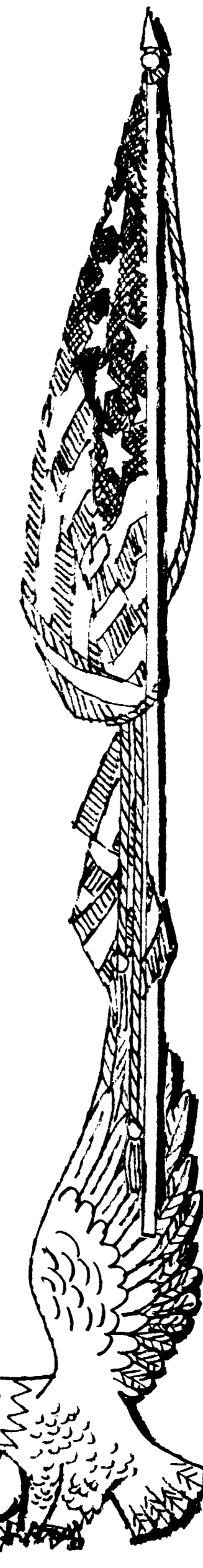
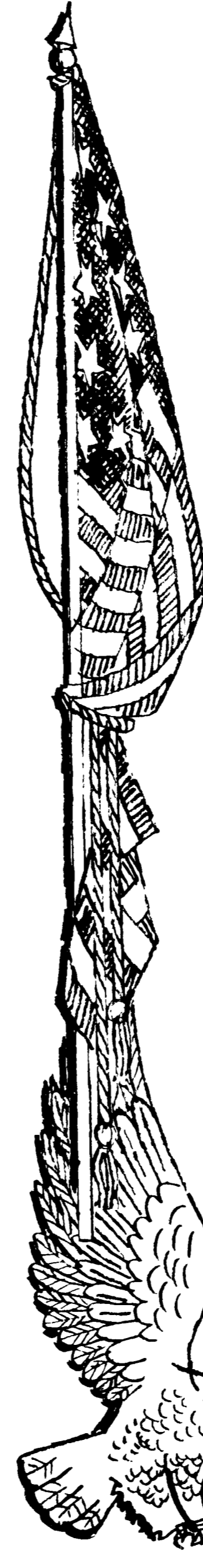

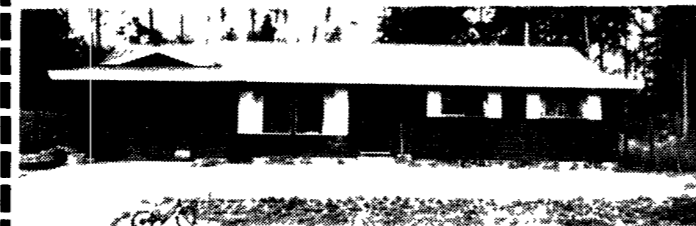

FORKS CITY COUNCIL

The council meeting came into being promptly at 7:30 p. m., June 28, 1971. The first order of business was the approval of a building permit for a new home; Joseph Burke builder, cost \$15,000.00. The council approved payment of vouchers by unanimous vote. The proposed Forks sewer system, undoubtedly the most important issue on anyone's books, was discussed at great length. The Town Council was faced with a decision. To be or not to be, that was the question. The council approved by unanimous vote to proceed with the sewer system. A meeting with Lee Johnson and Associates at the next regular council meeting on July 12, 1971, will constitute a form of contract. City Attorney Frank Platt gave his report on the function of the Clallam County Humane Society. He said the county does not contribute any tax money to the humane society. The City of Port Angeles does pay the humane society \$7,500.00 a year and the county donates \$1,500. The City of Sequim pays nothing. The dog problem in the Forks area will soon be a thing of the past. The council is working at great effort to eliminate the problem. Tony Barrett of the Olympic Health District talked of septic tank installation. He said that although there is no permit fee, a permit must be obtained before contracting the installation, and only two firms are licensed through his office; George Campbell and Norm Cowan. The Town Council will contact the state engineers office, requesting a traffic survey for the possibility of a stop light at Division and Forks Ave. N. The population sign still bears the 1960 count. This will also be taken care of. The population of Forks proper is now 1679. If you check your history, you'll find 1679 to be a pretty good year.
