

Lt. Raymond J. Helmick U. S. M. C. is home on leave visiting his parents. Mr. & Mrs. James Helmick, Forks. Lt. Helmick completed 5 months training at Quantico, Virginia and graduated with honors. He will leave March 11, reporting at Travis Air Force Base. From there Lt. Helmick will be flown to Vietnam for duty as a platoon commander with the 1st Marine Division at Da Nang.

The Clallam Bay Bruins, playing steady ball all the way, beat the Chimaicum Cowboys 48-35, winning the North Olympic League championship and a berth in the State Class "B" basketball tournament in Spokane. driving layin to keep the Bruins attack going. Chimaicum used a tough defense to hold the Wilson brothers scoring down in the first half. The Bruins kept the high scoring Brecht to 12 points in the ballgame. The Bruins led 38-30 at halftime and held an 8-10 point lead the rest of the way. The Bruins used a stall in the final period to main-

tain control of the game. The crowd began to sense victory and the Big Black Bear, Bruin mascot, began to dance and cheer the Bruin supporters on. Dan Wilson paced the Bruin scoring with 12, Don Wilson hit 11 and Ken Sternbeck had 10. It was the early scoring of Sternbeck and his board play that got the Bruins on the right track. Clallam Bay played Kittitas

**Business Places Burglarized**

**In Forks Saturday Night**

Three Forks businesses were burglarized Saturday night. Money and merchandise were taken from Halmor Ford, Red Carpet and Ulins.

Halmor Ford was entered by breaking out the front door window. \$82.40 in cash was reported taken from Halmor.

Entry into Ulins was gained by breaking a side win-

dow. An estimated \$1,500 worth of merchandise and cash was taken. Owner William Ulins discovered the robbery Sunday morning. The entry at the Red Carpet was also discovered Sunday. The candy and popcorn machines were dismantled and attempts were made to get into coin boxes of the other machines in the building. No estimate of the total loss was available.

**Patrol Reports Two Accidents**

The station wagon was totaled. The driver, Sam Buck, received a deep laceration on the right arm and a second passenger, Gilbert Gallow, Pacific Beach, suffered a chin laceration. A third passenger Edward Pickernell escaped injury.

**Forks Area Shows Growth**

The Forks area shows continual signs of growing. The population figures within the Town of Forks is listed at 1,325 as one views the highway entrance sign.

Former residents making the tour through the area are surprised by the new home construction, housing and business developments.

The business community easily illustrates the area growth. Alice's Apparel is moving into a larger building vacated by a former business and completely remodeled. A Sears Catalog Store is scheduled to be in business in Forks by the end of March.

Preliminary construction began two weeks ago on a 3-unit apartment house at 3rd and Division Street.

Forks Motel has under construction a two-story addition to its complex. A swimming pool is also under construction.

Halmor Ford will be moving into its new location soon. The new showroom and office building are nearly complete.

Peninsula Telephone Company has a new central office equipment building under construction at Tye. The building will house the necessary equipment to reduce party line loads and

handle the future growth of the Beaver-Tyee area.

Peninsula Loggers Supply moved its wire rope and other logging supplies into a new building completed last fall.

Schumack Motors opened for business recently in a new Tex-Mo building just South of the Town Motel on Highway 101.

Three Rivers Resort, formerly Ellis' Resort, located at the LaPush-Mora Junction, completed an addition to the store.

A mobile trailer park is scheduled for construction sometime this spring at LaPush.

The area continues to show growth. The basic economy remains the logging industry, but tourism is steadily on the rise.

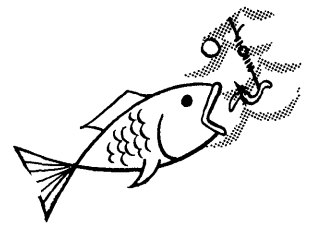
### Sports Wanderings

Local rivers provide excellent fishing with proper water conditions through April.



Fishermen catching marked steelhead are urged to report the catch to local Game Department Officials. Call Larry Barger at the Bogachiel Rearing Pond and give him the information or contact Jim Aggergaard.

Recently a fish with the left ventral fin removed was reported to Larry. The fish was a jack running the Bogachiel one year early. It was a fish from the first plant out of the Bogachiel Pond. These fish were planted in the Spring of 1968 and scheduled to return in local rivers as adults in the Winter of 1969-70.

Information of this type is important to the Department of Game.

The Clallam Bay Bruins finished the 1968-69 season 17-2. The only losses for the Bruins came at the hands of the Forks Spartans 58-51 and Chimaquum 53-52.

The Bruins came back to upset tourney bound Forks 58-51 and defeated Chimaquum for the North Olympic title and State Class "B" tourney berth, 48-36 to avenge the only defeat.

The Bruins missed the title last season by one game to the Neah Bay Red Devils.
