

Logging Show Big Attraction

The logging show attracted the largest crowd after the parade with competition between the areas loggers in various logging events.

Chuck Anderson, chairman of the logging show this year, gave trophies for all the winners in the contests held at the City Park.

Line splicing was first. A team of two men makes an eye in the end of a steel cable which has six strands. They must have their spikes in the block when they finish.

Four teams entered. First place went to Jess Parris and Larry Hammell, second to Gail Garbrick and Kelley Stanley.

Choker setting, in which a man drags a cable across a log, sets and puts the ball through the eye of the cable--several contestants tried this with Jess Parris placing first in 21.9 seconds. Rick Wahlgren was second in 23.6 seconds and Sid Beauchop third in 25.0 seconds. Ron Woody did it in 21.1 seconds, but was disqualified because he went around the end of the log instead of over it.

Ax throwing was next. Here the men had to throw a double-bit ax about 20 feet into a stump marked with a bullseye target. They had one practice throw and then three chances, totaling their points on all three. There were 23 entrants, 12 being disqualified because the ax did not stick in the wood on the first try.

First place went to Mel Sund with 15 points. Second was tied between Leonard Beauchop and Bob Cole, and fourth was tied with Kelley Stanley and Larry Hammell. To determine both second and third places, a sudden death throw was held with both ties. Beauchop won second place with three points, and Stanley was fourth with five.

Road changing, or block shifting, in which a man changes the block from one stump over a log to another stump, carrying the block which weighs about 50 pounds, and tying it twice around the second stump. Dick Braithwaite was first in 41.08 seconds, Jess Parris came in second at 48.09 seconds and third was Ron Woody at 54.06 seconds.

Line pulling consists of teams of three men who pull a cable approximately 100 yards across the field and coil it behind a stake in a space of 10 feet. Three teams entered. First place went to the team of Bob West, Loren Rife, and Gail Garbrick, in 40.4 seconds. Second was the team of Dick Braithwaite, Ron Woody and Squat Halverson, in 41.8. Third were Jess Parris, Kelley Stanley and Larry Hammell in 46.0 seconds.

A demonstration of an old-fashioned drag saw was given

by Ron James. This was the kind of saw they used before the chain saw was invented.

Twelve contestants entered the chain saw contest. Here they had to put an undercut in of 12 inches and then go above and cut down to meet the undercut to saw off the log. This was done with a small log and a large log. First place went to Craig Fletcher with a time of 45.7 seconds, using an 090 Stihl saw. Second was Elmer Blankenship in 45.9 seconds using a 1090 Skill saw.

Third was Larry Hammell, using an 090 Stihl saw, in 47.4 seconds.

There were three entries in the gear drive saws. The difference is that the one motor is a direct drive and the other is a gear-driven motor. First place went to Ron Woody with a time of 1 minute, 3.8 seconds. Jess Parris came in

second with 1 minute, 27.8 seconds.

Timing was done by Department of Natural Resources employes.

Kelley Stanley finished off the show with a tree-topping event. He climbed the pole, 125 feet high, using a new Homelite chain saw, made an undercut and then saved through to top the pole. The saw he used was later given to a lucky ticket holder in the audience.

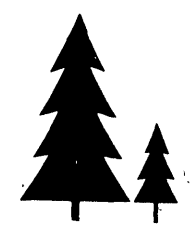

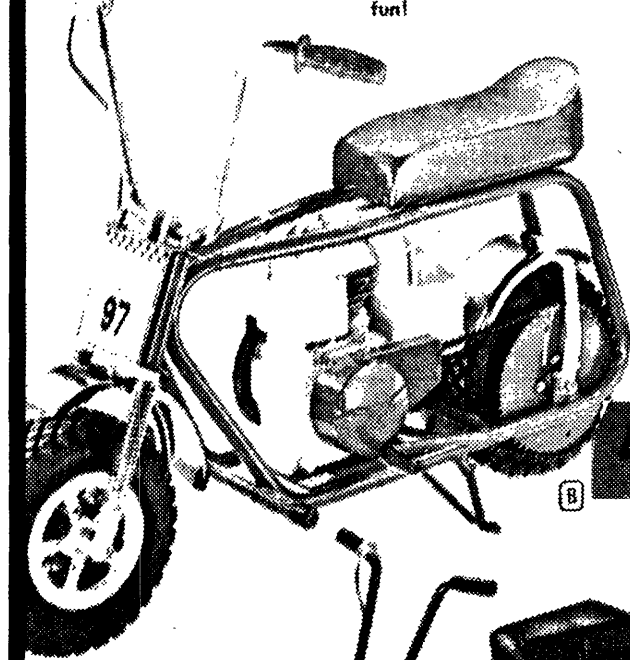

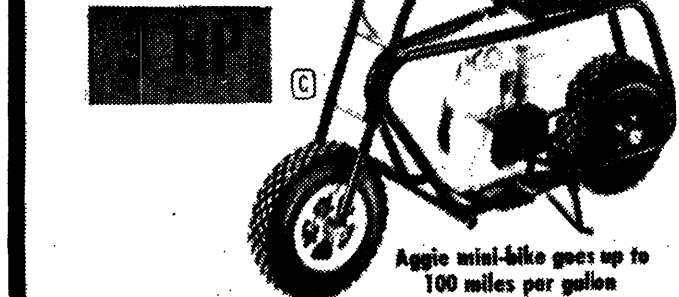

51 MBF August Timber Sale

The state will offer more than 51 million board feet of timber for sale in August, valued at over \$2.6 million. The Board of Natural Resources approved the sale Tuesday, July 1, at its monthly meeting.

Commissioner Bert L. Cole reported that the timber is located in 10 counties with 19 parcels of timber being offered, appraised at \$2,615,447.50.

The sale containing the most value and volume is the Lower Tacoma Creek Sale, located 71 miles north of Hoquiam in Jefferson County. The state will offer 11 million board feet of timber appraised at \$503,410.

August sales will be held in Clallam, Clark, Cowlitz, Jefferson, Kittitas, Klickitat, Lincoln, Pacific, Stevens and Thurston counties.

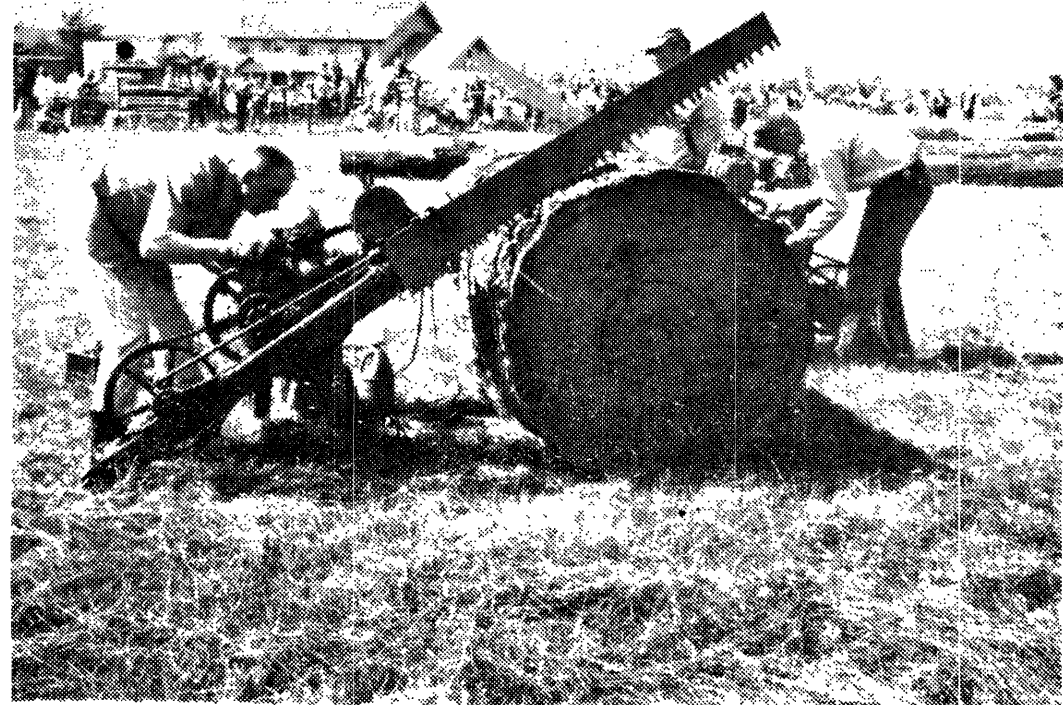

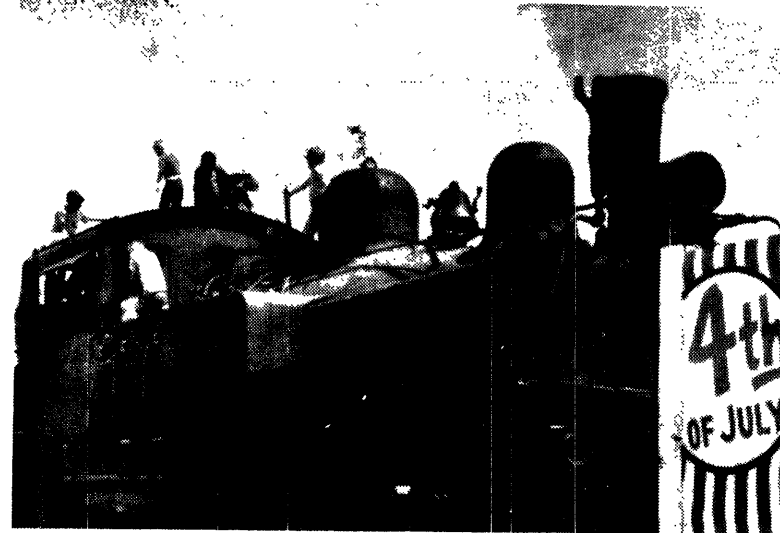


Typical action in the pits Sunday as drivers prepared their cars for the final heat in the Demolition Derby.

This young man's attitude toward the girl is indeed quite typical. It is quite obvious that they love each other; therefore the future looks bright. This is the way any marriage should start out. yet this is the biggest difficulty in pre-marital counseling. The old saying that 'love is blind' is quite true, for two persons in love with each other are very disinclined to see each other as they really are. Due to this, I accent one phrase which is included in the service I use. It reads, "By His apostles, He (Jesus Christ) has instructed those who enter into this relation. . . . to bear with each other's infirmities and weaknesses." It is these weaknesses which love tends to overlook at the outset of marriage. Love meets its test when these weaknesses become apparent, and every husband and every wife have a few of them. These weaknesses are easily overlooked during the courtship and the wedding, but they come into vision

after a few months of marriage. These weaknesses can be accepted as a challenge, which means you will try to change the person you married. I do not advise this, for seldom are our weaknesses changed. Besides, when our husband or wife does not love us as we are, we soon learn to mistrust. The best advice is to "bear with" these weaknesses, and to accept the fact that the person we love is not perfect. This does not mean to overlook them. It means keeping them in mind, never forgetting them, so that you will know how to handle yourself when the weaknesses are in full operation. At times you must remember to keep your mouth shut. Sometimes you must wait patiently. Sometimes you will need to work out how much money can be spent on certain irresistible merchandise. There are dozens of ways to deal with weaknesses, but overlooking them is not one of them. You may need help in finding ways to handle them in your marriage. If you do, I hope your church and your faith are sources of help. You will find them of the most help if you build a relationship with the church and nurture your faith before crisis occurs--while times are good.

Landscape Lovers

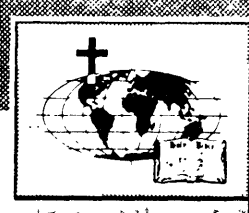
As soon as we met, I knew Rosie was special. She has an air that says she knows who she is and where she is going. I like the way she paints, too—she's quiet and businesslike.
