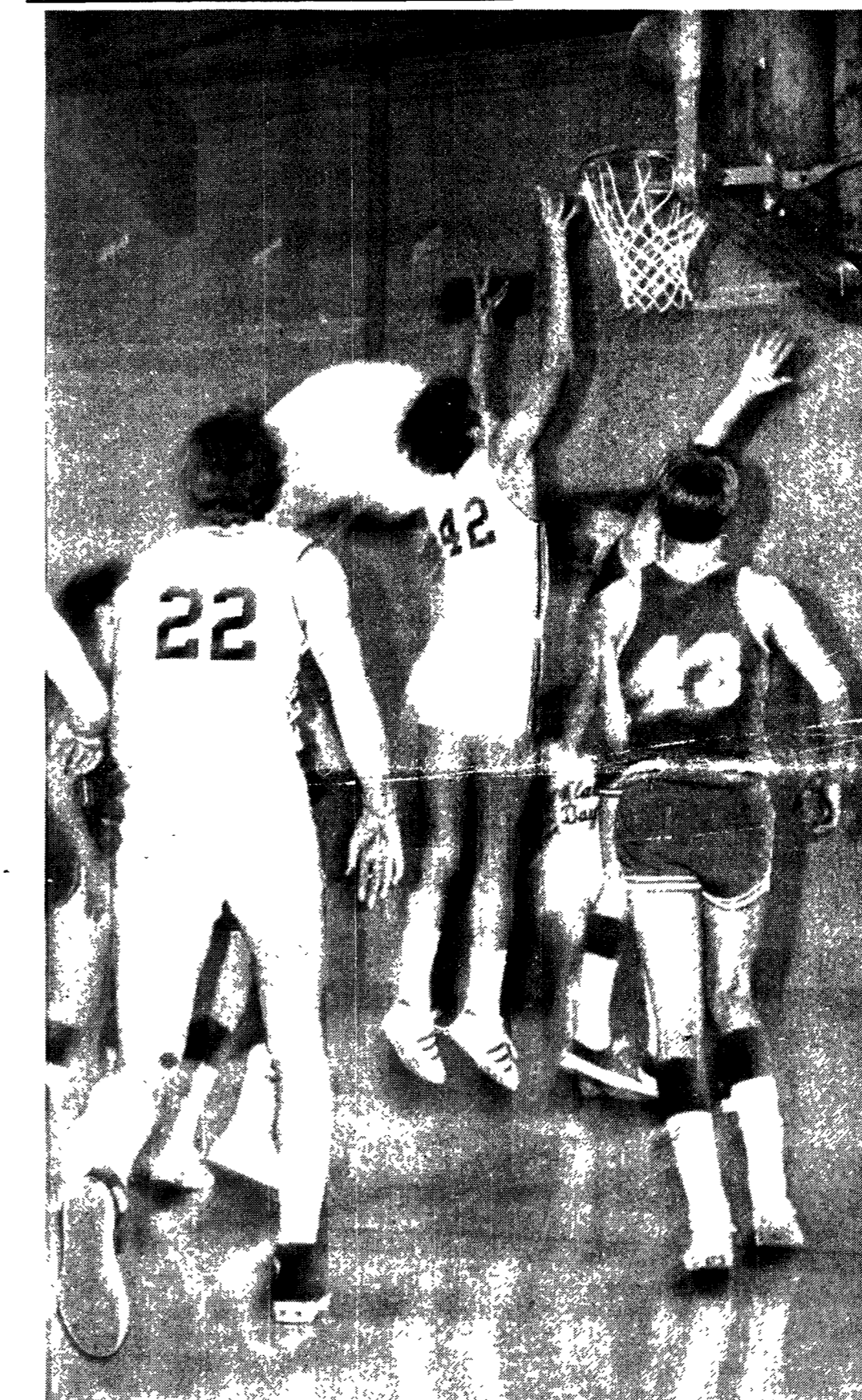

## LOCAL DNR TO REORGANIZE

A reorganization at the field management level of the Department of Natural Resources will consolidate the Forks and Port Angeles Districts, with the new area headquarters located at Forks, E.C. Gockereff, Forks Field Supervisor and Rod Downen, Port Angeles, District Administrator announced jointly. The reasons for the change are to reduce overhead, increase efficiency and improve management operations.

Part of the Forks district will be divided into local manager areas. One will be from Pysht to Neah Bay. Another will include the Lake Ozette area east to Lake Crescent. Another local area is planned from Kalaloch to Lake Quinalt to be joined with a fourth area extending from Lake Quinalt to Hoquiam. The area from Beaver south to Kalaloch will be phased into local areas at a later date.

The effect on the present Port Angeles district will be to divide the district into two smaller areas with a manager in each; the one at Port Angeles, the other at Center. All will report directly to the Area office in Forks by two-way radio. Each local manager will have a small crew on a year around basis and employ two or more additional men during the fire season.

Summer fire crews and equipment will be strategically located throughout the Olympic area to be called on to assist local managers as needed.

I am sure the teacher only uses punishment when it is necessary, I am not questioning that; kids are kids. The manner in which they do discipline, I am. The next child to be spanked, shaken, or beaten may be yours. Ask your children how their teacher disciplines. Let's put a stop to it.

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OZETTE PROJECT REPORT

The Ozette Village archeology project in Northwest Washington has provided evidence of a cultural heritage among the Makah Indians "richer and more elaborate than they had any knowledge of," Project Director Dr. Richard D. Daugherty reported.

Daugherty spoke in Todd Hall Auditorium at Washington State University in the first Invited Address of the academic year at WSU. His topic was "To Build a Past."

The WSU professor of anthropology is on leave during the current school year while he directs excavation activities at the Ozette Village, located at Cape Alava on the Olympic Peninsula.

Daugherty first excavated the Ozette site in 1966, with full-time digging resuming last year after waves uncovered a rare Indian Longhouse along the shoreline. An archeology crew from WSU has been at the site since then, numbering from nine to 45 from winter to summer.

The site was occupied for at least 4,000 years by ancestors of the Makah Indian Tribe. The ancient Indians hunted for whales from canoes in the Pacific Ocean and were artists and craftsmen of great ability, Daugherty said.

The longhouse now being excavated is about 500 years of age, and five other similar dwellings have since been discovered by the WSU diggers. The house is about 40 by 70 feet in size, he said.

In addition, some 7,000 specimens have been recovered, including eight whale harpoons about 14-feet long, assorted wooden boxes, food dishes, clothing, fishing gear, weaving looms, many mats and baskets, bows and arrows, seal harpoons, canoe paddles and ballers and art objects.

"We find many of their tools and utensils carved and ornamented, and we have found some big panels about 12 or 14 feet long that were hung inside the walls of their house," Daugherty said.

The Indians also used sharpened beaver teeth to carve images of wolves, thunderbirds and whales on cedar planks, and these, too, have been recovered.

"Here's a group of people whose knowledge about their past only goes back to the coming of the first European explorers, and what notes and journals they kept, dating back to the late 1700's," Daugherty said. "In other words, their knowledge of their cultural heritage only goes back about 200 years."

The Ozette project has "suddenly opened up their past for them and is producing a real

cultural revitalization which is particularly noticeable among young people, because they have never known how much stock to place in the old myths and stories," Daugherty said.

The findings about their ancestors have been even richer and more elaborate than they had any knowledge of," the WSU professor said.

As a result, the Makahs plan to request some \$750,000 from federal agencies to be used for building a museum at Neah Bay where the specimens from the Ozette site will be on display. They also plan to develop a recreation area along 27 miles of ocean beaches owned by the tribe.

Some 50,000 people a year visit the Ozette site, including many school groups and children. The project has received extensive regional and national publicity, resulting in the Makahs becoming "a kind of household word in Northwest Washington," Daugherty said.

The result has been to instill in the Makahs "a tremendous pride in their culture--which they have always had--but can now use in a long-range manner," Daugherty said.

"Since there's no other site like this in the Pacific Northwest, when the results of the excavations are published students studying American Indians all over the country will study the findings because of the completeness of the records," Daugherty said.

"The impact of the Ozette excavations must be measured not only in educational terms, but also in terms of the influence their discoveries are
