same shall become due. After the retirement of the Outstanding Parity Bonds the computation of such average annual amount shall exclude the principal amount of Term Bonds.

B. That the Town further reserves the right to issue Parity Revenue Bonds for the purpose of refunding by exchange or purchasing and retiring at or prior to their maturity an equal principal amount of any part or all of the Outstanding Parity Bonds, the Bonds and/or any Parity Revenue Bonds outstanding and to pledge that payment shall be made out of the gross revenue of the System to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on such refunding Parity Revenue Bonds on a parity with the payments required to be made out of such gross revenue to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds and the Bonds upon compliance with subparagraphs (1) and (2) of subsection A of this section. If the issuance of such refunding Parity Revenue Bonds and the retirement of outstanding Bonds does not require a greater amount to be paid

out of the gross revenue of the System in any calendar years for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds being refunded, and any premiums paid to effect such refunding shall not be computed in determining such annual amounts; provided however, that unless all Outstanding Parity Bonds are to be refunded pursuant to this subsection B the provisions of this subsection shall not become effective until all of said Outstanding Parity Bonds have been retired.

C. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the Town from issuing revenue bonds or warrants (coupon or otherwise) the payment of the principal of and interest on which is made a charge upon the gross revenue of the System junior or inferior to the payments required to be made out of such gross revenue into the Bond Redemption Fund and the Reserve Account.

Section 13. Compliance with Parity Conditions. The Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, finds and determines that the limitation upon the issuance of additional bonds contained in Section 6 of Ordinance No. 49 have now or will on the date of the issuance of the Bonds have been complied with and that the Bonds may be issued on a parity with the Outstanding Parity Bonds.

The Town hereby further covenants and agrees that the Bonds will not be issued or delivered to the purchasers thereof as bonds on a parity with the Outstanding Parity Bonds until the conditions contained in said Section 6 of Ordinance No. 49 have been met and complied with.

Section 14. Sale of Bonds. The Town has heretofore retained McLean & Company, Inc., investment bankers of Tacoma, Washington, to lend its best efforts toward the sale of the Bonds to others. McLean & Company, Inc. has represented to the council that it has obtained offers for the bonds from certain unspecified parties under the form, terms and conditions contained herein and at the price of \$100.00 par value. The council hereby accepts such offers and authorizes the issuance, sale and delivery to such parties to be accomplished through its agent, McLean & Company, Inc.

The proper Town of cials are hereby authorized and directed to do everything necessary for the prompt issuance and execution of the Bonds, for the prompt delivery thereof to said purchasers, and for the proper use and application of the proceeds of their sale.

Section 15. Creation of Construction Fund. That there be and it is hereby created a special fund of the Town to be known as the "Water System Construction Fund." All of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds (except for accrued interest, which shall be paid into the Bond Fund) shall be paid into such Construction Fund. Any other moneys which the Town may receive or have on hand and need for the purposes for which the Bonds are issued shall also be paid into such Construction Fund. The money in such fund shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring, constructing and installing the additions and improvements to and extensions of the System hereinafter authorized and for paying all of the expenses incidental thereto.

In the event any moneys are remaining in such Construction Fund after the cost of all such additions, improvement, extensions and incidental expenses have been paid shall either be transferred to the Bond Fund for the uses and purposes herein provided or used for the acquisition, construction and installation of other additions and improvements to and extensions of the System.

Section 16. Effective Date. This ordinance is declared to be one necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and safety of the people of the Town of Forks, Washington. An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance is hereby declared to be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Norm Lodholm Killed In Vietnam Action



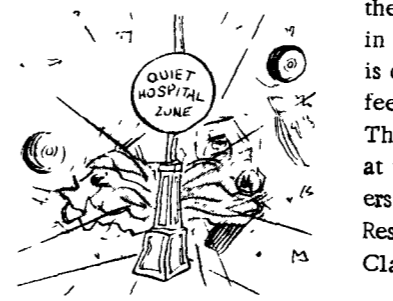

STATE TO SELL 13 PARCELS OF TIMBER

Thirteen parcels of state-owned timber go on the auction block, July 29-30, to begin the 1969 Fiscal Year sales activity for the Department of Natural Resources.

State land Commissioner Bert L. Cole announced the state is offering 37.9 million board feet of timber, valued at \$1,399,731. The sales will be held on July 29 and 30 in Clallam, Jefferson, Kittitas, Cowlitz, Lewis, Pacific and Pierce counties.

The largest sale will be the Bear Creek Cleanup sale in Cowlitz county. The state is offering 12,895,000 board feet, valued at \$705,010. The sale will be held July 30 at the Kelso District Headquarters of the Department of Natural Resources. Clallam County: South Fork Catawah Clean-

up-500,000 board feet, valued at \$8,750, located six miles east of Forks, to be sold at Forks July 30.

Jefferson County: Lower Maple Creek- 6,450,000 board feet, valued at \$165,700, located about 22 miles southeast of Forks, to be sold July 30 at Forks.

Walton Camp-7,050,000 board feet, valued at \$182,990, located about 32 miles southeast of Forks, to be sold July 30 at Forks.

AN ORDINANCE repealing Sections XI and XII of Ordinance 51, approved and adopted the 27th day of August, 1953, and repealing Section 2 and Section 3 of Ordinance No. 102 and amending Section 4 and Section 5 of Ordinance No. 102, approved and adopted January, 1966, relating to the rate and price of water supplied by the town.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF FORKS:

Section 1. Sections XI and XII of Ordinance 51 approved and adopted the 27th day of August, 1953, and Section 2 and Section 3 of Ordinance No. 102 approved and adopted January, 1966, are hereby repealed.

Section 2. That section 4, Ordinance 102 approved and adopted by the Mayor and Town Council, January, 1966, be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Section 5, Ordinance Number 102, approved and adopted January, 1966, relating to the rate and price of water supplied by the Town shall be amended to read as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 107

An ordinance of the Town of Forks, Washington, specifying and adopting a plan for the acquisition, construction and installation of certain additions and improvements to and extensions of the water supply and distribution system of the town; declaring the estimated cost thereof; authorizing the issuance of water revenue bonds of the town in the aggregate principal amount of \$180,000 to pay such cost; fixing the date, form, terms, maturities and covenants of said bonds; creating a construction fund; reserving the right in the town

to issue additional water revenue bonds on a parity with said bonds upon compliance with certain conditions, and confirming the sale thereof

WHEREAS, the town of Forks, Washington, now owns, operates and maintains a water supply and distribution system which is in need of certain additions, improvements and extensions in order to provide the town, its inhabitants and others with an adequate supply of potable water; and

WHEREAS, in order to pay the cost of additions and improvements to and extensions of such system, it is deemed necessary that the town issue and sell its water revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$180,000; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 49 of the town adopted July 13, 1953, the town issued its water revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$185,000 under date of August 1, 1953, and provided in Section 6 of said ordinance that additional water revenue bonds of the town could be issued on a parity with said revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, it appears to this council that said conditions may be met and that it is to the best interest of the town and its inhabitants that the bonds authorized herein be issued on a parity with such August 1, 1953 water revenue bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, as follows:

Section 1. Definitions. As used in this ordinance unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context:

"Bonds" means the water revenue bonds of the town in the aggregate principal amount of \$180,000 issued pursuant to and for the purposes provided in this ordinance

"Outstanding Parity Bonds" means any water revenue bonds of the town issued under date of August 1, 1953 pursuant to Ordinance No. 49.

"Parity Revenue Bonds" means any water revenue bonds of the town other than the "Outstanding Parity Bonds" and the "Bonds" which are issued hereafter under an ordinance wherein the town pledges that the payments to be made out of the gross revenue of the System into the Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1968 and the Reserve Account therein created by this ordinance to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on such Parity Revenue Bonds, will be on a parity with the payments required to be made out of such gross revenue into such Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1968 and Reserve Account to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and will be on a parity with the payments required to be made out of such gross revenue into the Water Revenue Bond - 1953 to pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Outstanding Parity Bonds.

"System" means the existing water supply and distribution system of the town as the same may later be added to, improved and extended for as long as any of the Outstanding Parity Bonds, the Bonds and any Parity Revenue Bonds are outstanding. In the event the town ever combines a sewerage system with the water system, the term "System" shall include such sewer system.

"Term bonds" means the bonds of any Parity Revenue Bond issue or series maturing in the last maturity year of such issue or series (regardless of reservation of prior redemption rights) in an amount which is more than 1 2/3 times the average annual principal maturities of the outstanding bonds of said issue or series for the three calendar years immediately preceding such calendar year.

"Town" means the Town of Forks, Washington, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Washington.

"Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1953" means the Water Revenue Bond Fund created by Ordinance No. 47 for the purpose of paying and securing the payment of the Outstanding Parity Bonds.

"Water Revenue Bond Fund - 1968" means the Water Revenue Bond Fund created by Section 8 of this ordinance to pay and secure the payment of the Bonds and any Parity Revenue Bonds.

Section 2. Additions and Improvements to System. The following plans of additions and improvements to the System are hereby proposed, specified and adopted to wit:

A. The Town shall acquire, construct and install

a 750,000 gallon storage tank on a site approximately one-half mile east of the Town limits.

B. The Town shall acquire, construct and install the following described water mains:

The above described additions, improvements and betterments shall be installed with all necessary equipment and appurtenances and shall be connected to the existing system wherever proper.

The Town shall acquire all property, both real and personal, or any interest therein, equipment, rights of way and easements necessary to carry out said plan, which are all as more particularly set forth in maps, plans and specifications prepared by Hill, Ingman, Chase & Co., Seattle, Washington, now on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

It is hereby further provided that such plans shall be subject to such additions and changes as to detail or other changes not affecting the main general plans for services to be rendered thereby as may be authorized by the Town Council either prior to or during the actual course of construction.

Section 3. Estimated Cost. The estimated cost of the acquisition, construction and installation of the above described additions, improvements and betterments to the System is hereby declared to be as near as may be the sum of \$180,000, which shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds.

Section 4. Method of Financing. The town does hereby propose and adopt as an integral part of the plan for acquiring, constructing and installing the additions and improvements to and extensions of the System herein before authorized that it shall issue the Bonds.

Section 4. Description of Bonds. The Bonds shall be dated June 1, 1968, shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each, shall bear interest at the rate of 6.00% per annum payable December 1, 1968, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of June and December of each year, and shall be numbered and mature in order of their number as follows:

Both principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the Town Treasurer in Forks, Washington, and shall be obligations only of the special Water Revenue Bond Fund-1968 created by Section 8 of this ordinance.

Section 5. Right of Prior Redemption. The Town hereby reserves the right to redeem any or all of the Bonds outstanding, at a par plus accrued interest, in inverse numerical order on any interest payment date on and after June 1, 1983.

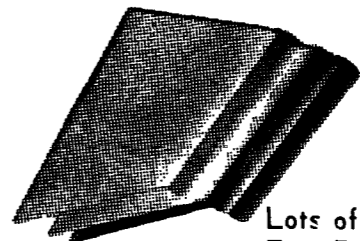

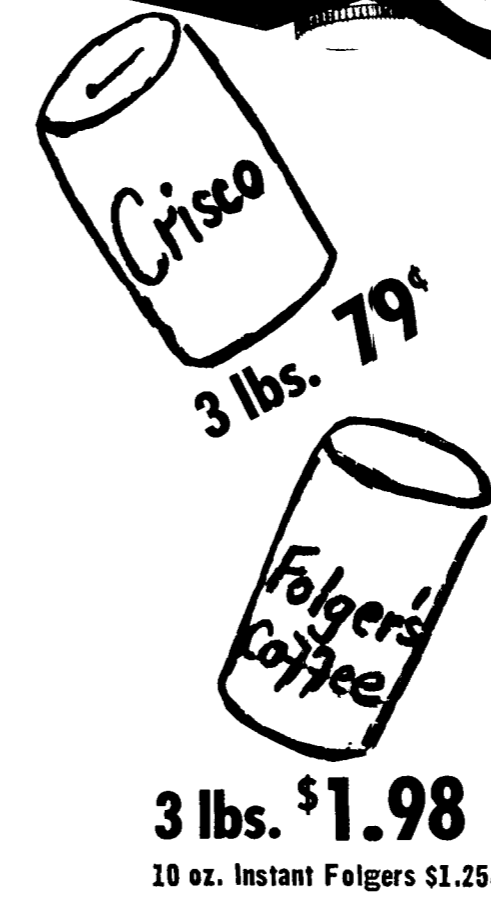
