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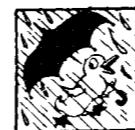

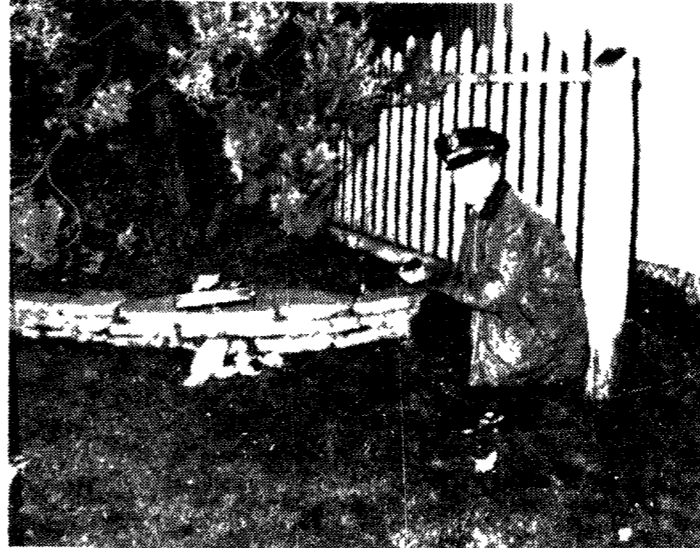

SEVERAL INJURY ACCIDENTS



Three young men from Queets were seriously injured in this accident.



This vehicle driven by Mary Oliver of Queets, left the road south of Forks and struck several trees.



Several people, including two small children were injured in this accident.

The Washington State Patrol reported several accidents in the last few days.

The first occurred September 24th at approximately 3 miles south of Kalaloch on Highway 101. The driver, Ronald Obi, 21, of Queets was south on 101 and drove off the right shoulder, going out into

the car. The driver received lacerations of the head. Passenger, Mickey Saito, 20, was thrown 35 feet from the car. He received a fracture of the arm, laceration to the eye. The other passenger, Harvey James, 22, of Clearwater was thrown 45 feet from the car. He received a fracture of the

bladder. The injured transported to Community Hospital in Aberdeen by Forks ambulance.

The 1962 Oldsmobile Starfire was demolished.

Another accident occurred at approximately 2:30 a.m. on the Old Burnt Mountain Road, near Sappho. The driver, Gary Miles of Forks was driving a 1964 Ford station wagon, drove off the right shoulder of the road, rolling over several times, continuing down a 135 foot bank, coming to rest on its side against the trees. Miles was taken to Port Angeles Hospital and treated for a possible chest injury and released.

At 10:10 p.m., 1.6 miles south of Forks on Highway 101, just south of the David Mansfield road, a vehicle driven by Mary Jane Oliver, 24, of Queets was south bound on 101 and failed to negotiate a curve to the left, the vehicle went out of control for 220 feet, spinning around and coming to rest against the trees bordering the road. Miss Oliver was taken to Forks Community Hospital. She was treated for contusions of the left shoulder and a bump on the head. The 1966 Dodge stationwagon was dem

The last accident occurred Tuesday morning at approximately 9:50 a.m., at the LaPush Junction and Highway 101, the vehicles were driven by Michael Milton, 27, of Beaver, and Theodore Taylor, 63, of Boise, Idaho.

The accident occurred as the Taylor vehicle attempted a left turn onto 101 from the LaPush road and was struck by the Milton vehicle, south on 101.

The injured were, Michael Milton the driver, he received contusions of the sternum, possible injuries to the ribs, laceration of the right knee. His wife, Janice, received a laceration of the forehead, and chin, laceration of knee, fractured left wrist. His daughter, Stephanie, 3, received a fracture of the right fibula with displacement, laceration of the chin, they were also admitted to the hospital in Port Angeles. The Huskies' optimistic historians will point out that that was Washington's third game of the 1960 season. And it went on unbeaten after that, ending a glorious 10-1 season with a victory over Minnesota in the Rose Bowl.

This year's Navy-Washington game also is the Huskies' third contest of the season, and Husky backers suddenly have thoughts even of making it to the Rose Bowl this season.

Those hopes sprang forth after Washington's stunning 42-16 victory over Michigan State in its opening game. The Huskies rolled up the most yardage ever against a Michigan State team (598 yards), and their defense allowed just one touchdown from scrimmage.

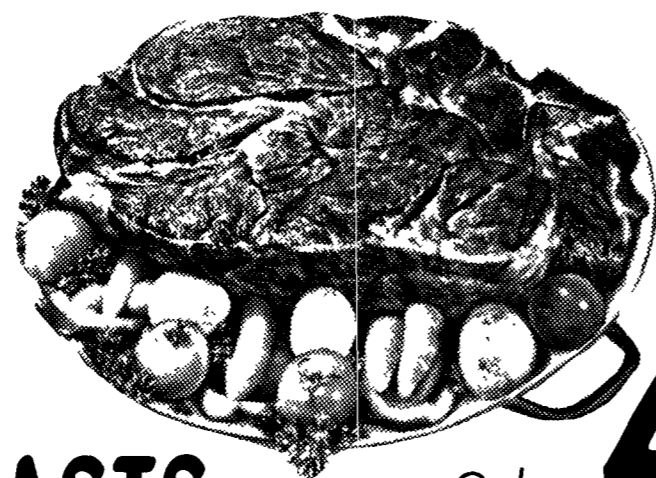
