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
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GORDON OTOS CHOSEN GRAND MARSHAL **WHO WILL REIGN AS QUEEN OF THE 4th ?**

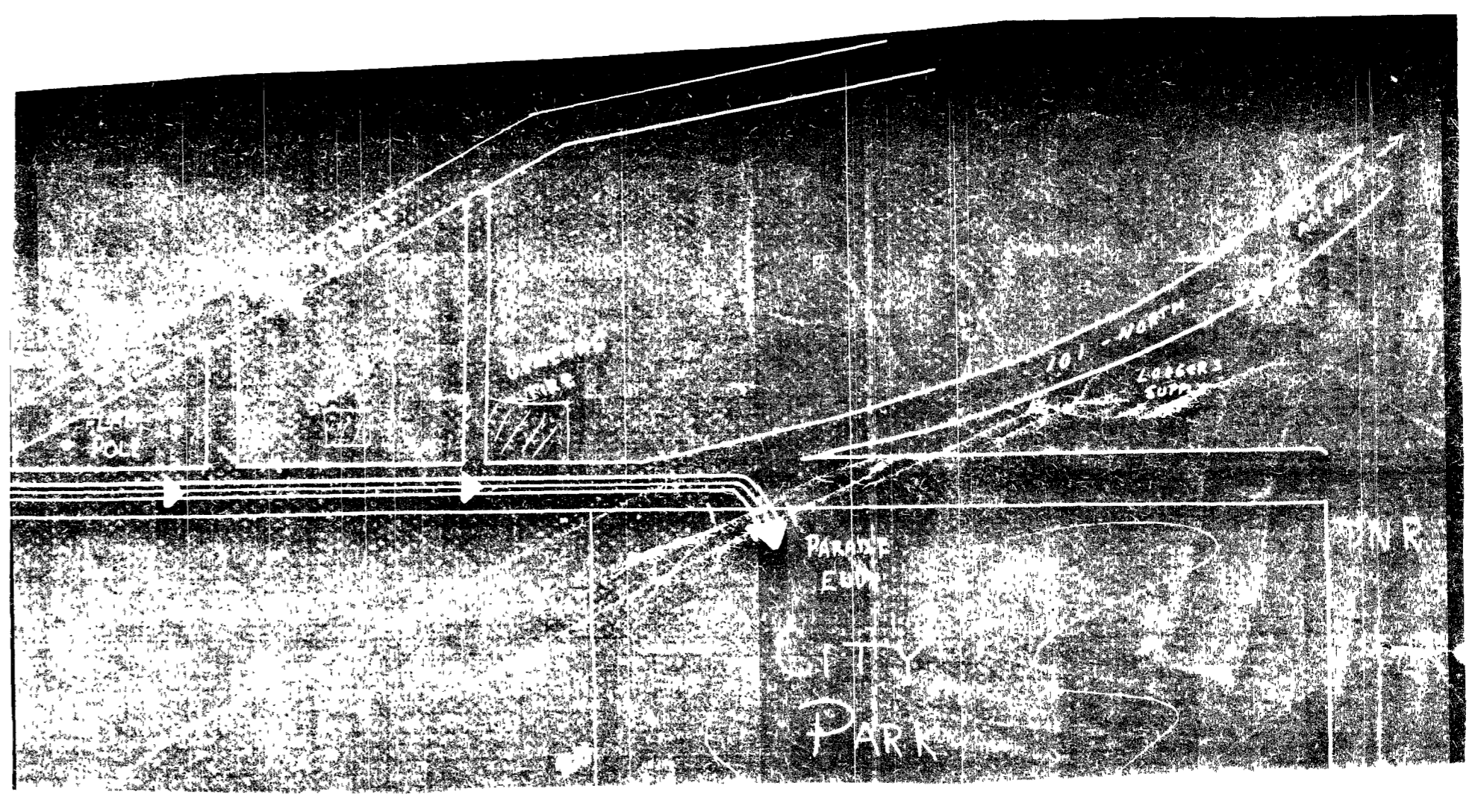
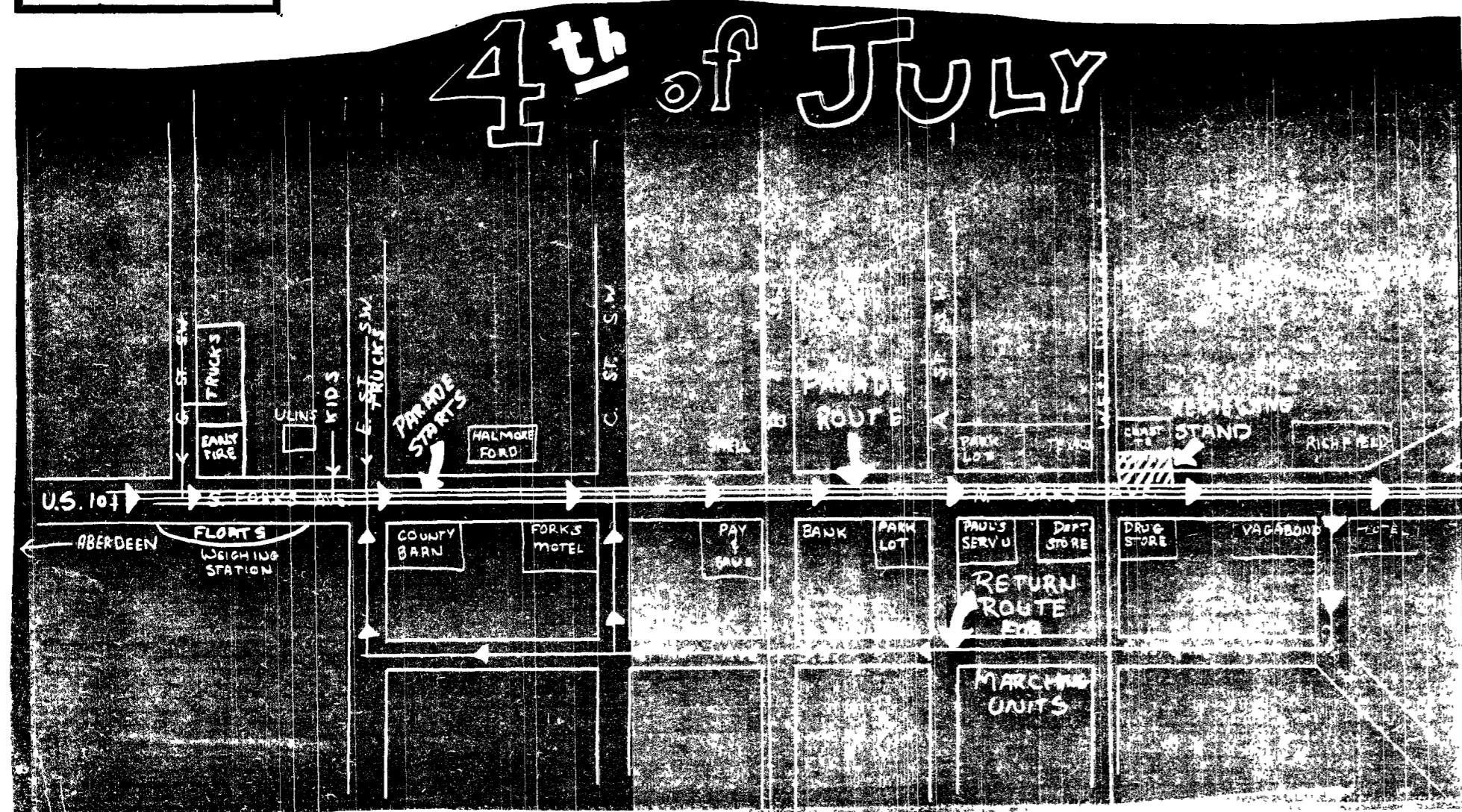
The matter was closed and the committee went on to further business.

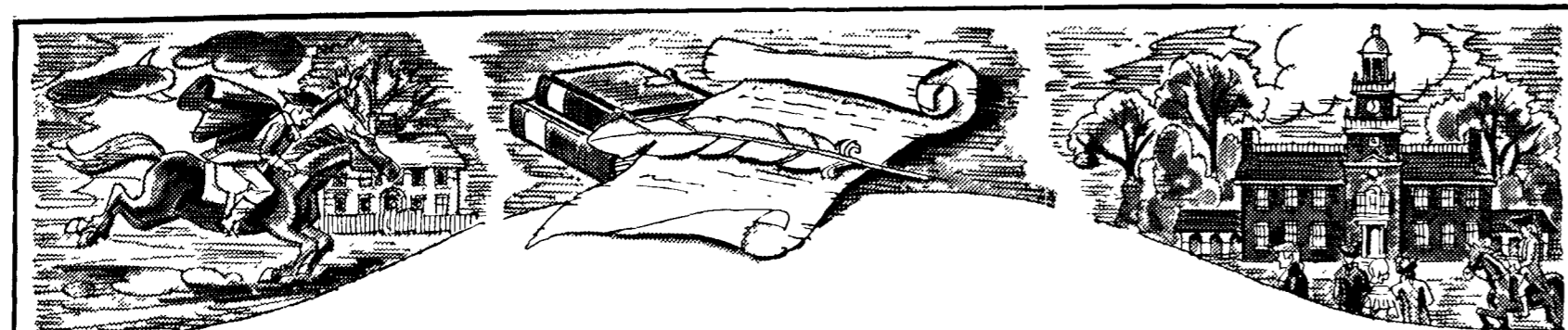

TRUE LOVE OF COUNTRY DOESN'T REQUIRE HATING OTHERS. Sometimes we are apt to think of patriotism only in regard to the heroics of war. Surely all those who, in the past, and in the present have fought and died deserve our deepest tribute of honor. This is true, even if we do not all, always agree with the foreign policy of our government.

But love of country shows itself in other important ways. Those who love America do not litter the highway with beer bottles, paper and garbage. Those who love America so not knowingly exploit her natural resources without thought for the future. Those who love America will readily cooperate with every agency which girds itself to do battle against pollution. He who puts the \$ sign above the flag is unworthy of his country.

Narrow patriotism in which love of country involves hatred of others has no future. I heard of a man who put up a sign on his lawn. It read: "I am a 100% American---I hate niggers and Jews". His neighbor across the street put up another sign which read: "I am a 200% American---I hate everybody".

A religious man who believes in one God and prays--"Our Father", must have good will in his heart for all men. If God's Spirit is in us we must share his love and concern for all mankind. We must see the whole human family as the family of God. This attitude calls for a Declaration of Interdependence. On our shrinking little planet there is no knowledgeable alternative--we must think in planetary terms. We must consider the human family from God's perspective and point of view.

OUTDOOR LORE

"Welcome Visitors"

Welcome to Forks "the steelhead capital of the world" and "home of the Olympic elk". While Forks is busy celebrating the Fourth of July, the surrounding wilderness offers some of the finest outdoor recreation found anywhere. Clam digging, salmon fishing, hiking, camping, trout fishing, and more awaits the visitor. Here's a look at area outdoor sports which await you, the adventurer.

CLAM DIGGING---Razor clams are the most popular clams on the Peninsula. The stretch of sandy beach between Ruby Beach and Kalaloch is an excellent choice as the clams are plentiful and the beaches are easily reached. Hard shell clams may be found just north of the mouth of the Hoh River. Minus tides prevail this weekend.

SALMON FISHING---LaPush, a 15-mile drive from Forks, offers real sport in the way of fighting king and silver salmon. Neah Bay and Sekiu on the Strait of Juan De Fuca, are also popular salmon fishing areas.

HIKING---Many trails lace the back country, penetrate the river valleys and follow the beaches of the Forks area. For short beach hikes try Second or Third Beach, just south of LaPush. For overnight trips hike the north wilderness beach from Rialto to Lake Ozette or the south wilderness beach from Third Beach to the Hoh River.

Two favorite high country hikes are the Hoh River trail to Mt. Olympus and the Sol Duck loop trail leading to Deer Lake, Seven Lake Basin, the High Divide and Heart Lake. Six-hundred miles of trails await the hiker in the Olympic National Park.

TROUT FISHING---All streams and lakes are now open in the Forks area. Sea-run cutthroat, rainbow, summer-run steelhead and white fish await the angler. Salmon are now running the Hoh River and will enter other Forks streams in late summer.

AIR - SEA RESCUE AT LAPUSH

The U.S. Coast Guard, Quillayute River Station and the helicopter from Port Angeles took part in a dramatic sea-air rescue operation, June 25.

The Coast Guard at LaPush received a call from Harley's Resort that two boats were overdue. The boats had left the resort at 9 a.m. and at 3 p.m. had not returned.

A fixed wing aircraft joined the search and the men were spotted on the beach at Misquito Creek, 8 miles south of LaPush.

The Coast Guard's 44-foot boat was dispatched to the area. Skipper of the craft was Larry Thompson, crew members were S/A Klein and Seaman William A. Byrd. When the craft reached the beach area where the men were located the surf had picked up and there were 5 to 8-foot breakers. Seaman Byrd swam through the breakers to shore to assist the stranded men. He administered first aid and found the 14-year-old boy, Blaine Rowe suffering from hypothermia and going into shock. This message was relayed to the station in Port Angeles to send a helicopter.

After the helicopter arrived the boy and his father were evacuated to Port Angeles. The helicopter was piloted by Lt. Cmdr. Tydings.

After the evacuation of Rowe and his son, a brother Tom Rowe and Seaman Byrd stayed on the beach. A line was attached to the boats and they were towed in by the Coast Guard craft.

The 44-foot craft received some damage to the hull while staying in close to the beach during the rescue. Two of the men aboard the boats, Roger and LeRoy Rowe, hiked in from the beach to the road and were on their way into LaPush to report the incident when they were informed that the rescue had taken place.

The men, Jerry, LeRoy, Roger, Tom Rowe and Jerry Rowe's son, Blaine, were from Pocatello, Idaho.
