Frank Lyda hustling around town doing the best he can with the ever increasing tar pits.

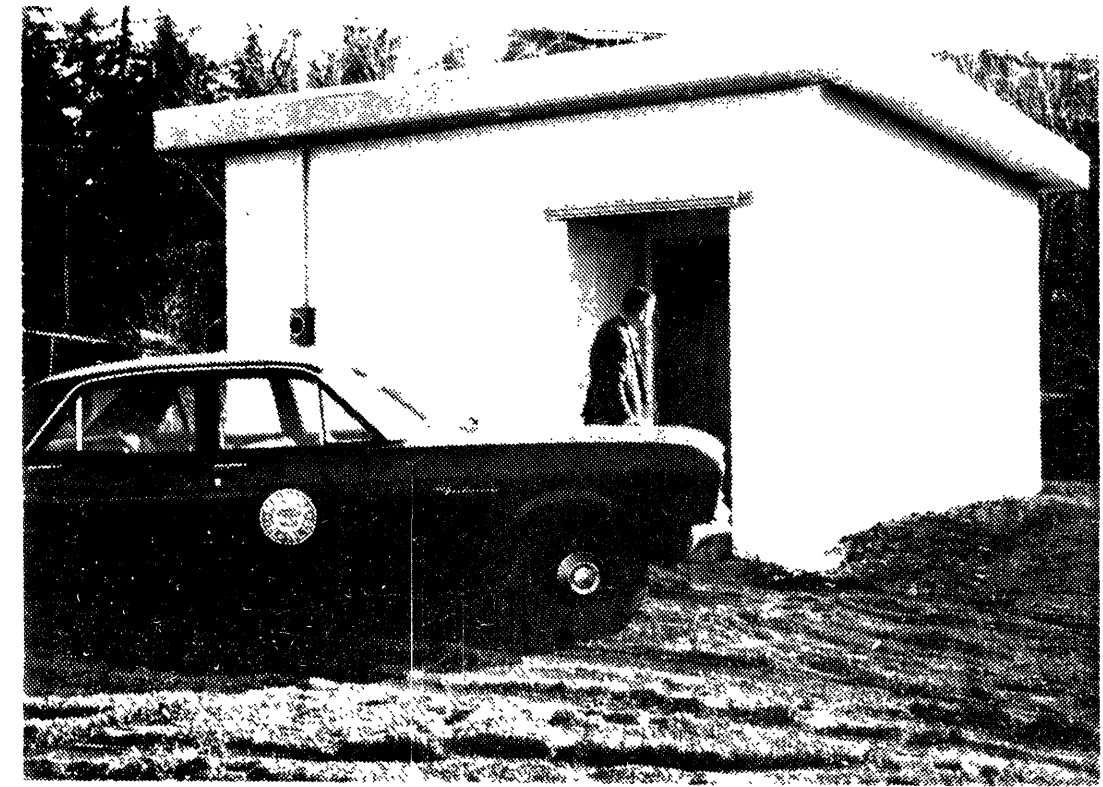

## Construction Completed On Beaver Central Office



## Burglars Strike Again

Lefler's General Store was burglarized between closing hours Saturday and Sunday afternoon when owner, Harry Lefler discovered the robbery.

Two pistols and other assorted merchandise were taken in addition to an undetermined amount of money.

Lefler stated the burglars committed grand larceny and are in possession of unregistered firearms, a federal offense.

Burglars were apparently interrupted in action at the

Red Carpet late Saturday evening. Upon returning from a show the manager noticed shadows in the back room of the laundry. The burglars escaped through the front door. The dry cleaning section in the back had been entered by prying the door open. This marks the second weekend the Red Carpet has been entered. March 1st the candy and pop machines were broken into.

The Forks Marshall's department is investigating the burglaries. Construction has been completed on the Beaver Central Office equipment building, according to an announcement made recently by Peninsula Telephone and Telegraph Company. The building will house switching equipment scheduled for installation early in April. Telephone company construction crews are now in the process of installing cable in the Beaver area.

The entire project, scheduled for completion on June 21, 1969, will provide the Beaver area with its own exchange. A base-rate area, extending from the Tye

Store to the Heinz Camp-ground Road, will be established. Subscribers in this base-rate area will be offered one or two-party service. The new Beaver exchange will have a new prefix. 321. Calls made between Beaver and Forks will be toll-free, just as they are now.

All Beaver telephone numbers will be changed concurrent with the June 21 in-service date. Beaver directory supplements will be mailed to all subscribers prior to the cut-over date. The Beaver project, when completed, will require an investment of over \$50,000 by the telephone company.

## Bowling Tips...



Perfect Shot Requires Perfect Grip

Johnny Guenther, 1968 Miller High Life Open champion and the only active professional to shoot a 300 game on national television, explains the proper grip in bowling:

While all phases of delivery are important, an incorrect grip can ruin what would otherwise be a perfect shot. Most pro bowlers insert their fingers into the ball first - to the proper depth - and then the thumb. (See sketch 1) You'd be surprised how many beginners and "amateurs" do not have the proper grip. It's the fingers that impart the proper roll and that should be your primary concern. If the ball is drilled properly, you should be able to let the ball hang loosely at your side without squeezing. (See sketch 2) The grip should be comfortable, with no significant strain on your fingers from over-reaching. The finger holes should fit snugly with the thumb hole slightly larger so that thumb will come out first and easily.



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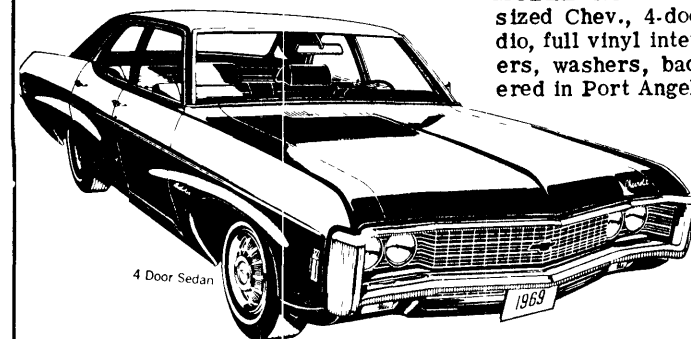

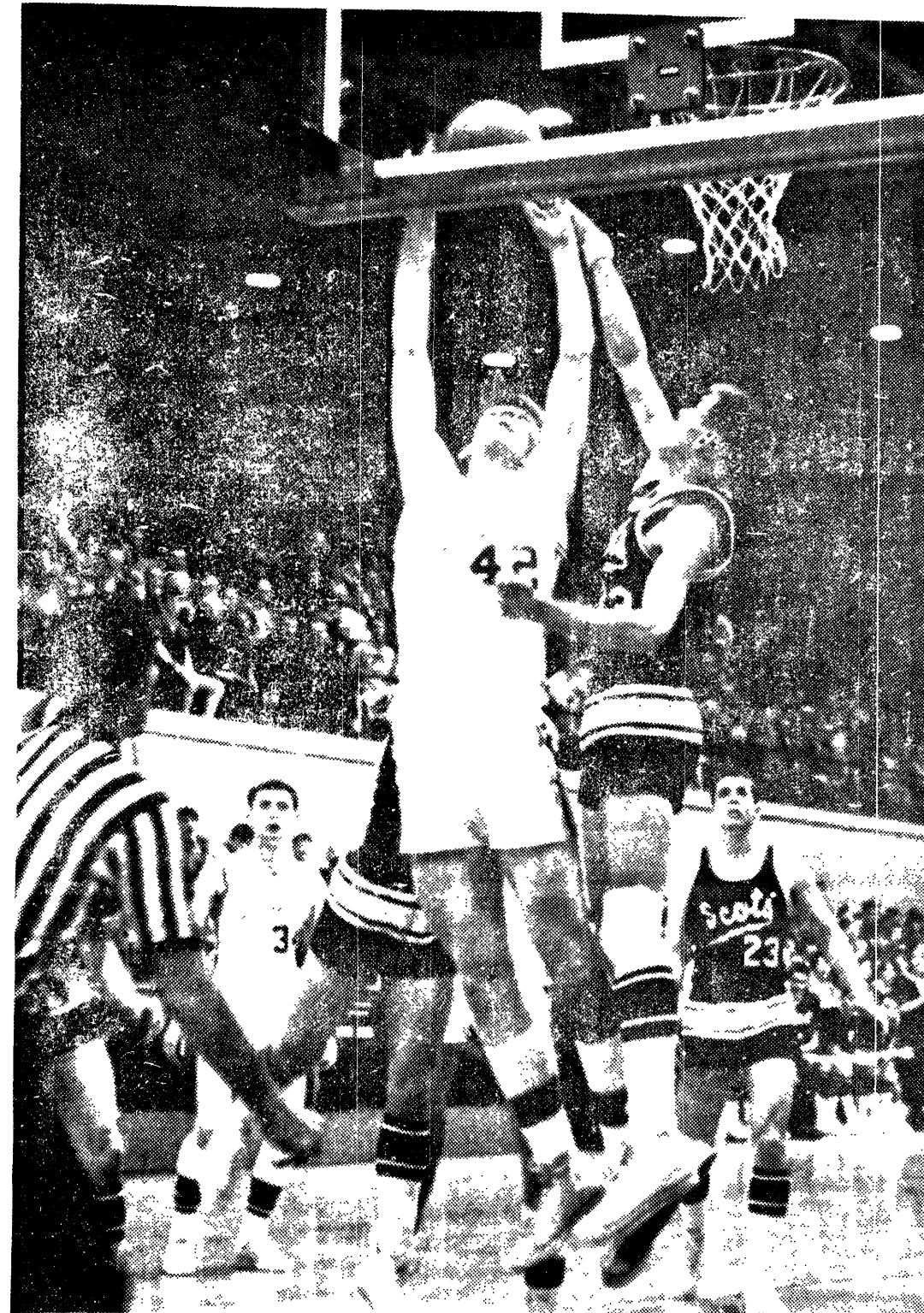
The Spartans went sour from the field in the third period and Raymond increased the lead to 16 points (48-32) at the end of the quarter and coasted home in the final period.

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# DEAR JANE V.F.W. News

DEAR JANE:

I was very put out with the under aged mother, who wrote about the women in pre-school. If she had taken a little more time to find out what these mothers do, such as the bake sales to raise money for an addition to our city park, the rugs they have sewn together for the kindergarden children to sit on and many other projects, she would not have written such a letter. I'm not a pre-school mother myself because I have no children, but I think we should praise these women instead of knocking them.

I believe they have teenage dances in this town for kids under 21.

No Pre-School Mother

Dear No:

Thank you for your letter; I think these women need praise also.

DEAR JANE:

Your reply to "Poor Old Mother" could have used some improvement. As an advice column author you should acquire enough maturity so as not to need a "whipping boy" on which to lean. "Poor Old Mother" questioned her motives and thinking, you lacked that insight.

Now, "Poor Old Mother" if you were the principal of a Grade School with an enrollment of some seven-hundred thirty students just how would you communicate to the parents of these children? If you have a better method in mind, why not share it with the principal?

In your own home do you not have new rules now and then? Do your children resent your placing new rules into effect? What do you say to them if and when they do object to new rulings in your home? How are you able to keep your resentment of authority from becoming part and parcel of your children's thinking? I don't think you would dispute that lack of respect for authority is one of the problems of youth today.

No, this letter is not from the principal, his relative or any school employee. I am the mother of seven children who attend Forks Grade and High School. I have had children in this school for twelve years. I am not tired of the notices that are sent home with my children, I am glad to know the rules and what the school is doing. I have never thought of these notices as dictatorial, I have thought of them as information as to what the school is doing or going to do about a given situation with the best interests of the children in mind. I have found the principal and the teachers most cooperative. I am deeply grateful to all of the dedicated people who have and are now helping to educate my children.

I do not find the taxes burdensome although it will require personal sacrifices to pay them this spring, because a good portion of the property tax money will go to help support this educational opportunity my children are fortunate enough to obtain.

Millions in the world today do not have this opportunity, and what darkness is forced upon them because of the lack of educational facilities.

It is difficult to be a conscientious parent, it must be more difficult to be a conscientious principal of a school. Did you ever stop to think of what it must be like to try to do the best for over seven-hundred children? It is probably impossible to please the parents of this many children. Perhaps we could each of us be a little more understanding of another's problems, this could be a step in the direction of peace in our times.

Dear Grateful:

The reply to "Poor Old Mother" was intended to bring response from the readers; if we may judge from your letter it's purpose was achieved. The caliber of men who are the principals of our school are of impeccable integrity and principle. Frankly, I feel quite honored that they would grace our community with their talents. The exceptional abilities of the majority of our teachers are also commendable. The degradation of all authority and respect for order seems to be rampant, the effect of which is felt in our school systems. We must begin at home, individually, to do our part in demanding principle and order in our respective lives. The thinking we reflect is expressed by our children. 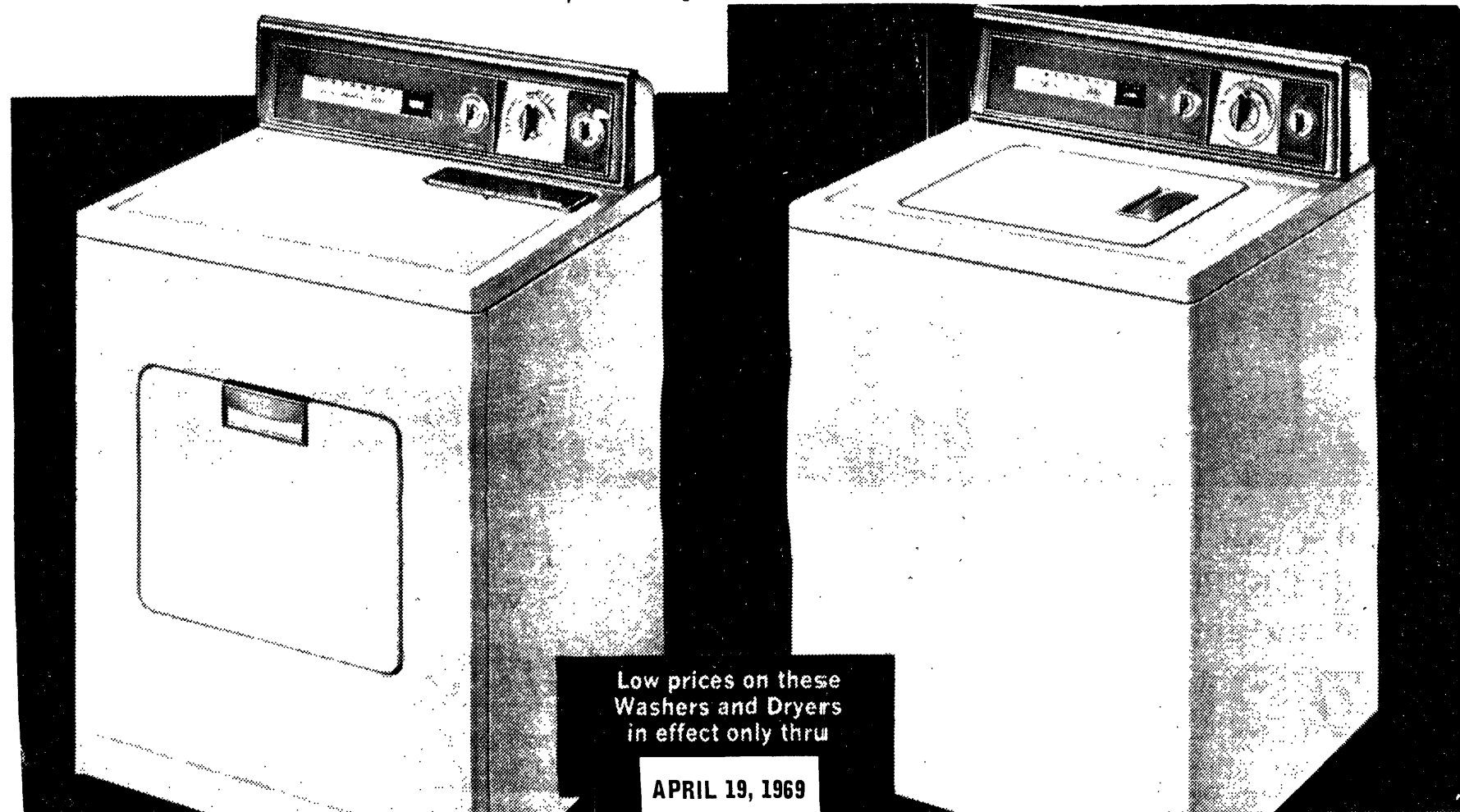

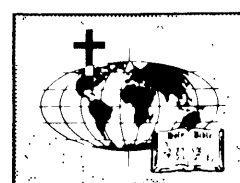

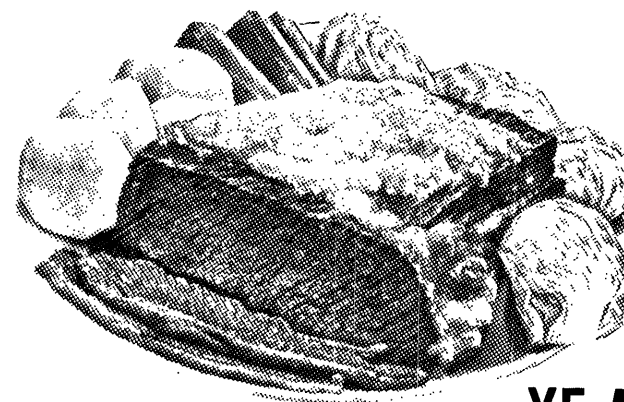
