

The Washington State Highway Commission is planning the improvement of State Route 101 in the vicinity of Amanda Park. This improvement will consist of the construction of a rest area and viewpoint which offers an impressive view of Lake Quinaltup and the Olympic Mountains. The Amanda Park Rest Area is designed to take full advantage of this view while at the same time preserving the natural topography and character of the site.

Should any interested person desire that a Design Public Hearing be held to discuss and exchange information concerning this improvement, they may request a hearing by writing to the District Engineer, Washington State Department of Highways, P.O. Box 327, Olympia, Washington 98501, before September 11, 1969. In the event that requests are made, a separate notice of public hearing will be published in ample time for interested parties to arrange to attend.

Regardless of whether a hearing is held, all interested persons may inspect maps, drawings and other pertinent information concerning this project by coming to the Project Engineer's Office, located at 4801 Olympic Highway, Aberdeen, Washington.

School Board Meets

The Quillayute Valley School Board held their monthly meeting Thursday night. The main topic of discussion was the kindergarten issue. It was decided at an earlier meeting that since there would not be sufficient room at the elementary school the Beaver school facility would be used.

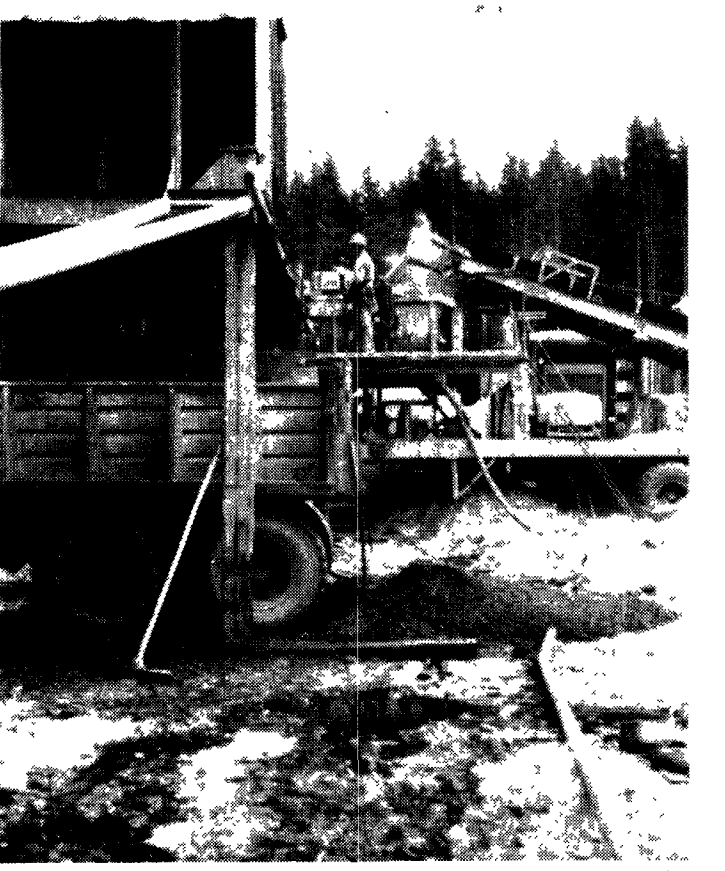
A group of mothers, headed by Mrs. Thomas Hedglin, conducted an independent survey of parents with children starting kindergarten. Of the parents contacted 95% expressed their dislike at the building of children to Beaver, which is 12 miles from Forks. According to Mrs. Hedglin, the state fire marshal was asked to inspect the building, his report stated that two new doors would have to be put in to comply with fire regulations, also the present furnace would have to be overhauled. The approximate cost would be \$400,00 according to Mr. Tom Hitchcock, superintendent of schools.

This group of mothers then decided to try to find an alternate location. The churches in the area were contacted and it was found the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church had the most space available.

Taking this into consideration the School Board then decided to make the funds available to rent the Lutheran facility.

Mr. Thomas Winslow, principal of the elementary school said, "Regardless of where the kindergarten is held rest assured, we will do the best we can to give your children the education they need."

DNR ROAD PROJECT



The J. C. Compton Company, McMinnville, Oregon is surfacing a 5 mile section of the Clearwater Mainline Road from Allens Logging Company to Winfield Creek.

They are using a new method of surfacing, a mixture of 30 thousand tons of emulsion treated base, composed of 6% emulsified asphalt, SS-1H and 1/2% Portland cement. This mixture is applied in 3 layers, a pre-leveling course composed of 2% emulsified asphalt and water, plant mixed, then 2 separate layers four inch packed. This is then rolled and sealed with a sand seal.

A Department of Natural Resources project, the estimated cost is \$160,000.00. The trial period will be from 2 to 3 years and if it proves satisfactory this method of surfacing will be used extensively in this area.

The possibility of a transfer of insurance for the school was discussed, the school is now insured by Continental Insurance Incorporated. It was agreed after discussion to continue the same coverage for the year remaining in the contract.

Opening of bids for the coming year were opened. The bid of Far West Proprietary Company was accepted. Also the fire contract for purchase and service was awarded to Early Tire Co. Identical bid for the milk service were submitted by Carnation and Darigold. It was decided since the bids were the same to award each company the contract for 90 days. There was no bid offered for servicing the school vehicles. It was decided to award the contract to West DePue. DePue serviced the vehicles last year.

State Board will meet Sept. 4 and 5 to approve the plans for the new school building for state matching funds.

A special meeting will be held to advertise bids should they become possible before the next meeting.

September 8, at 7:30 a meeting will be held with the architects and advisory committee.

New contracts were signed by Mary E. Palmer, Claudia J. Johnson and Robert H. Stair. Clallam County Physicians Service will be available to high school students again this year.

Filing for position on the Quillayute Valley School Board is from September 5 to 19 inclusive.

School starts September 2.

No Injuries In 3-Car Collision

There were no injuries reported following the collision of 3 vehicles at the junction of Mary Clark Road and Highway 101, according to the Washington State Patrol.

A 1950 International panel belonging to the Washington State Highway Department, driven by Gary Putas, 25, Aberdeen, was traveling south on 101, followed by a 1956 Kenworth log truck driven by James L. Klahn, 54, Forks.

A 1959 International dump truck driven by Robert L. Schneider, 19, was stopped on the Mary Clark Road waiting to enter traffic. The State Highway vehicle driven by Putas, attempted to turn left on the Mary Clark Road, just as the log truck started to pass, the log truck struck the left side of the Putas vehicle, continuing on, striking the right front of the dump truck. The Washington State Highway vehicle was totaled, the dump truck received approximately \$1000 in damages, and the log truck approximately \$350.

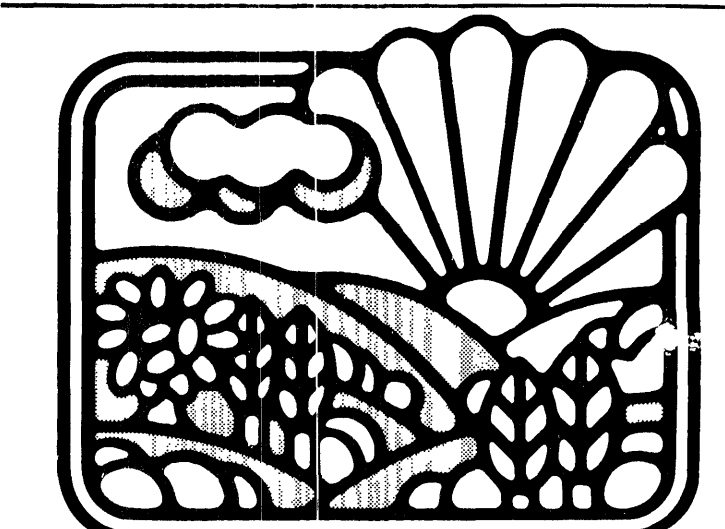

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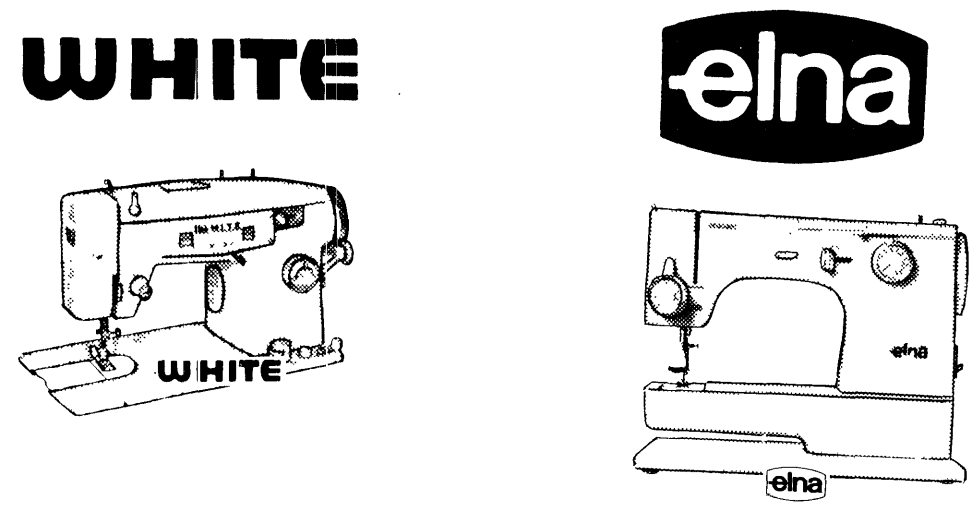

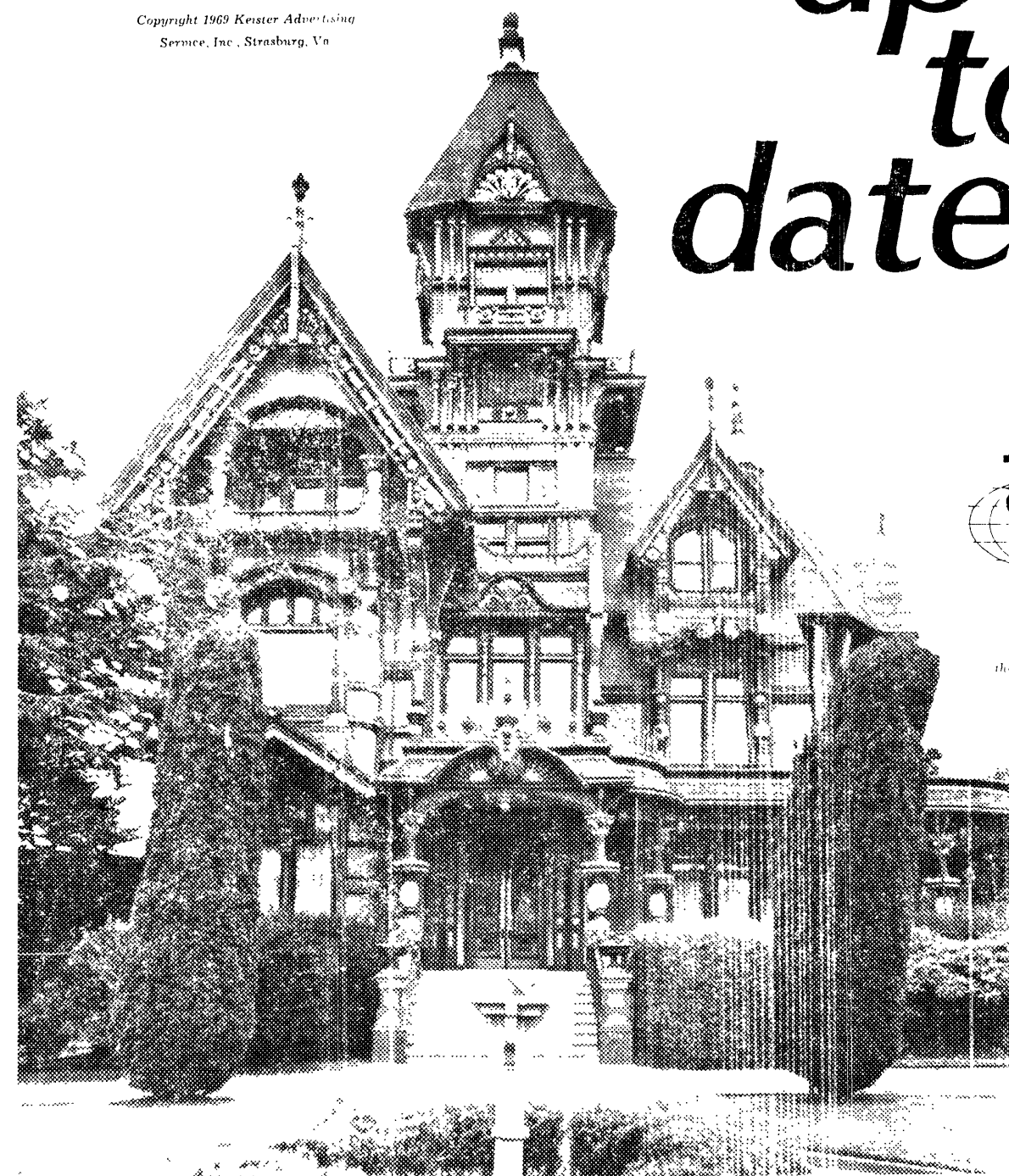
to turn our eyes toward heaven, forgetting the cares of life, drawing strength and receiving loving grace from our Father.
