The study, based on data from 1967, shows that reckless driving was the leading cause of personal injury accidents, accounting for 33 percent of all such accidents. Other leading causes include speeding, failure to yield, and failure to stop at a red light. The study also found that the majority of reckless driving accidents occurred on two-lane roads, and that the majority of drivers involved in such accidents were male and in the 25-34 age group.

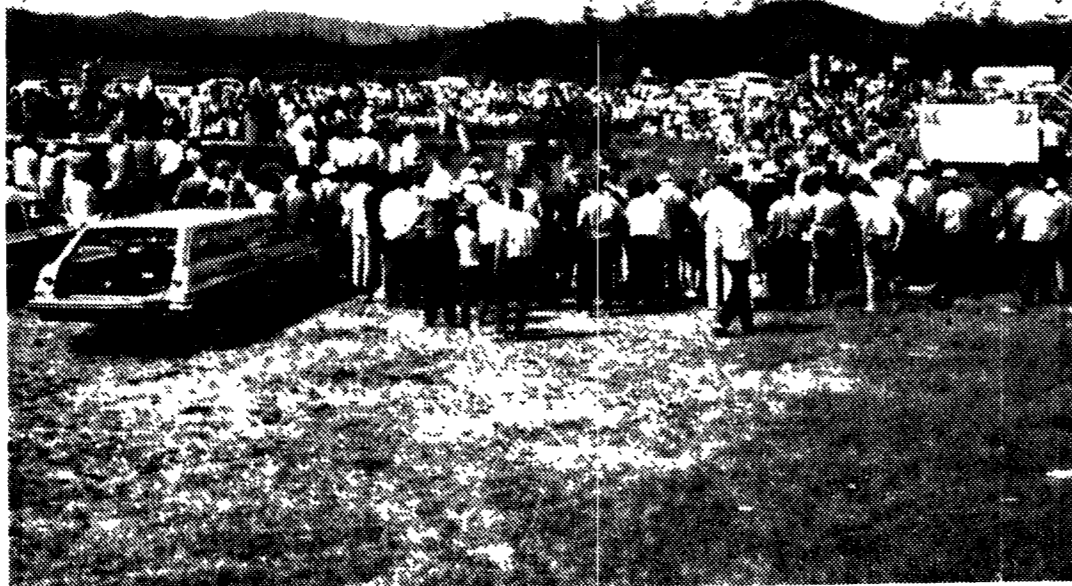
