ty, this is ridiculous. There is far too much area involved."

"One of the reasons that the Washington State Patrol has added a man to their staff in the West End is that the area was too large for one man to cover. The patrol works only in traffic but will assist us when called upon. They do no investigating of criminal cases at all; therefore we need another deputy for the investigations."

"I look for more co-operation and communication with the local law enforcement in Forks, as you know we had a problem for a while, but we expect no more of that kind of a situation."

"If the budget allows the hiring of another deputy for the West End we hope to be able to have him live in Sappho, this is a central location, but the housing will be a problem, for homes available in that area are practically non-existent."

Vote Nov. 4on Hospital Addition

The West End Hospital Board, at their monthly meeting Tuesday night, signed a resolution to be placed in the November 4th election ballot for remodeling and an addition of 10 rooms to the Forks Community Hospital.

The addition would be of 10 rooms and the remodeling and enlarging of the existing rooms, the modernization of the surgery and a possible intensive care unit.

The cost would be approximately \$300,000.00.

There has been no modernization or addition, except an ambulance garage, for 15 years. The hospital was completed in 1951.

The existing facilities will care for 16 patients only! The addition would add 20 beds.

Plans call for all existing rooms to be enlarged and remodeled. One of the rooms would be used for a recreation room for the resident patients, where they could watch T.V., read and also take their meals. At this time they have to eat in their rooms or in the ward.

Law Enforcement Problems Discussed

"I feel another deputy in the West End is most definitely needed," said County Commissioner Harry L. Lydiard in an interview with Gordon Oros, managing editor of the Forks Forum. "What we are experiencing now is a budget problem, there is an apparent budget increase of \$60,000 over last year. Most of which is slated for law enforcement."

The deputy in the Forks area, Jay Skews has worked many more hours than required to provide better coverage.

"I have discussed the forming of a co-operate action between Jefferson County and the West End of Clallam County, but have come to the conclusion that the distance relationship would make it impractical.

The putting of Forks under the jurisdiction of the county sheriff's office was also discussed.

ANNEXATION APPROVED

Official count on annexation is 42 votes for annexation, and 41 against. Individuals from this area annexed, can file for city offices provided they do this by 5:00 p.m. Friday, September 19th.

"I have been told that the Clallam County sheriff has made appearances in Forks to discuss the idea. At that time the Town Council did not think it was practical. Although there are possible benefits to be derived from such an arrangement, the loss of sovereignty experienced must be studied objectively.

"This plan might be feasible, but we must first investigate thoroughly and then make a decision," said Lydiard.

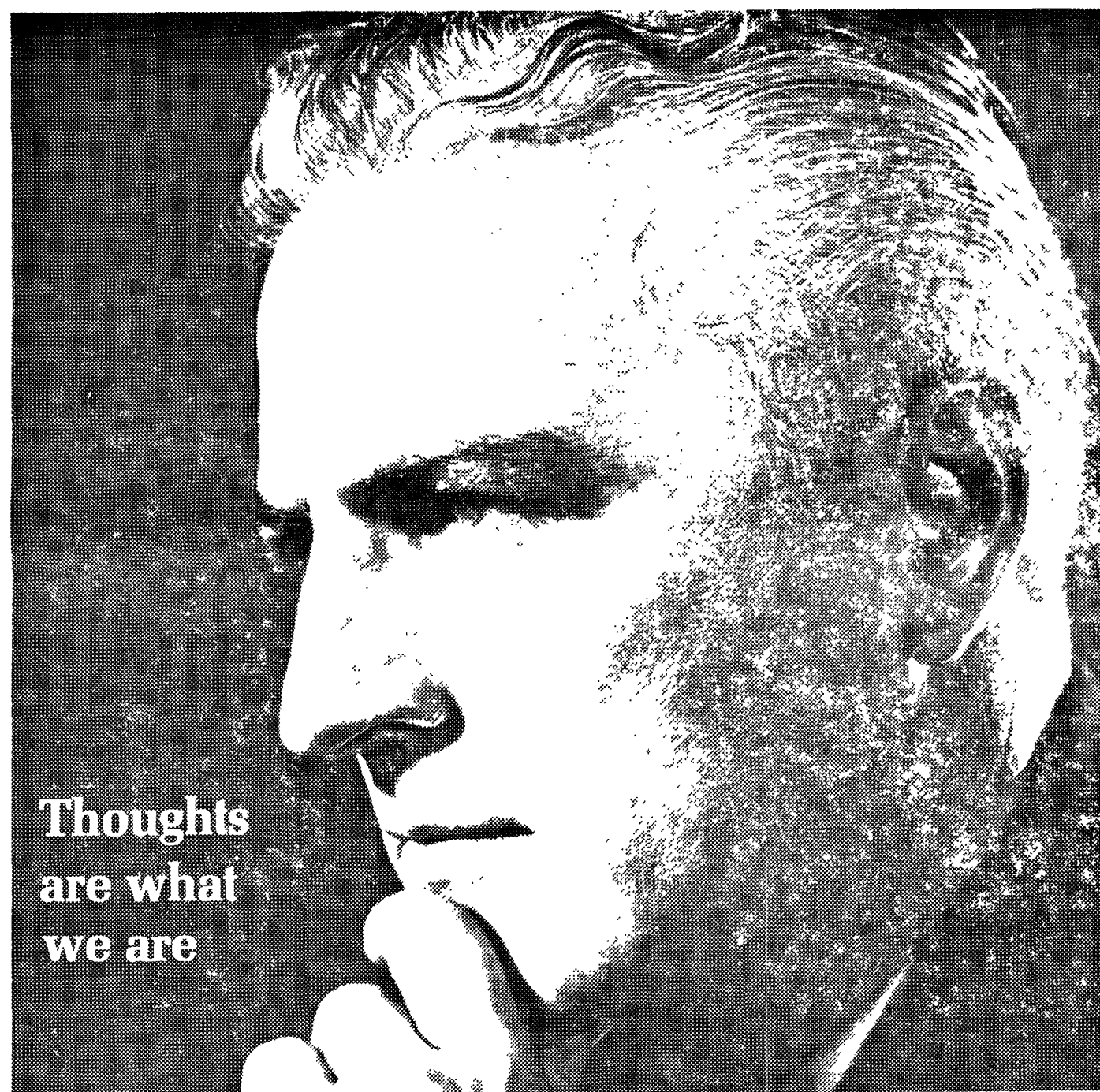
INMATE ESCAPES

Meditation

By Rev. J. William Hawk

It may be true that many of us cannot control certain situations around us, but, regardless of what the situation may be, we should be able to be in control of our own minds. But this control is threatened, and we should resist this threat. The twentieth century has been marked by vast efforts to eliminate, warp and sicken the great words of civilization. Man has been misled by propaganda, and the great words and thoughts have been misused to mean anything the group may want them to mean. Terrorist rule is called "people's democracy," war is called a "peace venture," God is announced as dead; sexual exploitation is called love; maintaining a privileged place at the top of the totem pole is called liberty and justice for all. All of the "fast buck boys" are out to capture the market--and therefore the minds--of the listeners. Their effort is to use powerful and meaningful words and ideas and emotions in order to sell a cheap product. The end

result is that these words and thoughts and feelings are cheapened. At its worst, the propaganda of the radical right and left attempts to destroy our trust in one another and to fragment a nation. For the truth, the facts, and for personal consideration and care it substitutes noise, ridicule and character assassination. These matters destroy the foundations of mind which make a thinking, humane man possible. One of the great civilizing enterprises in the years ahead is to resist this effort and defeat it on a community, national and world scale. Where are you in the battle for the foundations of the mind? The church is one place to be and there to build a community of genuine trust and love, there to promote clear and honest thinking, there to resist shoddy and cheap meanings of life. Jesus Christ, the Lord of the church, paid no cheap price to preserve the words and meanings of life. Just "belonging" or "attending" the church may not insure the great truths and thoughts. We, too, have to pay a greater price, if we want something more than "cheap" faith.



Thoughts are what we are

We are what we think all day long. Never underestimate the power of your thoughts. They are tremendously influential in molding character and action. They are, in truth, the parents of our behavior. Disposition and personality -- even character -- will very largely be determined by the thoughts we welcome to our minds each day. Since it is true that a soul is dyed the color of its thoughts, it is imperative that everyone be given guidance in thinking about truths and values that are noble and eternal.
