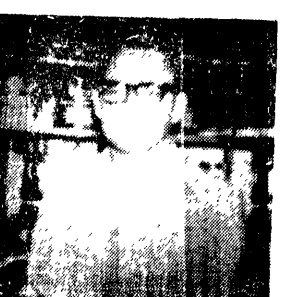

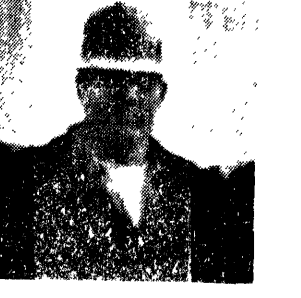

Those projects receiving top priority are: Calawah Way-PSH to East Corporate Limits, R/W, grade, drain and pave with 2" bituminous mix, \$11,000.00, East Division Street-PSH to East Corporate Limits, Curbs, gutters and pave with bituminous mix, \$20,000.00, A Street N.E. from 2nd Avenue to 5th Avenue, Grade, drain and pave with 2" bituminous mix, \$13,500.00, Sol Duc Way, from A Street to North Corporate Limits, Widened and pave, \$10,000.00.

Driver Suffers Heart Attack

A non-traffic fatality was reported by the Washington State Patrol. Bernice C. Pitts, 60, apparently suffering a heart attack while driving his 1966 Chevrolet pickup approximately 2:30 p.m. September 25.

The vehicle was south bound and left the road on the right shoulder, it traveled 700 feet crossing the road in a broadslide for 150 feet, flipped through the air, coming to rest on its top. The driver was thrown from the vehicle.

ITT Rayonier Welcomes Hunters

Nearly all of ITT Rayonier's 350,000 acres of tree farm lands in Washington State will be open to sportsmen during the 1969 hunting season, according to L. J. Forrest, vice president of ITT Rayonier and general manager for the company's Northwest timber operation.

The company's South Harbor Tree Farm in Pacific County, the Grays Harbor Tree Farm in Grays Harbor-Jefferson Counties, and the Callain Tree Farm in Clallam-Jefferson Counties will be almost entirely open to hunting. Access to a few areas will be restricted because of hazards involved from active logging and construction work. Daytime access in some of these restricted areas will be possible and special arrangements are being made to open restricted areas for weekend hunting.

Hunters are urged to hunt safely and to exercise caution when traveling logging roads.

Large wall maps giving detailed information concerning the restricted areas can be consulted at various offices in Hoquiam, Port Angeles, Shelton, Seattle and Sappho.

A pocket-size hunting map detailing logging roads, rivers and streams in each of the company's three Olympic Peninsula tree farms is available.

Lake Creek Sockeye Run in Difficulty

The run of Sockeye Salmon into Lake Pleasant experienced some difficulty this year, according to Dan Stewart of the Fisheries Department. The fish ladder originally built to obtain spawning salmon, had been damaged either by vandals or by time and weather. The ladder separation had been removed and the fish could not make their way up the creek. Stewart spent several days repairing the ladder and traps.

The Sockeye run is one of the largest in this area. The fish also go into Lake Ozette, Lake Quinalt, Lake Washington and the Frazer River to spawn.

"There was a group of young people from Beaver and Tyee who tried to help the fish over the ladder, and even though they had good intentions, we cannot allow them to even be in the stream. For there are just as many cases of people who tried to net the salmon and not for the purpose of conservation."

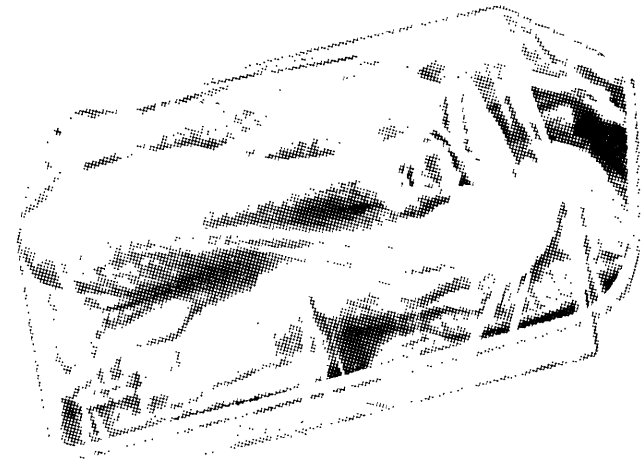
