## CITY COUNCIL POSITION #1



Joe Winney, age 29, became interested in the Town Council when the proposed construction of a sewer system became an issue. Winney is a graduate of the University of Washington, resides in the Mansfield Addition with his wife, Karen, and 2 children. He was raised on Bainbridge Island and served 2 years in the army. Before moving to Forks, he worked for four years as a computer programmer. He is employed by Winney Construction Co. and has never before held a public office.

Winney feels that the proposed sewer system should not be for just the city, but should also include the adjacent developments.

Another problem area, as far as the city is concerned, is land zoning. He questions how a building code will be enforced, if enacted.

**ATTENTION: LOGGING COMPANIES**

The Employment Security Department of the State of Washington is responsible for the administration of the unemployment compensation program. Over the years, this department has been guided in its policies by the

## ITT Rayonier opens lands to hunters

Nearly all of ITT Rayonier's 350,000 acres of tree farm lands in western Washington will be open to sportsmen during the 1971 hunting season, according to L. J. Forrest, vice president of ITT Rayonier and general manager of the company's Northwest timber operations.

The company's South Harbor Tree Farm in Pacific County, the Grays Harbor Tree Farm in Grays Harbor and Jefferson Counties, and the Clallam Tree Farm in Clallam and Jefferson Counties will be almost entirely open to hunting, Forrest said. Access to a few areas will be restricted because of hazards involved from active logging and construction work. Daytime access in some of these restricted areas will be possible and special arrangements are being made to open most restricted areas for weekend hunting.

Large wall maps giving detailed information concerning the restricted areas may be consulted at company offices in Hoquiam, Port Angeles, Shelton, Seattle, and Sappho.

In many cases, the fallers and buckers provide their own chainsaws, furnish their own transportation for themselves and for others, and sometimes even arrange for their own industrial insurance coverage. That portion of their earnings which applies to such items should be clearly identified and no tax paid thereon. Up to 33 1/3 % is usually accepted as fair chain saw reimbursement.

It is not unusual for the fallers and buckers who enter

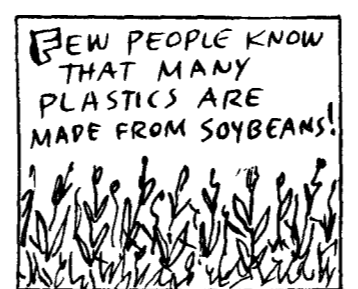
Giants came back with more and downed the Sequim Eagles, 27-7.

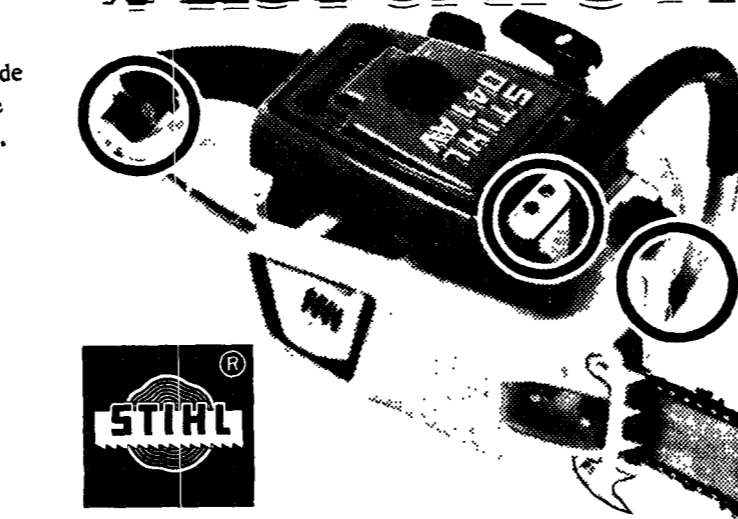

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
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## In and Around Town

He logged trees, fixed engines, milked cows, grew vegetables. Nothing was done unless it could be done well, yet fancy things were not for him. He was practical, but he was much more a man of feeling and thought and study and observation. No man could have greater love for his wife and as much difficulty showing his love. He had baskets full of questions. Life was a riotous of problems and confusion. He was constantly trying to understand why the world is the way it is. Nothing made much sense, and he always thought it was his fault he could not understand ---even though he sometimes tried to blame others for his own frustration. There were always tangles between hating and loving, seeking and finding, despairing and hoping, dying and living. He sought wise men to explain these tangles, but he could not accept another man's answers. He had to have his own solution. In the end, however, he realized that only God can see the sense of this world. And with this pain went away.

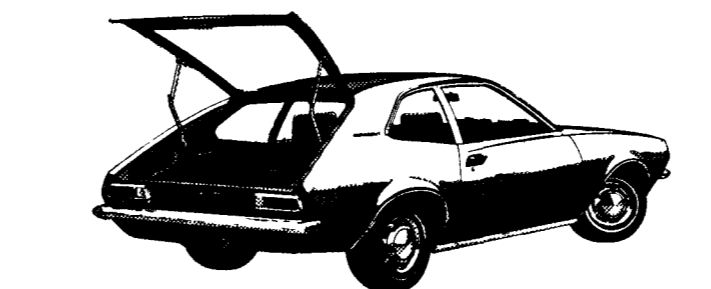

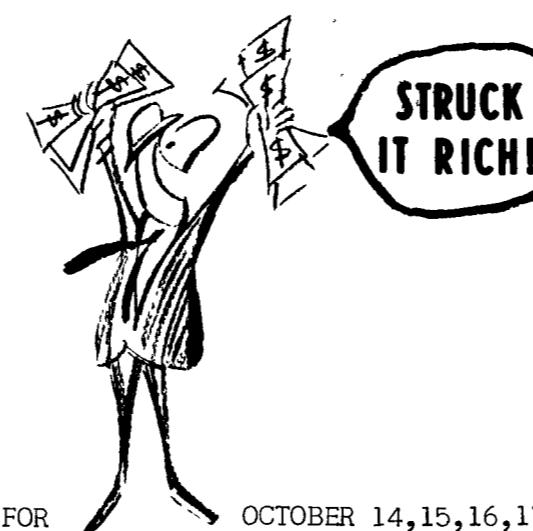
