New School In Progress

A new school may be added to the rest of FHS in the near future. Its site has been chosen at the field across the football area. However, when construction is to begin depends on the contractor and the state's final approval. The administration had hoped that the approval would come before Christmas.

Deadline has been set at August 15, 1970. The total bid for the new school has been set at \$506,204.00, to which the School Board may add another \$2,381,000. General Construction is estimated at \$316,278.00, electrical construction at \$102,976.00, mechanical construction at \$67,100.00, and an additional alternate of \$15,000.00. FHS was extremely fortunate that the bids had come in when they did. Otherwise, the building materials would have cost more, and state assistance would have been less generous. The new school, when it is completed, will contain three buildings with about 18 rooms.

Morgison Granted Postponement

Dennis Morgison, former Town marshal has been granted a weeks deferment of his order to either post a new \$17,500 bond or surrender to the Clallam County Sheriff's Department.

According to County Prosecuting Attorney Nathan Richardson, Morgison's attorney had to go to Washington D. C. on another matter and could not represent Morgison at the time of the scheduled appearance. Although the extension was protested by the Prosecutor's office, a time of one week was granted.

Morgison is scheduled to appear at the Clallam County Sheriff's Office or post the \$17,500 bail, pending an appeal to Appellate Court.

If Morgison does not appear by Wednesday, January 14, at the appointed time, a Fugitive Warrant for his arrest will be issued.

Important PTA Meeting

This month's PTA meeting will be held at 8 p.m., January 21, in the Elementary School Multi-purpose room. The program topic will be "next year's school bus problems". NEW PLAN FOR WEST END LAW ENFORCEMENT
According to Clallam County Sheriff Harley Bishop, a new plan to provide better law enforcement for the West End is being enacted. The plan includes the forming of a detachment of the Sheriff's Department. Somewhat similar to a police precinct, the detachment will include the three deputies in the West End plus two reserve deputies. Sheriff's Deputy Jay Skewes will be in charge of the group.

This will put Deputy Skewes in a position to be able to render decisions before made only by the Port Angeles office. SHERIFF BISHOP TO ATTEND CONFERENCE
Sheriff Harley Bishop will attend a National Drug Institute Conference in Denver, February 2 thru 5. This will be an in depth report of the use of marijuana plus many other aspects of drug use and public education of the drug problem.

COUNCIL STUDIES VARIOUS PROBLEMS

The Forks Town Council met Monday at the Town Hall.

The problem of "dogs" was again brought before the Council. The question of a leash law was discussed. There have been numerous complaints of dogs roaming the town. Although Forks has an ordinance stating that dogs must be licensed there were only 114 licenses issued last year. The marshal's office will study the ordinances and try to reach some sort of a solution to the problem. The Humane Society in Port Angeles has stated they will only handle complaints of a sick or vicious animal. The complaining party must sign a complaint in the case of a suspected vicious animal and the matter must be handled in court.

The question of boundary lines at the airport property was brought before the Council. The Council heard a request from Donald Ackerman to move one of the existing lines to provide a right-of-way, for the road, to Terry Hinchin. Hinchin wants to construct a shingle mill on a part of the airport property. The mill would be known as the Hinchin Bros. Shingle Company. The Council heard the request, studied the maps of the area and rendered a decision in favor of Hinchin. The Town

attorney, Frank Platt will draw up the legal lease agreement.

The Council heard complaints of local residents concerning the truck wash. It seems the water standing in the area is providing an enticement to children to play in the aforementioned water. The residents were informed by Major Kennedy that the water is surface water only and is too shallow to cause any danger to the children. The Council was also made aware of the condition of the truck wash as to cleanliness. The owner of the truck wash will have to provide someone to keep the area clean. It is not being done so at the present time. Mayor Kennedy will inform the owner of the truck wash concerning the Council's decision.

The treasurer's report was read and approved. Vouchers were approved and signed.

A request from Herb Beebe to increase the petty cash fund from \$100 to \$200, was approved.

Building permit to Marie Millsap, \$14,500.00, to build a house was granted. The new backhoe has been delivered.

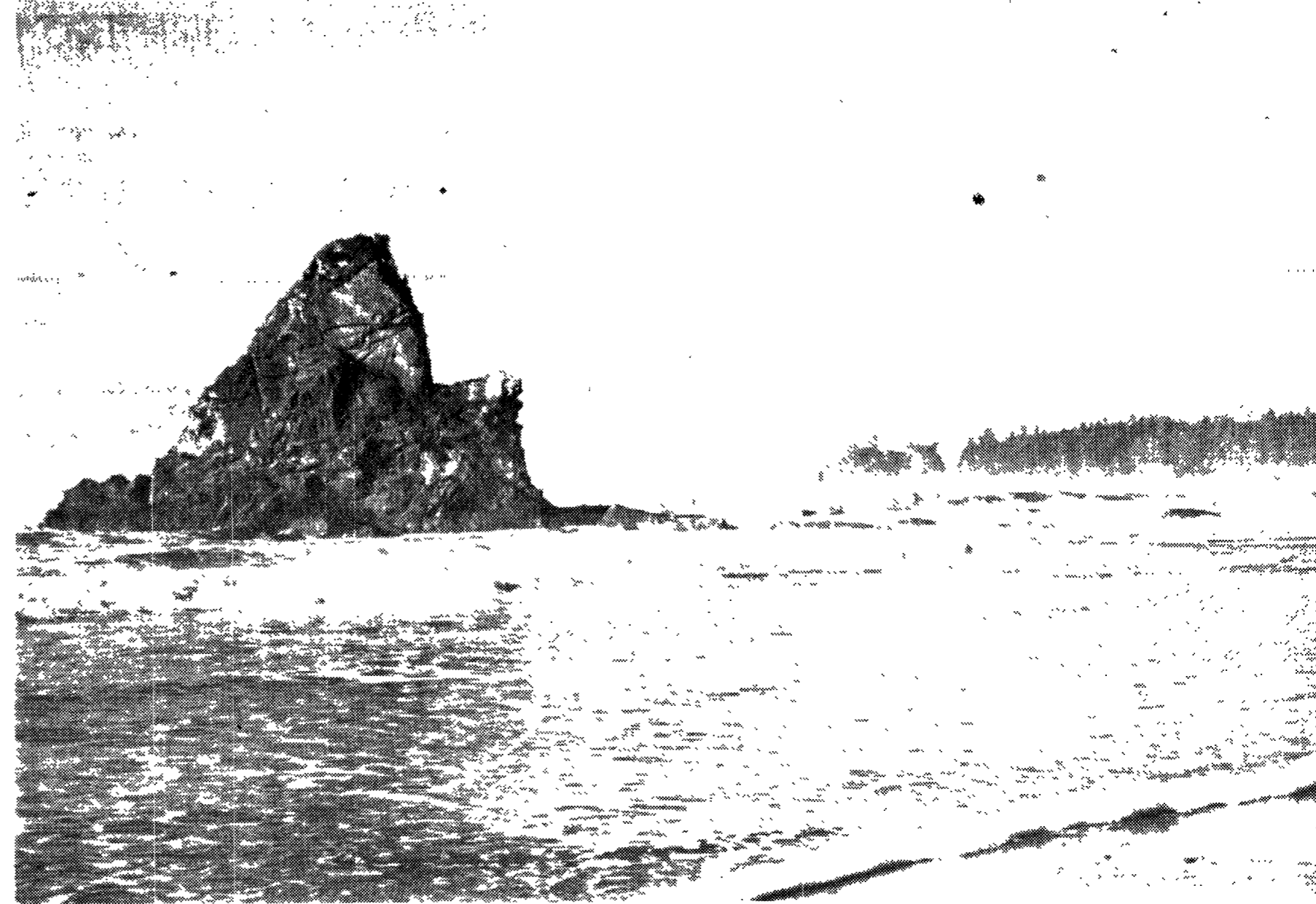

STATE-OWNED TIMBER SOLD

Thirteen parcels of state-owned timber, in 10 counties containing 37.5 million board feet of timber, were sold on December 29th and 30th, 1969, bringing bids totaling more than \$2.3 million.

Bert L. Cole Commissioner of Public Lands, reported that the total bid price was \$2,331,745.50. Three of the parcels of timber offered for sale were not sold.

The most valuable sale, also containing the greatest volume, was the Upper Schultz Creek Sale in Cowlitz County, with 11.4 million board feet of timber selling for \$1,110,180 to Pope and Talbot Company at Kalama, Washington. The sale had been appraised by the Department of Natural Resources at \$595,900. The overbid on this parcel ran 86%. The average overbid for all 13 sales was 45%.

The total December sales sold were appraised at \$2,331,745.50.

Hostelries Sets Opening Date

Clallam County Hostelries, Inc., has set February 1, 1970, as the date the converted "Outlook Inn" will be ready to receive mentally retarded clients from the State Department of Institutions. The actual opening of the Outlook Inn as a group home for about 500 adults will be the end product of many months of effort by many generous and dedicated people.

Over a year ago, a group of concerned local citizens began seeking a way to provide critically needed residence facilities. With the successful experience of Diversified Industries, Inc., as a guide, they founded a non-profit corporation in February 1969. In August, a Federal grant was received from the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare which would pay a substantial portion of the salaries of the operating staff for the first five years. On September 1st, the corporation hired an executive director, Lt. Col. Edward V. Polhamus, who was retiring from the Air Force, on September 15th, the corporation purchased the Outlook Inn for use as a group home, with the expectation that full operation

could be established in a very short time. In late September and October, the problems began to pile up and finally produced an apparently unsurmountable obstacle.

At the time the building was purchased, preliminary estimates indicated that it could be converted for use as a group home for about \$5,000. Subsequent inspections and requirements laid on by various State agencies ran the cost up to \$18,000. Add to this ordinary furniture, equipment, and operating loss during conversion, and you come up with total initial costs of near \$25,000.

For a time, it appeared that a substantial portion of the entire amount would have to be raised in cash before the project could proceed. Then, in rapid sequence, events took place which reduced the obstacle to manageable size.

The basic purpose of a group home for mentally

retarded persons is to provide a meaningful existence for some unfortunate people who have been generally neglected. Most retarded persons live a limited existence because there does not appear to be a "right kind of place" for them to live. Few families can provide adequate care, and generally, at best, allow retarded members to exist without developmental stimulation. Institutional life has a negative effect on all humans, and a profoundly "de-humanizing" effect on retarded people. It has been found that placing retarded people in community homes with a stimulating environment and vocational training can produce a degree of progress and independence which would have been considered impossible a few years ago.

The purpose of the group home project is to provide benefits to individuals, but there are important economic aspects which should concern the local community. Under existing programs which keep retarded people in large institutions, it costs about \$330 per person per month. This is all state tax money. Under the group home program, the State would pay

\$110 per month and the Federal government would match this with an equal amount. On the local level, Clallam County Hostelries would bring into the local community State and Federal operating funds plus the Federal staffing grant. The total over the next five years would amount to \$108,000 in State funds and \$128,000 in Federal funds.

Commercial financing arrangements were found which would underwrite the two most serious safety requirements for a total of \$13,000. Refined budget estimates indicated a capability of amortizing a higher debt load than previously indicated. Fund drive and community support efforts began to produce results. It now appears that the remaining requirements can be met by a combination of donations of cash, work, materials, equipment, and furnishings. The amount of cash required could range from \$6,000 to \$10,000 depending on other donations.

Because of the scope of the project, Clallam County Hostelries has asked for community-wide support, under joint sponsorship of two service organizations. The Ki-

wanis Club has accepted the responsibility of spear-heading a fund drive by contacting other organizations, arranging speaking engagements, and general publicity. The Junior Chamber of Commerce has undertaken the collection of non-monetary donations and the entire project of building renovation with the exception of major specialized contracts.

To make the Outlook Inn the right kind of place for a certain kind of people-mentally retarded but generally sufficient adults-requires many kinds of things and the efforts of many people.

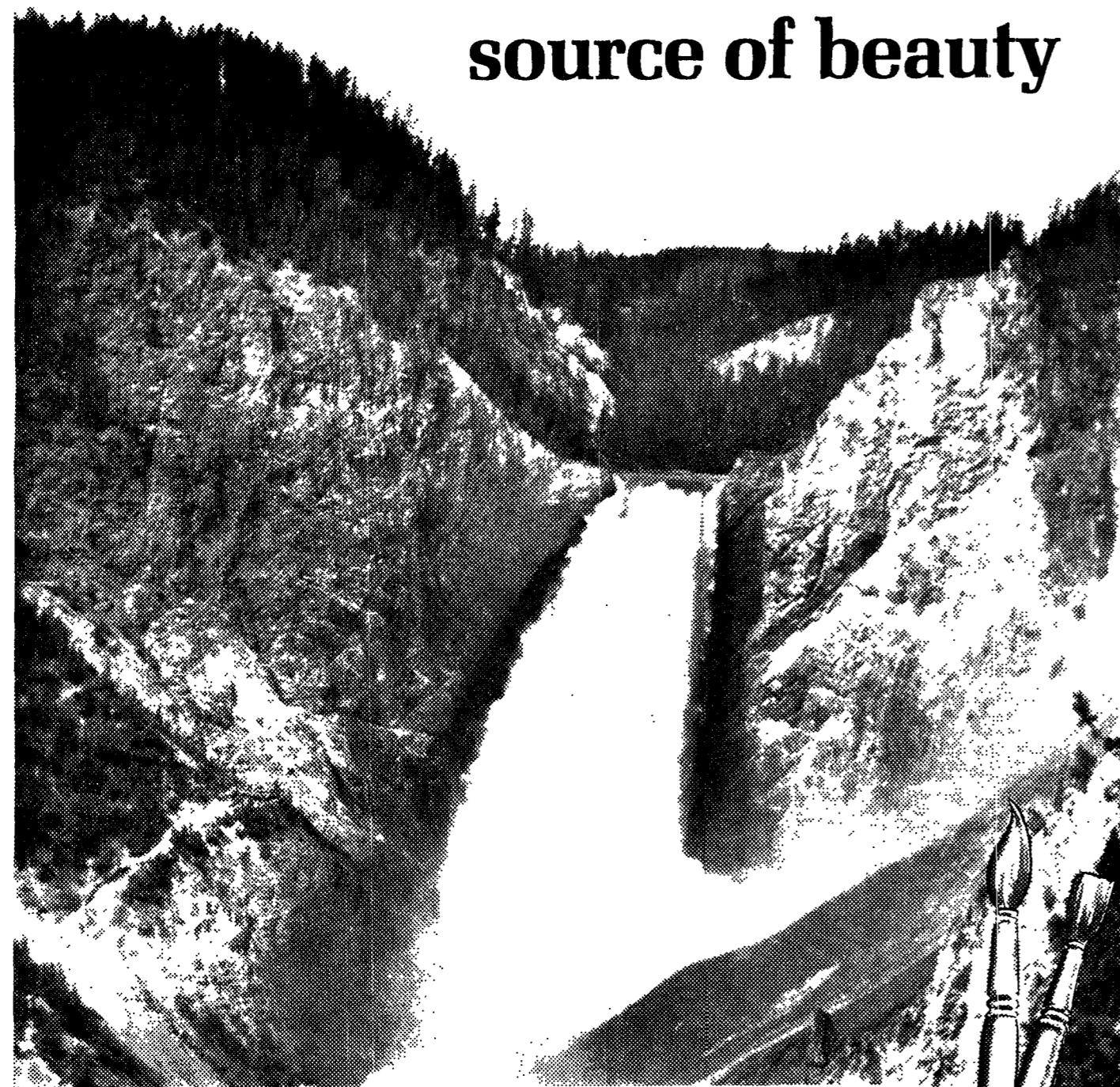
This is a gigantic land. First, there is the gigantic sea. Rialto Beach draws one with a fearful fascination. The moun-

Controversy Over New Policy

A new policy for absentees has been introduced to FHS. It is designed to cut down on the size of unexcused absences.

When the absentee returns to school, he is given a piece of paper, which he must take to each of his teachers. They provide him with make-up work, and the office gives him so much time to complete them. If the students fails to meet these requirements, an "F" will be given to him.

However, the absentee must remember to pick up this paper at the office, or it will be counted as a tardy and an extra assignment will be given to him. So far, this new policy has had its ups-and-downs. It is possible that it will cut down the number of absences, and therefore, it will be beneficial to many people. On the other hand, students seem to resist this new policy and prefer the old system more.

Originally, an absentee wrote his own excuse, had it signed by his teachers for re-admittance, and returned it to the office at the end of the school day. This honor system also had its ups-and-downs. The administration was unable to know which excuses were valid and which were not. Tardies were merely shrugged off by students as nonsense.

In order to find out which policy is better, the final result will have to be thoroughly examined. Both the administration and the students want to voice their opinions about it. One or the other will have to prevail, and hopefully, to everyone's advantage.

300 Million BF State Timber Sold in 1969

Over 304,000,000 board feet of State timber was sold for nearly \$22,000,000 during calendar year 1969 in the Forks district, announced E. C. Gockerell, North Olympic Field Supervisor for the Department of Natural Resources.

The 52 sales were bid up from \$10,374,000 to \$21,957,000 an increase of 112% over the appraised price. Average stumpage bid was \$72.22 per thousand board feet.

This compares with \$57.87 per thousand bid for 283 million board feet sold during calendar year 1968 and \$32,666 per thousand for 306,000,000 board feet sold during calendar year 1967.

"Bidding fell off the second half of the year", added Gockerell, "But still remains high. Export continues fairly strong which has helped take up the slack for the poor domestic market and generally poor economic condition of the housing industry."

Seventy-six percent of the timber sold was hemlock and silver fir, 19% cedar and 5% spruce and Douglas fir.

About two-thirds of the timber sold is tributary to Port Angeles markets; the other one-third is tributary to Grays Harbor markets.

"The large State holdings of old growth timber in the Forks District continues to bring a large income to the public trust including common schools, universities, agricultural schools, normal schools, capitol and country" said State Land Commissioner Bert L. Cole.

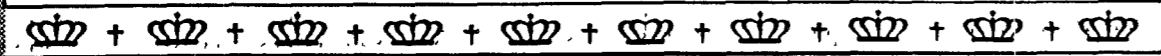

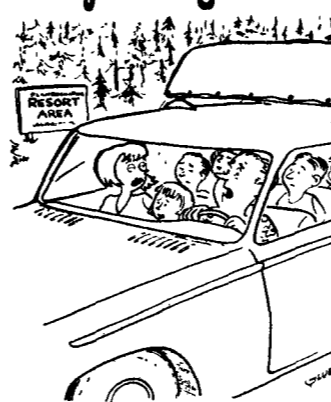

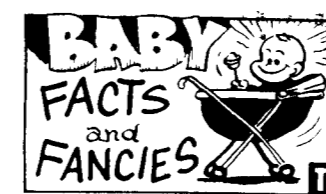

Geologic Report To Be Issued

Bert L. Cole, Commissioner of Public Lands, announced today a new report for students on the geologic history leading to present day topography and mineral distribution in Washington State. It will be released shortly by the Division of Mines and Geology of the Department of Natural Resources and will be available upon request.

"Our state's geologic history can be deciphered by studying rock and fossils contained in these rocks," Cole said. "Three important facts of our geologic history are: (1) the area that is now Washington has always been near the sea, bordered by it, and frequently has been covered by a shallow sea; (2) this area of the earth's crust repeatedly has been subjected to uplift and folding as compared with the more stable central part of the United States and (3) the area has often been the site of volcanic activity."


Geologic changes over several billion years have provided Washington State with a wide variety of mineral resources that help support the overall economy of the state. As population increases, the demand for such

common mineral products as sand and gravel accelerate rapidly. The multiple-use policy of the Department of Natural Resources provides for the controlled extraction of mineral resources from state-owned lands and requires reclamation of any surface disturbance so the land will continue to be used for other productive purposes.

Teachers will find the new publication useful in teaching earth science courses. Others may be interested in learning about the origin of Washington landscapes. Included in the report are a geologic map, a map showing the seven physiographic provinces of the state plus illustrations of topographic features, fossils and rock formations, and the locations and type of operations of the mineral industry.


The report is by Vaughn E. Livingston, Jr., geologist and Assistant Supervisor of the Division of Mines and Geology. Entitled "Geologic History and Rocks and Minerals of Washington," the report is Division of Mines and Geology information Circular No. 45, and can be purchased for 50¢,

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 113

AN ORDINANCE authorizing a temporary loan from the Current Expense Fund to the Street Fund, declaring an emergency and making an emergency appropriation.

WHEREAS, the Town of Forks was obliged to make more street repairs than were contemplated when adopting the 1969 Budget, and

WHEREAS, the Current Expense Fund for 1969 has surplus funds available for a loan on a temporary basis to the Street Fund, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Town of Forks as follows:

SECTION ONE: That by reason of the aforesaid, an emergency is hereby declared to exist making necessary the passage of this ordinance and the loan and appropriation herein contained.

SECTION TWO: This ordinance was introduced more than five days prior to passage and received the required votes of one more than the majority of the Council.

SECTION THREE: Expenditures for the 1969 emergency street repairs are hereby authorized in the sum of 1500.00 dollars.

SECTION FOUR: A temporary loan from the Current Expense Fund to the Street Fund in the sum of 1500.00 dollars is hereby authorized, which loan shall be repaid on or before December 31, 1970, and which shall bear interest at five per cent per annum.

Passed by the Town Council, approved by the Mayor, and attested by the Clerk, this 12th day of January, 1970.

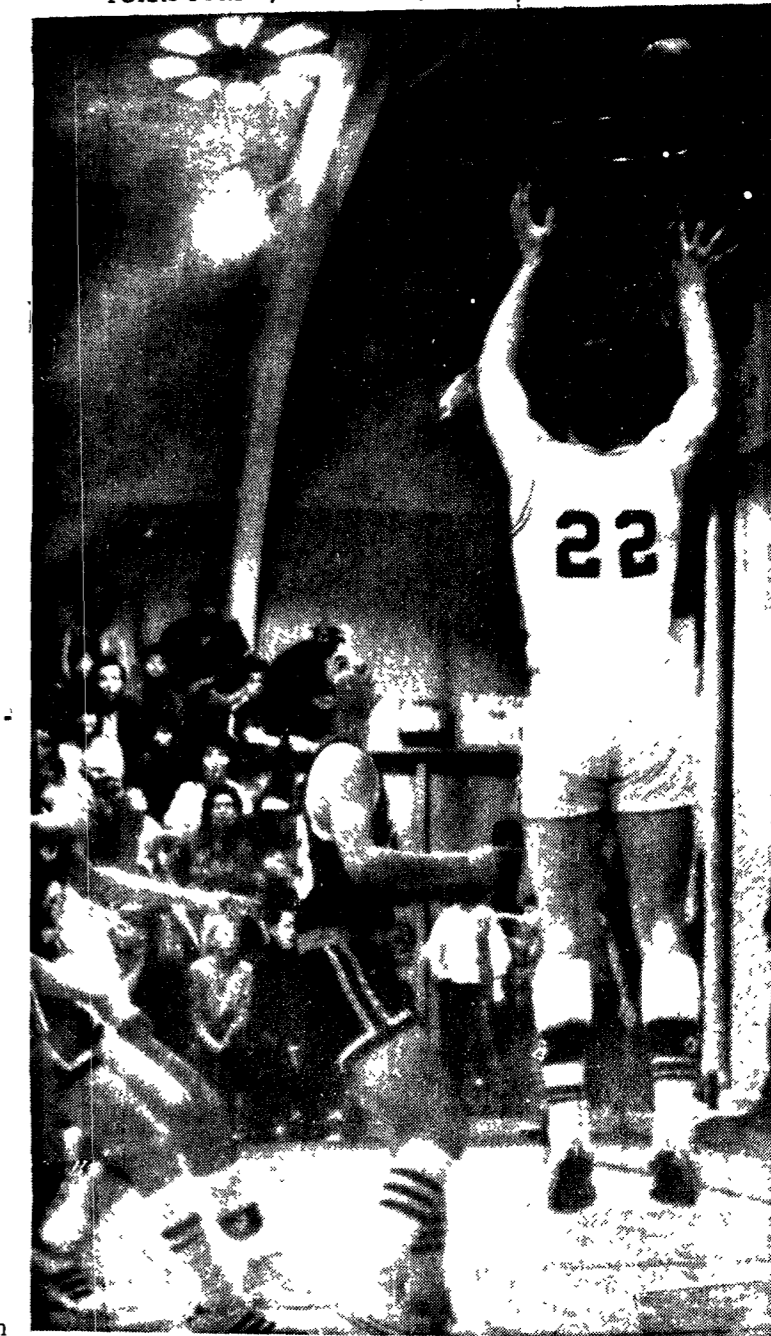

Auto Club Offers Reward

 Fred C. Osmer, of Tacoma, President of the Automobile Club of Washington, said the decision to offer the matching reward was made by the two Auto Clubs following a recent highway department report that the combined problems of litter and vandalism on state highways cost Washington State taxpayers more than \$1 million during 1969.
 Osmer said it is hoped that the two rewards will encourage more citizens to accept personal responsibility in reporting vandalism. He said that without citizen help, it is almost impossible to apprehend persons who destroy such things as highway signs, signal equipment, lights or rest area facilities.
 Anyone observing incidents involving damage to state property are urged by the Auto Club to contact the nearest law enforcement agency or the nearest state highway facility, giving all possible data about the incident. Name and address also should be given in the event a reward is justified.

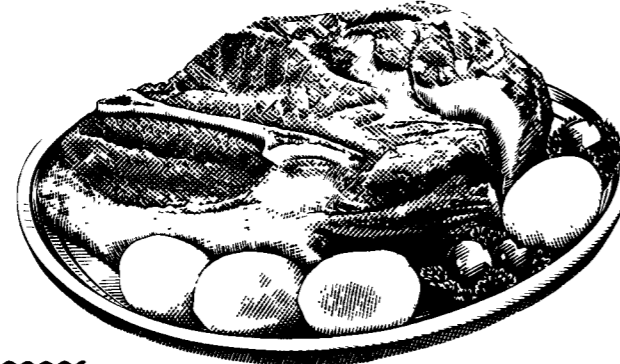
