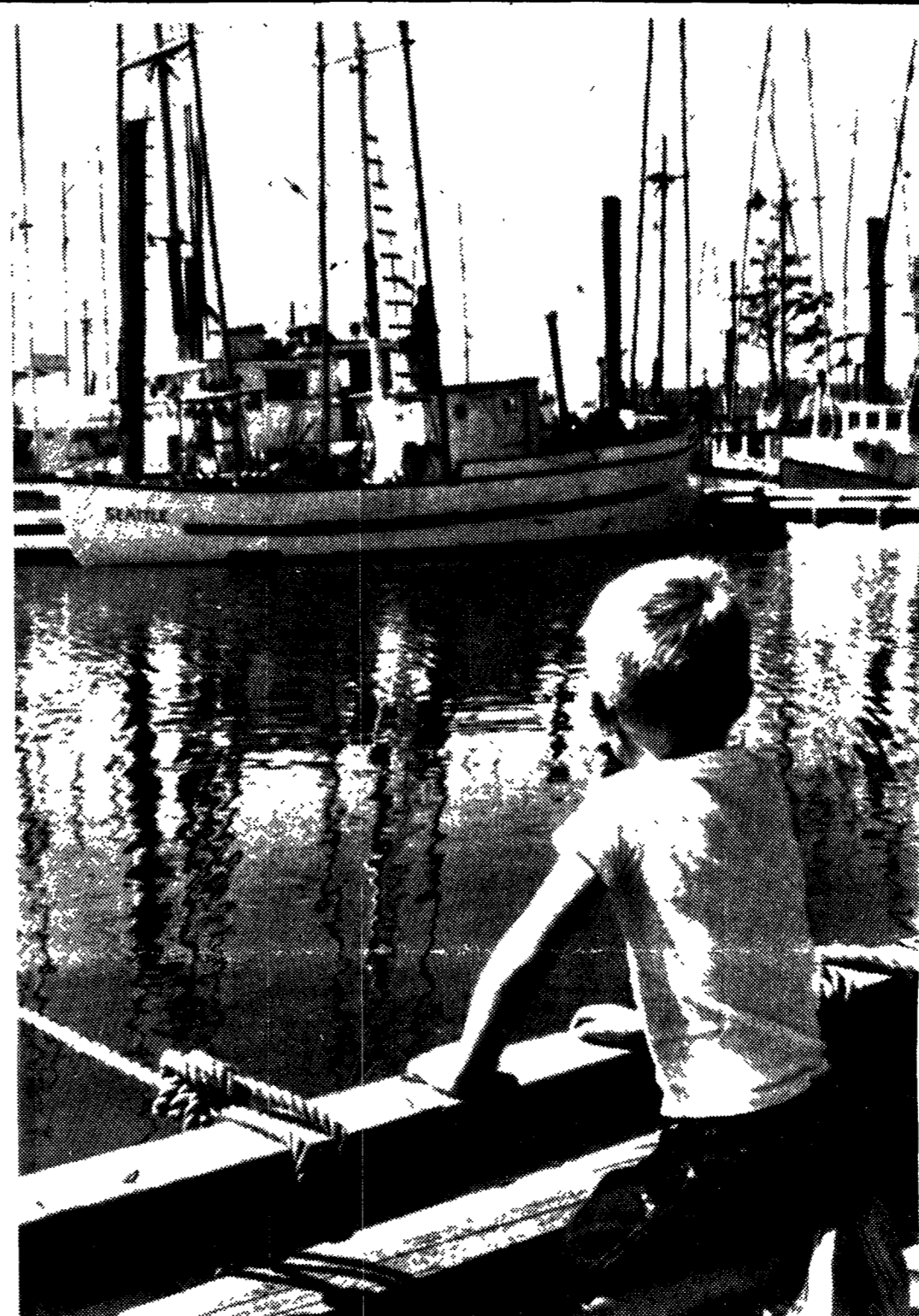

### DEMOLITION RULES

1. All cars are to be stock production model American made.
2. All cars are equipped with single release shoulder harness and seat belt.
3. All glass removed or rolled down into body panels, windshield's may be left in.
4. No reinforcing of bumpers, grille or fenders. Fenders may be cut out one foot.
5. All cars equipped with standard cooling system, fan can be removed.
6. Doors, hood and trunk must be roped shut, no wire or welding. Rope must have one foot ends exposed from knot.
7. All side chrome over 18 in. must be removed from side of car.
8. All cars must pass safety committee inspection.
9. All gas tanks filled with water or removed and heavy 5 gallon can secured in back seat and gas line must come from top part of can.
10. All contestants are to be 18 years of age or over.
11. Drivers must wear approved AMA Group I Helmet or better.
12. All cars must have numbers 12 in. high or larger on doors, roof, hood and trunk.
13. All cars shall display a pull-down flag.
14. No loose objects in cars.
15. Oil bath air cleaners must be emptied of oil.
16. All batteries must be strapped down and can be mounted on floor of car no dual lashups, stock batteries only, no car or truck batteries.
17. No locked rear ends.
18. All trailer hitches to be cut off cars, including braces to frames.
19. No raised rear ends.
20. All haritops must have a roll bar on the drivers side.
21. Fire wall may be cut out to clear engine.
22. All cars must have a chemical fire extinguisher next to driver.
23. Decisions of the Referee and Judges will be final.
24. No liquor in the pits before, after or during the event. Any driver found drinking will be automatically disqualified with his car and pitman.
25. Cars will enter the area and circle in a clockwise manner until flag is dropped and the siren is sounded signaling the start of race.
26. Hitting a car on the driver's door results in an automatic disqualification.
27. After a car has not moved, or been dead for two minutes, the flag must be lowered.
28. Cars having their flags down must not be hit by other cars.
29. Drivers must remain in their cars until end of event.
30. No one can work on cars until after 3rd heat.
31. Only driver and pitman and sponsor can be in pits.
32. Powder Puff Race will have the same rules.

### MEETING TONITE

The Quillayute Valley School Board of Directors' agenda for the meeting to be held tonight is as follows: They will discuss the (a) Establishing percentage factor above maintenance scale for transportation and custodial-maintenance supervisors; (b) Establish guidelines for job descriptions of supervisors; (c) Appoint addition to maintenance staff; (d) Appoint study hall supervisor; (e) Re-furnish or repair #3 furnace; (f) Terms acceptable regarding settlement with electrical contractor; (g) WSSDA educational support survey request; (h) Insurance program; (i) School bus considerations.

### SEAT BELTS CUT HOSPITAL COSTS

A study recently published by the Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory has shown that seat belts not only save lives, but reduce serious injuries as well, according to the Washington Traffic Safety Commission. The Cornell researchers studied all rural highway crashes occurring in Utah during a one-year period, involving a total of 14,261 drivers and passengers. Throughout the year, Utah state patrolmen completed an additional seat belt investigator's report to provide the data. Of all those involved in accidents, only 16.5 percent were wearing seat belts. By comparing similar crashes, it was found that failure to use seat belts increased the chances of instant death or severe injury by 100 percent. The study underscored the importance of wearing seat belts to prevent ejection from the vehicle, but found that this benefit accounted for only about one-quarter of the total benefit to seat belt users. The ejected motorist's death risk increased by 3,000 percent over the occupant who remained inside his vehicle. Ejection rates for non-belted occupants was nine times higher than ejection rates for motorists wearing seat belts.

But what ever they call me, I am your flag, or as I proudly state, the flag of the United States of America. I remember some time ago, I think it was Memorial Day. People were lined up on both sides of the street to watch the parade. The town's high school band was in back of me and naturally I was leading the parade. When your daddy saw me coming along waving in the breeze, he immediately removed his hat and placed it against his left shoulder so that his hand was directly over his heart. Remember?

And you, I remember you. Standing there as straight as a soldier, you didn't have any hat but you were giving the right salute. They taught you in school to place your hand over your heart. Remember little sister---not to be outdone, she was saluting the same as you. I was very proud as I came down your street. There were some soldiers home on leave and they were standing at attention giving the military salute. Ladies as well as men all paying me reverence that I deserve.

Now I may sound as if I am a little conceited. Well I am. I have a right to be. Because I represent the finest country in the world, the United States of America. More than one aggressive nation has tried to haul me down but they all felt the fury of this freedom loving country. You know, you had to go and defend me. And a mighty fine job you did too.

What happened? I'm still the same old flag. Oh I have a couple more stars added since you were a boy. A lot more blood has been shed since that Memorial day so long ago. Dad is gone now. The old home town has a new look. The last time I came down your street I saw some of the old landmarks were gone, but in their place shining majestically in the sun were a number of new buildings, beautiful new homes. Yes sir, the old town sure has changed.

But now I don't feel as proud as I used to. When I come down your street, you just stand there with your hands in your pockets and give me a small glance and then look away. When I think of all the places I have been, Anzio, Guadalcanal, Korea and Viet Nam. Who knows where I'll be next. Then I see the children running around and shouting. They don't seem to know who I am. I saw one man take his hat off and then look around. He didn't see anybody else with theirs off so he quickly put his back on.

Is it a sin to be patriotic any more? Have you forgotten what I stand for? Have you forgotten all the battlefields where men fought and died to keep this nation free? When you salute me, you are actually saluting them.

## WSU PRESIDENT SAYS, NO

Washington State University President Glenn Terrell has answered 11 demands made by six campus groups calling themselves "Third World" organizations.

In six cases the president said "no" or explained why the requests were beyond the authority of the university to act. To four other demands he said that the university has been working toward a solution. In the case of removing all "non-union grapes" from the campus, Terrell said no grapes have been purchased since last fall.

Terrell said "no" to demands that the university immediately disarm campus police, eliminate all plainclothes and undercover agents, abolish the discipline board and conduct a 10-day racism workshop mandatory for all faculty and staff.

He voted two proposals dealing with a Third World review board and the rights of Third World people to be tried by their "peers", but agreed to convene the Human Relations Committee to examine what can be done further to fight racism through student publications and student organizations.

The president said the university already is doing something about recruiting minority students and has tried to keep some faculty members in the Black Studies Program who have announced they are leaving WSU.

After answering the demands in a prepared statement three pages in length, Dr. Terrell closed with a "challenge to the groups issuing the 'musts' and to the entire university community: "We must redouble our efforts to find solutions to problems of racial discrimination. We must use reason, dialogue, and appropriate action. Racial violence and racial inequities will not be solved by countering threats of violence. The University is not a place where solutions should be sought in an atmosphere of confrontation and threats."

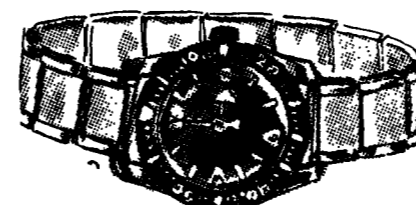

Separate \$500 awards are presented by the Northwest Timber Division in the Clallam County area and in the Grays Harbor area.



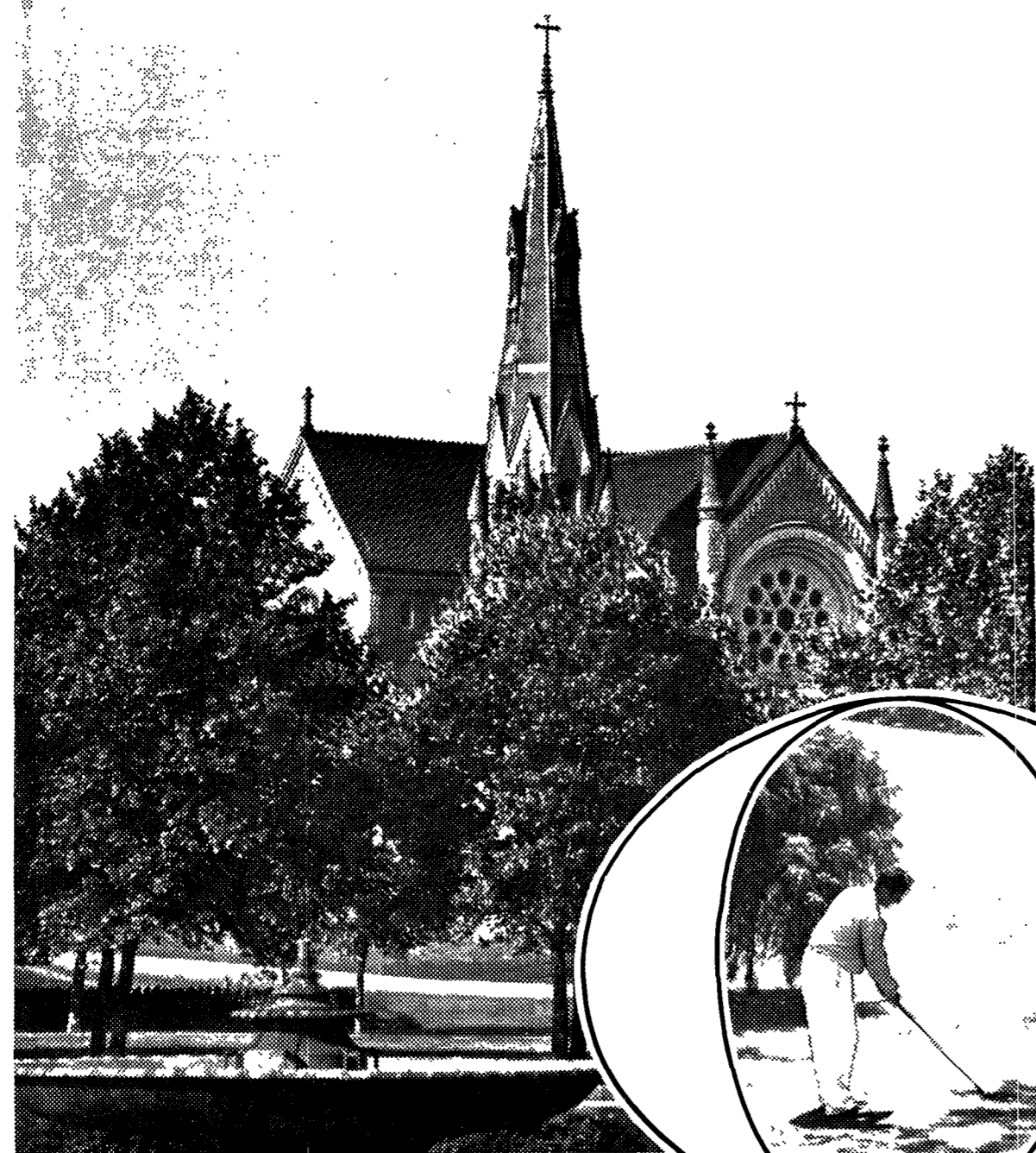
I have intended no evil, but because of me, talent and genius have come to naught, courtesy and kindness have failed, and the promise of success and happiness has yielded sorrow and disaster.
