Library tea to be held

On Sunday, April 12, during the hours of 2-4 p. m., the National Library Week Tea will be held at the Library. The Friends of the Forks Memorial Library and the Board of Trustees unite in sponsoring this annual event.

All friends and those who are interested in library service are invited to come and visit the library during the tea.

The Forks Memorial Library is approaching its 25th anniversary and this year the Tea will especially honor those who helped start the library. From the early 1940's, when the idea of a public library for Forks was first proposed, up to the present, many people in this community have helped with time, money, and effort to make our library a reality.

The first actual library service was provided on January 19, 1946, in the old grade school building. At that time the collection consisted of 600 books. A year and a half later the library had to move as the school needed the room because of increased enrollment. Finally a small wooden building across the street was made

available. This had originally been built to raise rabbits, so for the next five years Forks had a "rabbit hutch library". However, this building was too small for the growing library.

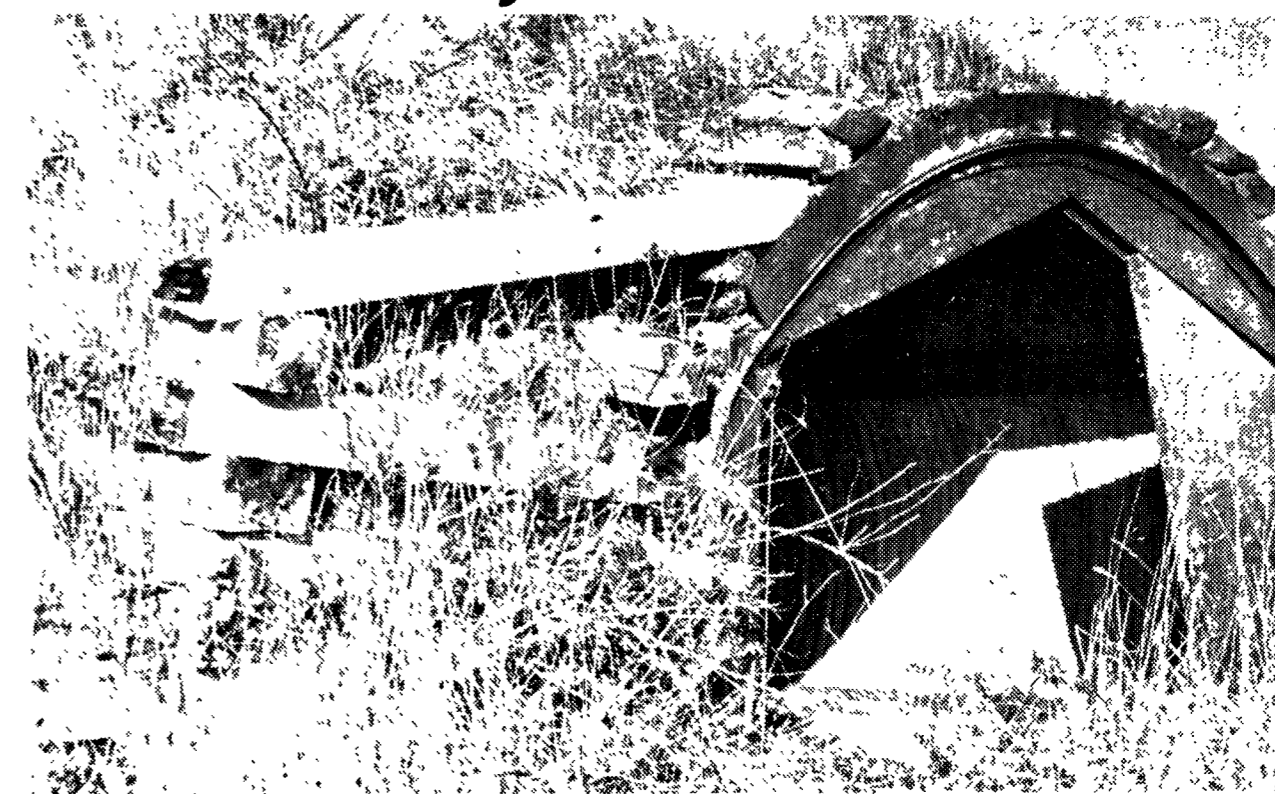
In 1948, the Library Association was formed. This was made up of people who wanted a library and also wanted to honor all of those from the community who had fought in World War I, World War II, and later, the Korean War. Funds were raised by popular subscription from individuals and organizations. On July 2, 1951, the new building was started. This was built on a donated lot, with much of the materials being donated. Almost all of the labor was donated.

The new Forks Memorial Library was dedicated on June 28, 1952. At that time the book collection only partly filled the building, but our library has continued to grow and now is full and providing a much needed service to children and adults in our community. As a branch of the Clallam County Library, the Forks library can obtain for you any book in the county collection.

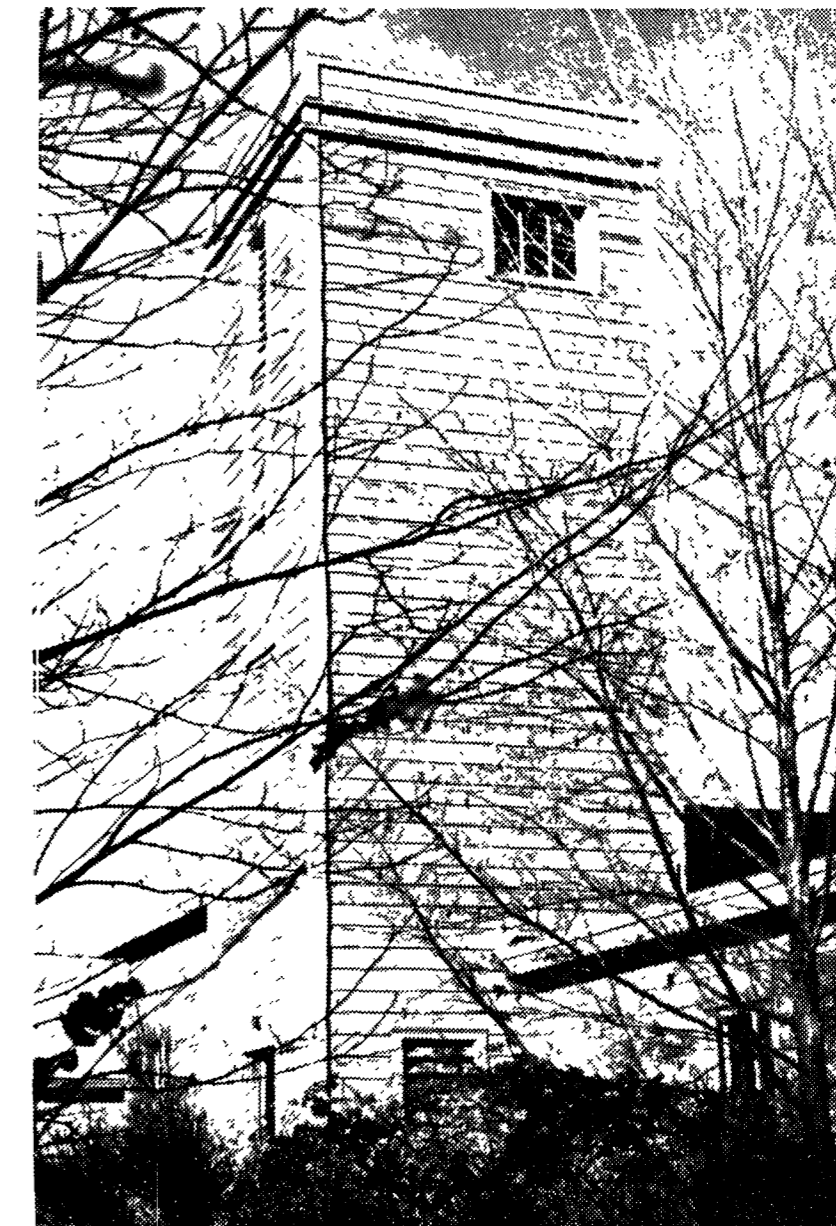


Broken windows are common here on the Quillayute.

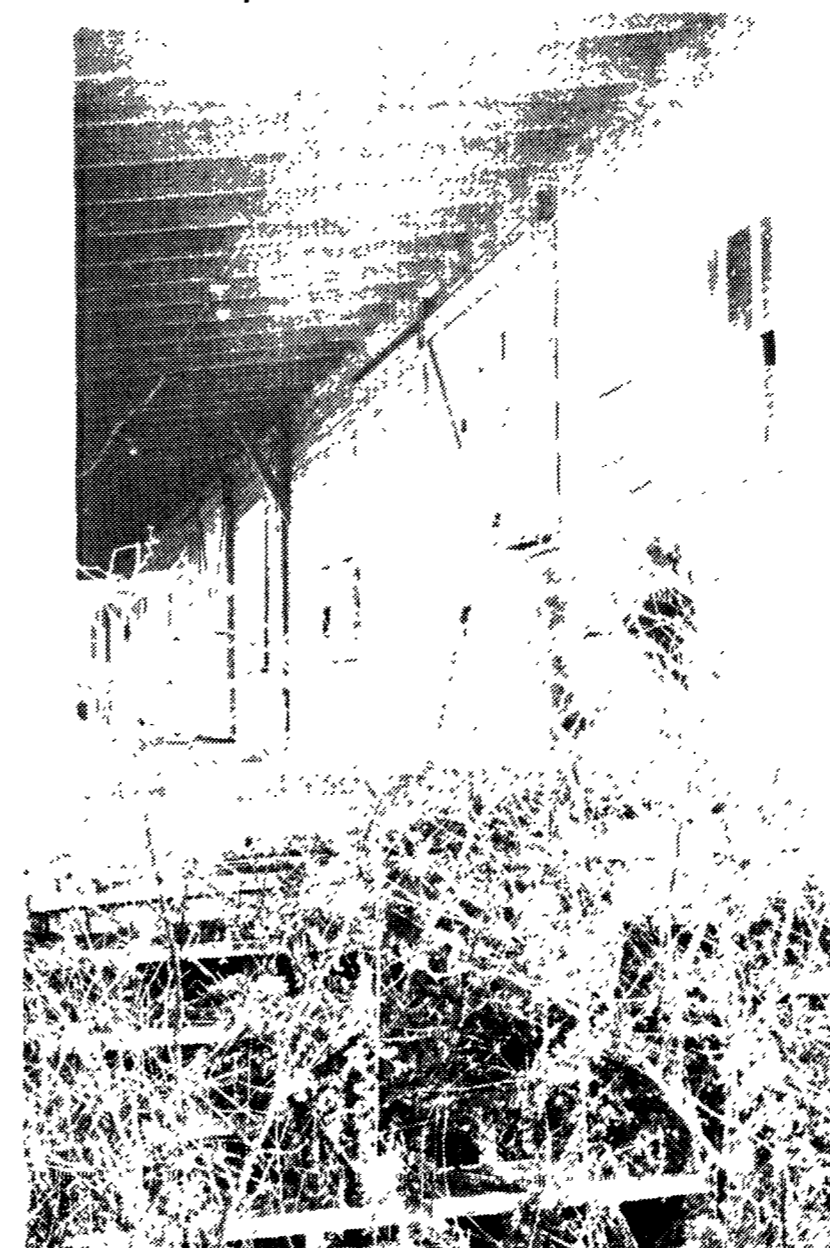


A small-arms depot now gives way to brush. It's braces crumble with time.

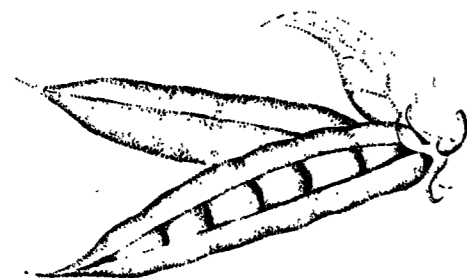

OUR LARGER HOME

Children born into today's world are born into a world that is larger and smaller at the same time. Our planet has become a community but we are expanding our skyways out among the stars. In this swiftly changing world where our knowledge doubles every ten years the need for something stable is pretty obvious. People look to the home and to the church for stability, and rightly so. Security during the early years is second only to love as a requirement for normal healthy development of body, mind and spirit. But in the ever increasing tempo of modern life two other ingredients are of vital importance.

Love must be coupled with wise, dependable discipline. Sloppy, sentimental love produces the impulse ridden child who learns to maneuver his parents and later seeks to maneuver other persons and situations to his self-serving ends. To achieve the feeling of self-worth the child must, early in life, be encouraged to accept responsibility at a level where success is assured. Peas in a Pod?



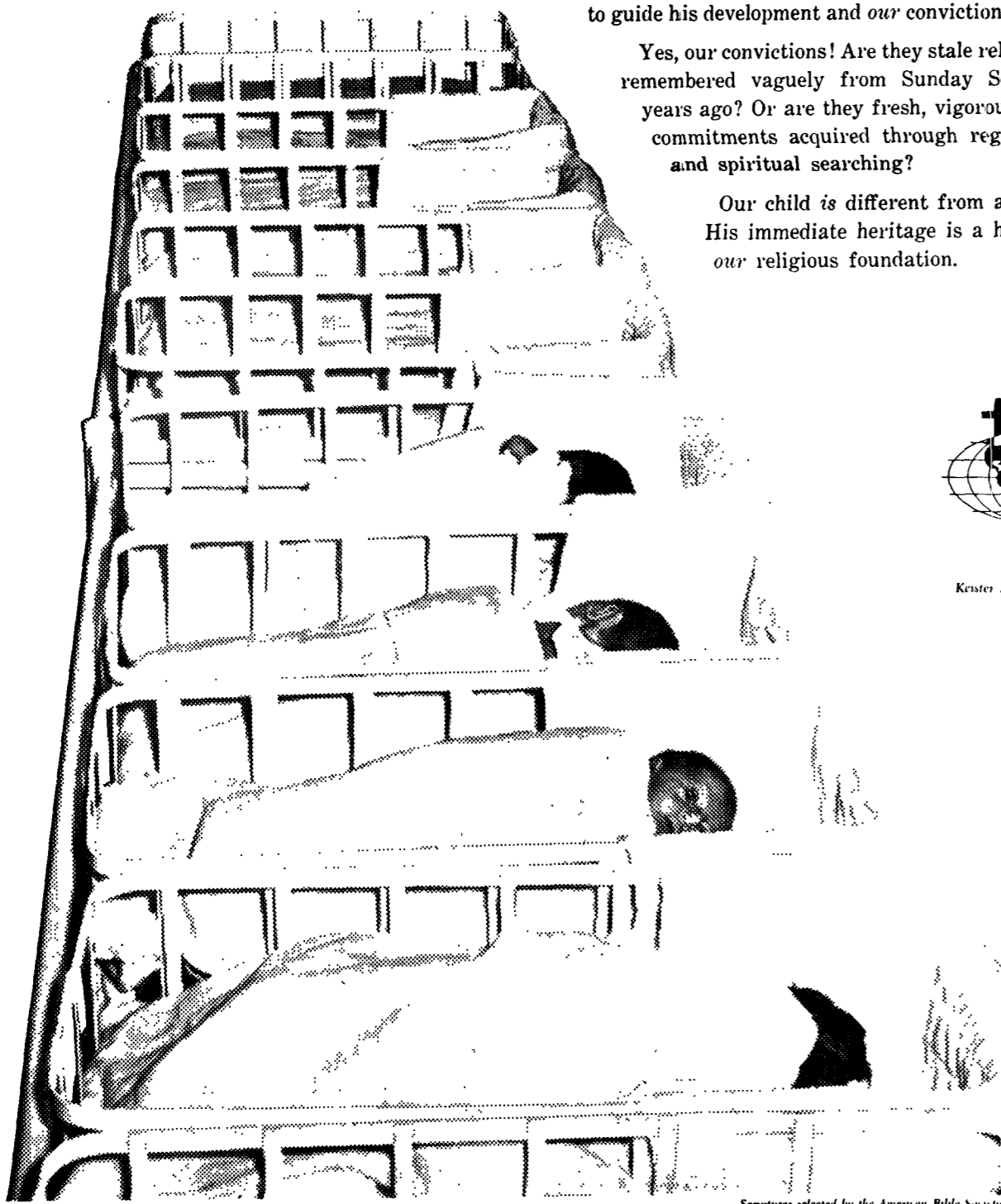
All men are created equal! But their mothers see it differently. And their fathers don't hand out cigars simply to attest to their part in the population explosion.

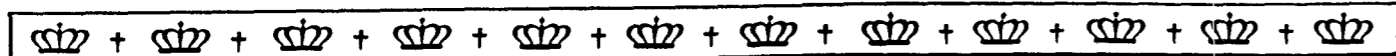

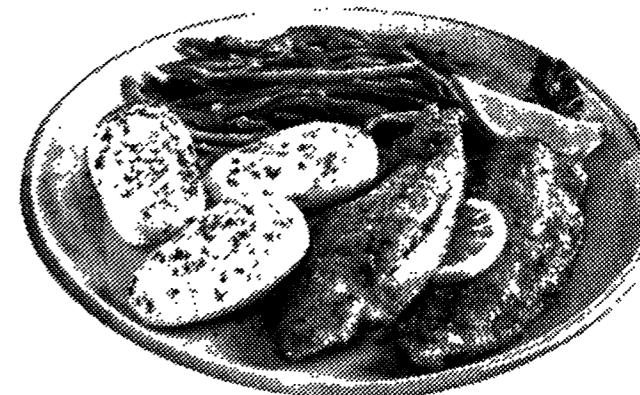
