Judge Holland retires

Judge Avery Holland, judge and court commissioner for the last 12 years has announced his retirement, for health reasons, effective January 1, 1971. Judge was born in Piedmont, North Carolina in 1892, moved to this area in 1930. He was married December 20, 1914, and he and Mrs. Holland have one daughter, Mrs. Wilma Shipley of Rockway, Oregon. First elected Justice of the Peace, Judge Holland said he has married about 200 couples and still some will call and ask him to marry them. He was appointed Court Commissioner by the Superior Court Judge

Upon leaving office, Judge Holland was asked if he had anything to leave with the people of the area, he said, "I think every citizen of this county should serve at least one month as justice court judge." That remark was self-explanatory. Judge Holland said he has enjoyed working with the law enforcement officers and although, they have not always agreed, he wishes them the very best for the future. As his last act as judge, Judge Holland has bequeathed his title as "hanging judge" and his noose to Herb Beebe. Beebe will take over January 1st. Herb Beebe, Forks clerk-treasurer since 1959 was born in Sumas, Washington and has lived in Forks for 37 years. He is married and he and his wife, Gerry, have one daughter, Karen Haffner, also of Forks. To the old and to the new, as Judge Holland put it, "we wish the best of luck". We won't print what the judge said he was going to do when he retired, why don't you ask him?

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(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1) There is more water in that street than I have seen in Mill Creek!"

When the town annexed the area they had an agreement with Tom Mansfield that the street would be put into town specifications, after repeatedly contacting Mansfield about the problem, he was invited to attend a council meeting, at that time he agreed that the street was not up to standards and that he would put it in within the next few days. Mayor Kennedy instructed Attorney Frank Platt to contact Mansfield's bonding company and the county engineer about arrangements to complete the road. The possibility of draining the street will be studied by Frank Lyda and Lyda will also put up a barricade on the street.

Gene Lemmon also approached the council about the drainage problem in front of his building on Sol Duc Way. He said he understood it might be possible to trench the street, thereby putting the flow of water into the storm sewer, instead of its just standing sidewalk deep on the street. Another problem for Frank Lyda, said the council. The diagonal parking on Sol Duc Way was also discussed. Lemmon requested the parking from the corner of the Amusement Center on Sol Duc Way be restricted to bicycle parking only. Lemmon said that there is not enough room for cars to park safely and that he would install a bike rack if the city would paint an area "no parking, except for bicycle". He said that with all the bicycles parked on the street he is afraid that some of the older people who walk that street might get hurt running that obstacle course. The council is considering changing the parking regulation on that street to parallel parking only, so this matter will be discussed at a later meeting.

The Forks Lions Club has volunteered their labor to install the street signs in Forks, and councilman Chuck Anderson, in a dual role of councilman and Lion, asked the city if they would furnish the materials for the signs. Mayor Kennedy asked Anderson how he would vote? Anderson said, "In my dual role, I would have to vote yes." The council, excluding Anderson, was polled and they decided to furnish the materials. Councilman Anderson then joined the council for the remainder of the meeting. Building permits were issued to Kampe Construction for 3 houses, at \$14,500, \$13,500 and \$14,000. Herb Hanson, carpenter and storage, \$1,800, 00, PUD No. 1, steel storage building, \$33,000. The budget Ordinance No. 123 was filed.

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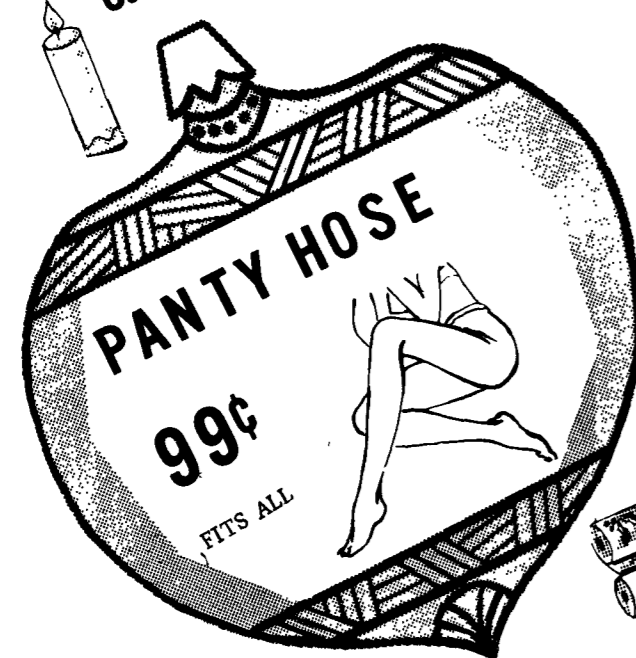

Our concern is that the present trend in timber taxes will make it impossible to continue growing trees.

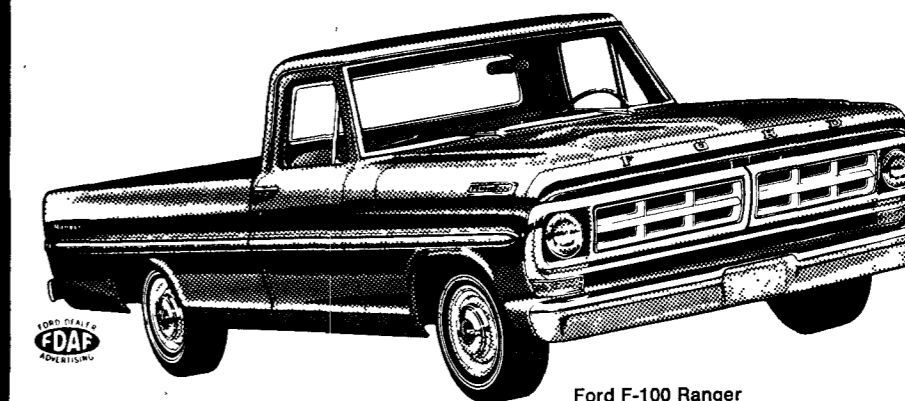

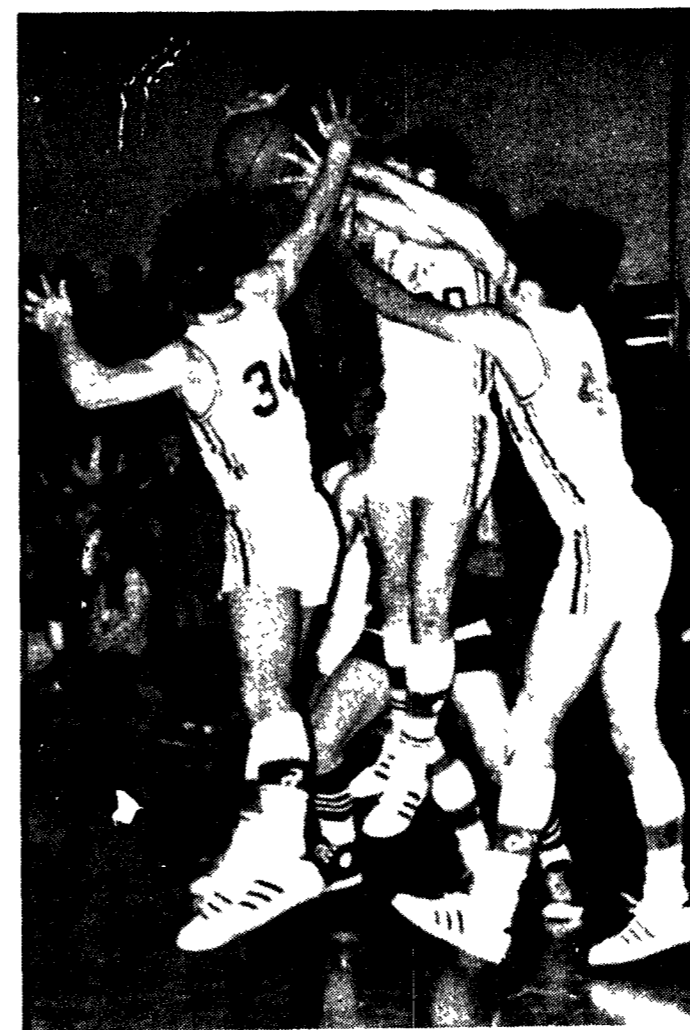

An old school buddy gave me a big tip on the whereabouts of the elk in area #8 along the Soleduck River. Just be there early Saturday morning and they will be there waiting, said Craig Fletcher, as he pulled down on his suspenders, then muddled something about bow season and walked out the door. Well, after traveling 125 miles across ridges, swamps, and creeks, I came up with a grand total of 4 mallards, 3 grouse, 1 deer, and 32 squirrels. I also ran up on ten other hunters who told the same story as mine. NO ELK, NO SIGN. Thanks for the tip there, partner.

WEEKEND GAME CHECK
Local wildlife agent Jim Aggergaard checked several bow hunters in the Iloh area Saturday with no game. I talked with several hunters who have found elk, but failed in the stalking of these ungraceful critters. After a day checking steelhead fishermen at the Bogachiel, Jim probably counted fish in his sleep. The fishing could have been summed up in one word, "hot". Three 20-pound steelies were checked along with five 15-pound fish. A check below the rearing pond at Dittmell's Sunday showed 25 fishermen with 29 fish. A high count as most were boaters who had only drifted a small section of river. Archie Larson and party, were home by 9:30 a.m. with limits of ironheads. To sum things up, boaters, drifters, and plunkers all had fish over the weekend. HERE AND THERE

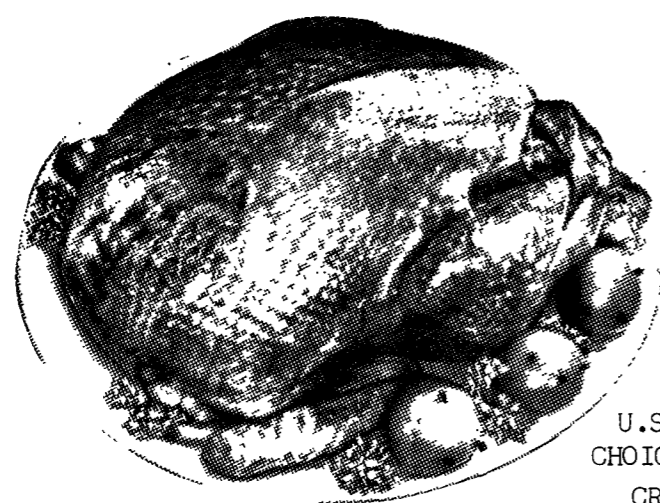

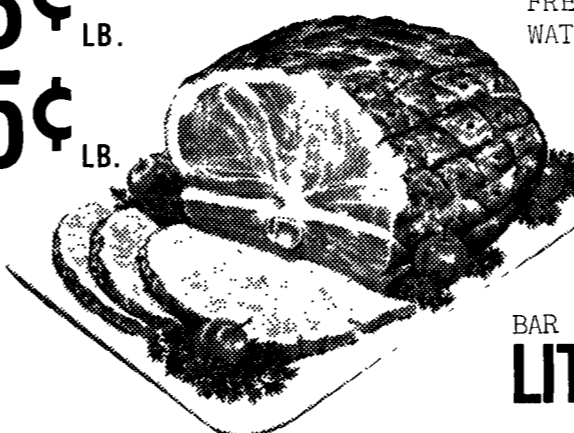
