 On Thursday night, March 2, at Forks High School, the championship semi-final playoffs were held to determine the league champion.  
 In the first game of the evening, Pay & Save and Tye were pitted together with the outcome not in question from the outset. Pay & Save, with their run and shoot type of game, along with the strong rebounding of Norm Bagby completely outclassed their opponents. The final score of the first playoff game was Pay & Save 76, Tye 51.  
 The second game of the evening started to take the same style as the first contest with Town Team taking a commanding lead early, only to have ITT Rayonier make a fantastic surge in the second half. At that point John Medsker and Bill Peterson got hot and put the game away for the Town Team, and gave them an opportunity to try and knock off the highly rated and talented Pay & Save team the ensuing evening. The final score: Town Team 92, ITT Rayonier 74.  
 The consolation game Friday evening for third and

fourth place between ITT Rayonier and Tye was a very ragged ball game from the outset with several players fouling out of the game before the final claxon sounded. Fouls played a major roll in the game, with ITT Rayonier able to connect on the majority from the charity line and pull from their 15-14 deficit at the end of the first quarter to go in front to stay at the half 33-28. Tye put on a late game surge but to no avail in the closing minutes of the game. The final score: ITT Rayonier 62, Tye 57.  
 As expected in the championship contest, Pay & Save came out and played their normal run and shoot type ball game and built up an 11-1 early lead, and the partisan Town Team crowd started to feel that it was going to be a very long evening.  
 At that point, with the fine outside shooting of John Medsker and Mike Price, along with the good rebound positioning of Bill Peterson, Town 1 Team made a run for the money. They were only down by five at the end of the first quarter, and were able to play the same game as Pay & Save and take a 29-26 half time lead into the locker room.  
 At the beginning of the second half it was apparent that the Town Team was starting to get a little tired, and was pressured to slow the game down and play for the best shots. At that point miscues started to take their toll, and the Town Team started to slowly lose ground. The hot hands of Phil Kitchel and Norm Bagby, along with Bagby's numerous second half rebounds, put the game away for Pay & Save in the closing minutes of the championship game. The final score has a ten point budge separating the two ball clubs, but in no way does the final score indicate the hard fought battle between these two teams. Pay & Save is your West End League Champion, and they earned it by downing a very tough and determined Town Team 73 - 63.

## Portland man killed in truck accident

Kenneth F. Shananoquet, 26, of Portland, Oregon, was killed Saturday, March 4th while driving his single truck near here. The State Patrol reported that Shananoquet was traveling southbound on Burnt Mountain Road and entered a curve when his truck-trailer rig ran off the road and plunged over a 10-foot embankment.

As the truck rolled down the embankment it burst into flames, but bottom and made it impossible for rescuers to reach Shananoquet. Forks and Beaver Fire Departments, along with the Washington State Patrol responded to the twisted and smoldering wreckage, but were unable to save Shananoquet.

The truck-trailer rig belonged to Lewis Queirolo of Portland, Oregon, and the Washington State Patrol stated the rig was completely demolished due to the accident and ensuing blaze. Shananoquet's death brought Clallam County's traffic fatality total to three for the year 1972.

## Indian carver at Forks Schools

Merrie Alexander, a master carver of the Lummi Indian Tribe visited the Forks High and Intermediate Schools February 14. As he demonstrated he related the legend of the mask he was working on and showed the different tools used in carving. Born on the Lummi Reservation in 1915, Alexander has been carving for 37 years. Among his works are house poles (totem poles), spirit poles, masks and even canoes. The late President Franklin Roosevelt and President John F. Kennedy both had totem poles carved by Alexander and his work was also exhibited at EXPO 70 in Osaka, Japan.

Dear Mr. Chairman and Directors of School District No. 402:

The recent action taken requesting the resignation of Mr. John Hitchcock, was regretfully noted by many of the district. Undoubtedly, this action was considered to be in the best interests of the school. To many of us, this is the question of the gravest concern: Is it in the best interest of the school?

The concern is somewhat centered in the fact that three of you are relatively new to the board and all of you have full-time employment which means that the amount of time you have to donate to the taxing position of school director is very limited. Hence, in view of the element of inexperience and the lack of time, will the added disadvantage of a new administrator be in our school's best interests? Was sufficient time and study made of the problems to render this decision? Rarely are there simple answers to complex issues; it takes time consuming study to render the most feasible solutions.

The administrator of a school is required to have extensive knowledge of state and federal regulations, at all times to be aware of the educational advances and to try to effect those advances in the particular situation and usually on a less than adequate budget. Mr. Hitchcock has given his time, talents and energy to accomplish what was required and in many, many areas, much more. The past fifteen years have been a period of tremendous growth in our district

and although it is doubtful that you would hear of any accomplishments he has achieved from him, there have been many. A little observation and study, if you are not already aware of same, will reveal this man's worth. He has given the district much more of his time than we had a right to claim, including many times his earned vacation time. He forfeited his salary increase when the district was in financial stress. In other words, he has been a totally committed public servant and we have repaid him with gross ingratitude.

It is to be hoped that the price of this decision won't prove excessively costly both monetarily and educationally to our district and to our children.

I think that the so-called Gun Control Act of 1968 should be revealed. The only thing it has accomplished is a big bureaucracy and the harassment of many gun owners and the illegal arrests and persecution of innocent people while the criminal goes free to commit the same crimes again and again while awaiting trial.

#### MAPS OF LOCAL RIVERS NOW AVAILABLE

The Washington State Department of Game has recently published four new river maps of top steelhead streams in our evergreen state. The four are none other than that of the Bogachiel, Quillayute, Soleduck and Calawah rivers. Included on these colorful maps are public access sites such as areas for stream bank fishing, boat launching and parking. Also included are roads and scale miles.

These maps and many more are free upon request at your game department regional office as listed on pages 38-39 of the official 1972 fishing regulations. 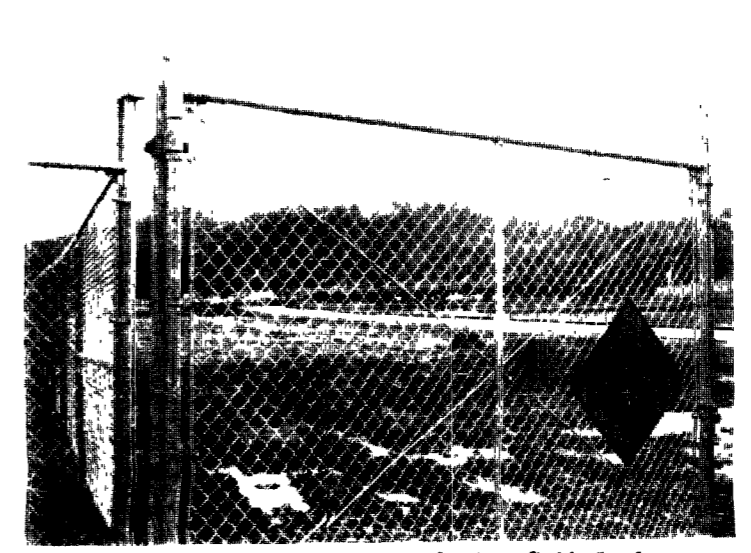
## THE PRIMARY CORNER

Teachers are being challenged to meet the present day demands for change. Team teaching, open school concepts, non-graded and individualized learning are some of the innovations. I have worked for many years to meet the needs of my individual students. This is not easy with a shortage of the

right materials, overcrowding, etc. This year I have had the opportunity to focus again on methods proven most helpful to the individual.

Many materials lend themselves to individualization of learning: tapes, programmed materials, newspapers, and more.

Support personnel are also helpful, such as specialists and aides.

Some teachers use a totally individualized approach with each child using self-selected materials. In other schools, children with common needs are grouped. Success in the individualization of learning depends mostly on not how the class is organized but on what is done to help each child within it.

Diagnostic teaching means careful analysis of each child's level of mastery in all important skills, appropriate adjustment in instruction, compiling systematic accurate records, and understanding of what is being learned. Then appropriate practice focused on specific individual needs.

Talking with the children, observing, testing, making charts and checklists are some of the devices teachers use to construct a continuing inventory to help them understand both the what and the why of the work they do.

We, meaning teachers and parents, must help all children learn, and individualized instruction has proven very effective.

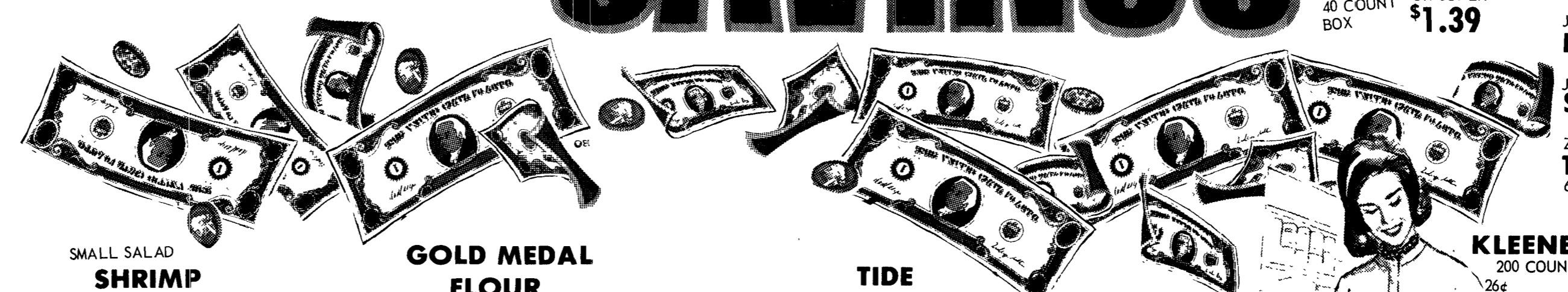

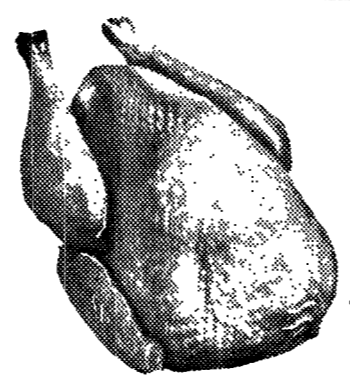
