### Masters or Servants, Which?

Figures released by the General Services Administration show that Uncle Sam owns 760.4 million acres of land -- a sizeable part of the land area of the United States. The federal government also owns structures and facilities in the U. S., costing \$33.4 billion. The greatest portion of these comes under the heading of utility systems, power development and distribution, flood control and navigation which altogether total over \$15 billion.

When one pauses to realize that the federal government in its role of landowner and commercial business enterpriser is a nontaxpayer, it comes as no surprise that private citizens are saddled with a backbreaking tax burden. Every time an elected representative of the people or an appointed official advocates a federal business undertaking that could be carried out by taxpaying, private enterprise, he is proposing a new draft on the energies and earnings of private citizens. Either directly or indirectly, he is pushing toward the goal of making government the primary employer of U. S. citizens. If this goal should ever be reached, we will no longer be entitled to call our elected representatives public servants. They will be our masters.

We hear a lot about socialism -- but, all it means is that government is landlord and boss. It means a condition of economic servitude wholly incompatible with the principle of self-government. These are the reasons why we should look with a wary eye on any proposal to expand government in the electric power business or any other business for that matter.

### Reason For Skepticism

News reports in the closing days of each congressional session tell of the "work load" of congressmen passing appropriation bills, which authorize the spending of taxpayer funds during the next fiscal year. The latest session of Congress has been no exception.

The "work load" has involved the spending of some \$4.7 billion for public works alone. Included in this astronomical sum are such things as \$370 million for an electric loan program. It is instructive to pursue one of these appropriations to the end of the spending pipeline. The Columbia, South Carolina, Record describes how a local "rural" electric cooperative uses the "electric loan" that it gets from the federal government at a 2 per cent interest rate to finance the development of housing projects and other enterprises that have nothing to do with rural electrification. An investor-owned South Carolina power company has protested the actions of the cooperative. An official of the power company declared that the government-sponsored cooperative had offered to loan a development firm money at 4 per cent interest -- far lower than the going rates. In the electric company spokesman's words, "This is some of the money the federal government borrows at 6 per cent interest, and in turn loans to the cooperatives at 2 per cent. It is quite strange to us that this money is available since the cooperatives have informed our Governor that they are so poor that they cannot pay normal business taxes in our state commargale to the taxes we pay."

When the "work load" of congressmen reaches the point where federal funds are being appropriated to pour down the rathole of subsidized government competition with private, taxpaying citizens in business, we have every right to be skeptical when our elected public servants talk of the impossibility of further economies in government spending.

### LETTER TO EDITOR

Everywhere you drive you see cars with "Remember the Pueblo" stickers - most of them sent out, I think, by an organization started by the wife and mother of the captain.

It has been more than six months and everyone is concerned. Rep. Charlotte Reid suggested flying the flag in memory of the Pueblo. The Chicago Tribune and other publications took up the suggestion and thousands of people responded.

I believe that there is one thing that we can do to help bring the release of the crew of the Pueblo. July 30 the Senate passed an amendment to the Foreign Aid Authorization Bill (HR 15263) which would prohibit foreign aid to Communist nations until the men of the Pueblo are returned.

This bill has to go to conference to iron out House-Senate differences when Congress reconvenes. We should write letters in support of this amendment. Congress will be very busy with legislation the President wishes to push through before the end of the session, but surely the release of these men is very important and should not be neglected.

This very simple economic weapon should be very effective for Czech Maj. Gen. Senja who defected to the West this year says that the Communist economy is very weak and they badly need our help.

We can hope that Congress will find some way that we can help the people of these countries instead of the repressive governments that hold

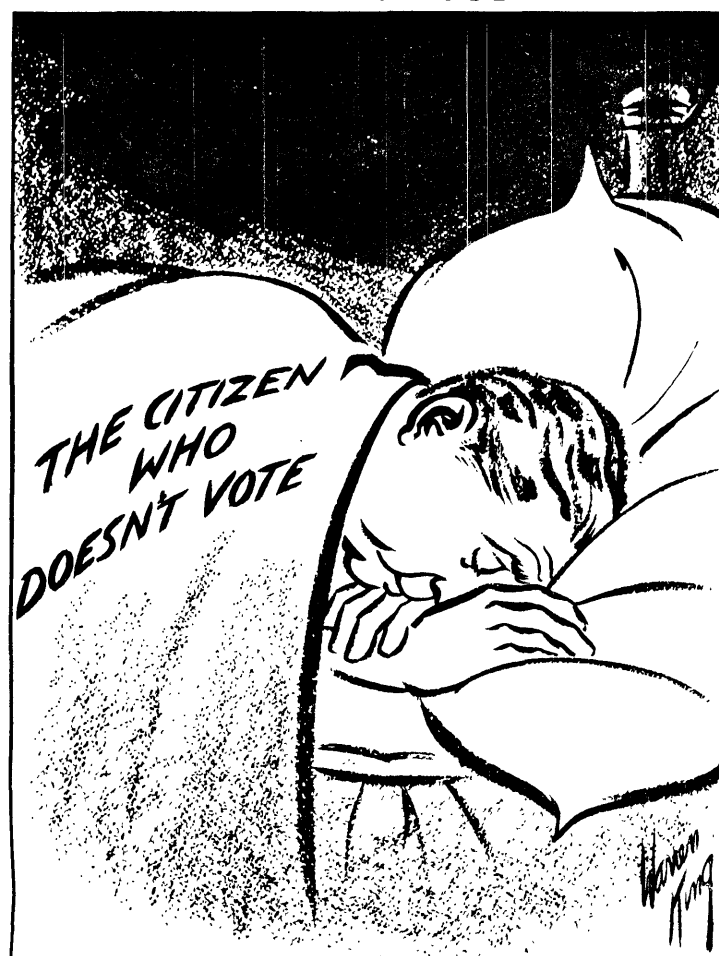
