### LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 132 AN ORDINANCE establishing the motor vehicle speed limit on Forks Avenue in the Town of Forks. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF FORKS AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. It shall be unlawful to operate a motor vehicle within the Town of Forks on Forks Avenue (State Route 101) at speeds in excess of the following: (a) Thirty-five miles per hour for all vehicles from the south corporate limits, Mile Post 101.00, northerly to "E" St., Mile Post 101.25, a distance of 0.25 mile. (b) Thirty miles per hour for all vehicles from "E" St., Mile Post 101.25, northerly to the north corporate limits, Mile Post 101.50, a distance of 0.25 mile. Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.



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### FIRES STOPPED ON STATE LAND

"Early detection and quick suppression by DNR fire crews kept two fires from becoming major blazes last weekend," Bert L. Cole, Commissioner of Public Lands, announced today.

One fire was located south of Forks, on the Olympic Peninsula, it unburned slash. The other was north of Merrill Lake in southwest Washington, it felled and bucked timber.

The Forks fire burnt 20 acres of slash in the area where the disastrous fall fire occurred in 1967. The 1967 fire burned nearly 6,000 acres, most of which was in slash and required 400 firefighters to halt it.

According to Cole there was little difference in burning conditions between the 1967 fire and the one which occurred over the past weekend. It could easily have become another fall fire if it hadn't been for quick thinking, detailed fire suppression planning and the proximity of suppression crews and equipment at the Clearwater Honor Camp.

The second fire of the weekend, which also could have had disastrous consequences, was southeast of Castle Rock just north of Merrill Lake. This fire burned 14 acres of felled and bucked timber on state protected land. No logging equipment was harmed. Once again early detection and quick response from Department of Natural Resources firefighters and logging crews stopped the blaze before it could spread.

"This is a good example of how quick detection, detailed planning and training can produce successful control of fire before it can spread into a major threat to the forest environment," Cole said. "People should be aware that that fire is an ever present threat to the land."

A little like the chicken and the egg, first of all, the Town Council cannot proceed on their own in such a matter. They cannot force the people in that area to hook up to the system. That's a job for the county. The county can't force the issue unless the County Health Department makes claim that the Ford Park or any other area is in

actually, contaminating the town's water supply.

It was stated by a citizen that Tony Barrett of the Clallam County Health Department had reneged earlier that due to the distance from the town's city limits and the Ford Park area, the cost would be quite high and the people would vote it down. It was brought out that the Town Council could, under certain situations, vote an area into the sewer system. There was no real opposition to the system. The people there were concerned about the future of the town's water supply being polluted by the Ford Park area. To those protesting the sewer system, you have until 8:00 p. m. Monday, June 19, 1972 in which to file your protest. You must sign the protest, you fill it up, your protest. It will be sent back to you. It will not be thrown out as some seem to believe through hearsay.

The Council acknowledged the receipt of a petition regarding the location of two streets in the Seabe Addition. A resolution will be drawn up for the next regular Council meeting.

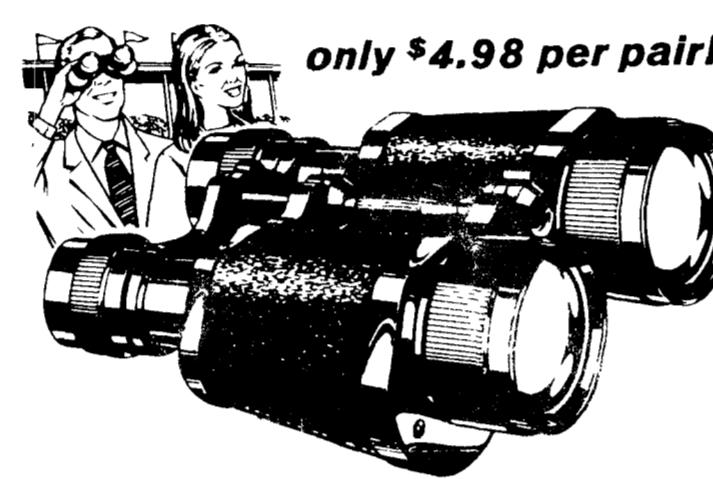

John is the 5th IFYE from Forks. The first one from Clallam County was from Port Angeles.

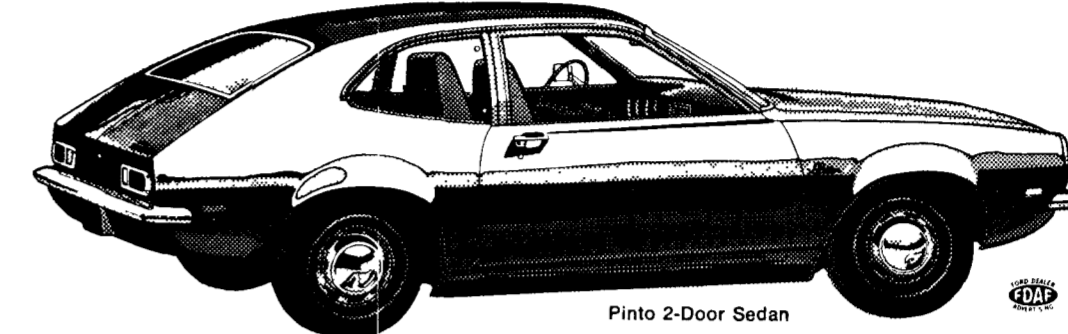

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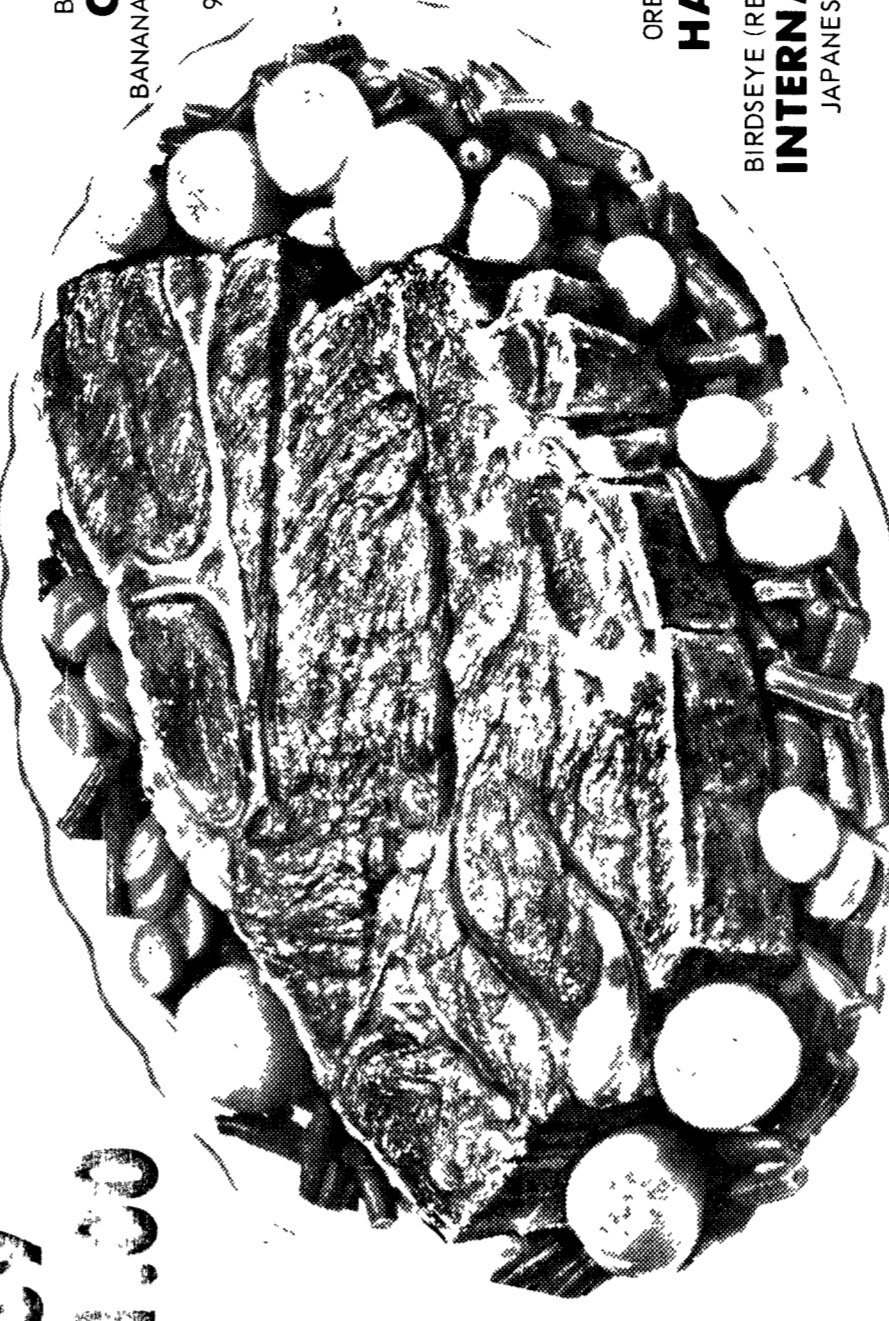
